OUR NEIGHBOUR'S VIEWS.

There is something quite refreshing in the insolence of our Canadian neighbors relative to the proposition for a reciprocity treaty with the Dominion government.

It was pointed out to the Americans that Canada had taken her sword in reference to her tariff, and had proclaimed and given effect to preferential trade arrangements and that the representatives could not enter in to any agreement which would directly or indirectly prejudice the principle of reciprocity.

The Minneapolis Times complains because flour is 35 per cent higher than it was at the lowest point a year ago because corn is 9 to 10 per cent higher, because granulated sugar is over 17 per cent higher, because molasses is 1 per cent to 9 per cent higher, because pork is over 33 per cent higher, because potatoes are more than 100 per cent higher, because butter is more than 15 per cent higher, because eggs are over 10 per cent higher, because wool is from 80 per cent to 100 per cent higher, because hides are 40 per cent higher.
