A GLORIOUS TIME.

That is What Everybody Voted the Celebration in Pine City on July 4.

July 4th, 1898, was a day long to be remembered in Pine City as well as the whole nation.

At sunrise the sound of the cannon awoke the peaceful slumbers of our citizens, and then the small boy joined in the chorus with his fire-crackers and cap-pistols, thus ushering in the glorious Fourth.

The street parade was formed by Henry J. Rath, officer of the day, assisted by Paul Perkins, his lieutenant. The procession was formed on second street in front of H. J. Rath's residence, headed by the Pine City Cornet Band, following which came a float drawn by A. E. Brackett's four gray horses with Bert dressed to represent "Uncle Sam" holding the lines, on which was the Goddess of Liberty, represented by Miss Ida Dose, and a number of young girls dressed in white, representing the states and territories, next came Kowalk's float called the "battle-ship New York" on which was inscribed "Remember the Maine," and also "This ship will meet the Spanish fleet on Cross lake at 9 o'clock this evening." The ship was manned by boys dressed up in sailor suits, and was one of the features of the parade and reflected great credit on the originator, next came Adam Biederma's display consisting of a binder, mower, and hay-rake trimmed with bunting and flags which made a very fine appearance; after which came a float representing camp life at Laké Pokegama, called "Camp Comfort"; then followed floats of John Stochl, making cigars; John Heyda's, tailor-shop; Gross Bros. carpenter shop; Wolf Schaublayer, with a blacksmith shop; Tom Ling had a fire-engine and hose cart to take the place of the one that failed to show up; the Pine City Milling company had ten boys dressed up with flour sacks marching in line. Theo. Bussemier had a large tank filled up and dispensed amber colored liquid to the thirsty; then came the Collins girls with their Sheikland pony and buggy all trimmed with flags and bunting on the pony was a blanket advertising Dr. H. J. Fountain's White Wonder soap; then bringing up the rear was Masters Frank and Raymond Gottry and Boss Armstrong, with the former's Sheikland and cart which was trimmed with flags, bunting and roses.

Camp Comfort took the prize for the finest float; Jack Lambert and Ben Hurley received the prize for the most comical being the horse carts; the fire department received the 2nd prize. Miss Ella Glanville took the prize for having the finest trimmed bicycle.

The procession marched on all the principal streets, disbanding at the court house.

At 1:30 the band began playing in the park where the crowd had gathered to witness the egg, foot, sack and potato races.

Gertie Crittenden won the egg race, and Aggie Hupley second; Chas. Purdy won the foot race and Will Hurley second; Ben Hurley won the sack race and Mat Hurley second; James Heywood won the potato race and George Kick second. The greased pig was they tumbled loose in the park and considerable sport was had chasing it; Garret Corrigan succeeded in capturing the animal. The crowd headed by the band then went to the fair grounds where the horse and bicycle races were to take place.

The trotting race was won by Muskick's Messenger girl and Collins' Grey a close second. The running race was won by N. Hendrick's pony and Endicward's Nig second. The ladies bicycle race was won by Vernie Griffith, Ella Glanville second. The boys' bicycle race was won by Rudolph Bussemier, Archie Axtell second.

At 7:30 a large crowd gathered on the banks of Cross Lake to witness the boat race, which was won by Carl Johnson, and Bert Cochran second, and also the battle between the American fleet and the Spanish, which was grand in every respect.





THE TICKET.

The ticket nominated by the Republican State Convention at St. Paul last week is beyond all question the strongest ticket ever placed in nomination by the party in this state. The head of the ticket, William Henry Eustis, of Minneapolis, is one of the most prominent men in the state. For several years his friends from all parts of the state have been urging his nomination for the office. He has demonstrated through his excellent administration as mayor of Minneapolis his ability. He is a speaker of unusual force and ability, and one of the cleanest men in the state. He accepts the nomination without being tied up with pre-convention pledges, and if elected as he certainly will be, he should be free to exercise his best judgment. He is the candidate of no class, clique or party, but of the whole people, to whom honor is his accountability. He will lead in an enthusiastic, interesting campaign, and will be elected by an overwhelming majority at the polls. The only stranger in politics on the ticket is Lyndon A. Smith, candidate for Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Smith is an attorney, and lives at Montevideo. He is well known in his vicinity, and has the confidence of the people of the Second congressional district, from which he hails.

It is possible that a mistake was made in not indorsing the nomination of Judge Mitchell for the Supreme Bench. He has many friends, is an able judge, and will poll a heavy vote throughout the state. As the vote he will get will be taken from each of the other nominees, according to the locality of the voter, he will endanger the whole judicial ticket. In the southern part of the state many Republicans will vote for Lovely, Brown and Mitchell, while in the northern part of the state many will vote for Lovely, Mitchell and Lewis. Thus it will happen that he will draw votes from all the candidates, enough possibly to defeat the whole Republican judiciary, and secure his election. The nominees for the Supreme bench are all good men, better than either Canty or Beck, and it would be a pity to see the present occupants of the supreme bench returned as a result of a political blunder on the part of a party mad with the intoxication of promised success. Aside from this mistake there is not a flaw in the ticket, and taken as a whole it is the best ticket ever placed before the people of the state.

WE HAVE had a good many celebrations in the last 122 years, but none equal to last Monday. The victories of July 4, 1783, when the Union armies were victorious at Gettysburg and Vicksburg, were the turning point in the late war, but they were succeeded by the awful slaughter of our troops, as well as by the fact that our enemies were so numerous that it leaves the Fourth of July, 1862, as second only in historical importance to that of the Fourth of July in 1776.

The sentiment of the people expressed in the State Convention is no overabundantly in favor of C. K. Davis for re-election to our Republican in the next legislature would have to vote against him. To do so would brand the offender as a traitor to the state, and a taker of bribes.

By the way, Bob Evans knew pretty near what he was talking about after all.

ALBERT BERG was renominated, and will be re-elected Secretary of State for his third term.

The convocations for the nomination of public officers have ceased to be of sufficient importance to attract the people. Nothing but news from the front goes now.

For once the question of nationality was not raised in the State Convention. This is as it should be. The party and state are sick of seeing incompetent men nominated and elected simply because of the place of their birth.

Mrs. BRYAN, in speaking of the war, shows better sense than her illustrious husband. In a recent interview in Denver she remarked that McKinley was the Abraham Lincoln of modern times. In this remark the American people with one accord join.

The European nations managed to convince some of us a few months ago that our navy was composed of back-number boats, and incompetent seamen. Our navy has forced us to change our mind, and has forced on the European powers the conviction that for intelligent, effective sea-fighting the world long live the navy.

The efforts of the Democrats to force the question of the disposition of the islands acquired during the war in the coming campaign, as an issue, is not meeting the success its advocates hoped. In a recent speech W. J. Bryan took sides with what is generally conceded to be the Democratic position, which was in line with ex-President Cleveland's recent speech in opposition to the extension of American territory on any pretext or for any purpose. It is rather early in the game to talk of the disposition of territory we have not conquered, and at this time any discussion of the subject would be out of place and of no benefit. The duty of all patriotic Americans in the present crisis is to stand by the administration until the war is terminated, and then dispose of the questions as they arise. If we acquire territory it will be time enough to talk of its posing.

The passage of the national bankruptcy bill marks another epoch in our national legislation. For fourteen years the question has been before Congress, but up to this time no bill has been passed, simply because of the inability of the two houses to agree. To Senator Nelson of this state, is due much of the credit for the bill finally adopted. It was his original bill, with a few amendments relating principally to the administrative machinery that was finally passed. The law now passed is regarded as a wise and beneficent measure, its distinctive purpose being to enable honest but insolvent debtors, after surrendering their estates to their creditors, to obtain a final discharge from liabilities which they are unable to pay, so that they may be able to commence business anew and become again active and vigorous factors in the business life of the community. While seeking this to give relief to the honest debtor, it furnishes every needed safeguard against fraud or collusion on the part of the dishonest debtor. Senator Nelson's name will be durably and honorably associated with this much-needed legislation, for he succeeded not only in impressing upon it the principles for which he strenuously contended, but it is largely due to his untiring zeal and activity that the passage of the measure was procured. He has thus rendered an invaluable service, not only to many of his own constituents, but to the country at large.

PROCEEDINGS IN DETAIL.

William E. Lee of Long Prairie declared Over the Convention. ST. PAUL, July 1.—At 12:11 o'clock, after the delegates to the Republican state convention had been alternately entertained for half an hour by a Minneapolis and St. Paul band stationed at opposite sides of the big baroque auditorium, Eli S. Warner, chairman of the state committee, called the convention to order and introduced Rev. G. E. Soper, pastor of the Plymouth and Congregational church of St. Paul, who formally opened the convention with prayer. The crowd had indicated that very few of the 1,178 delegates were not in their seats and before the formal opening of the convention the enthusiasm of the crowd found vent in repeated bursts of applause at the frequent patriotic airs.

Hon. O. Kinney of St. Louis nominated Ex-Speaker W. E. Lee of Todd county for temporary chairman, the nomination being formally seconded by Hon. Fred R. Snyder of Hennepin county, and informally seconded from all parts of the hall. The choice was made unanimously with rousing cheers. Mr. Lee returned thanks for the honor and said he took it that he was chosen to preside, and not to make a speech. He then called for nominations for secretary. The names of W. F. Street of Beltrami, J. Frank Dean of Watonwan, and Ora D. Parker of Le Sueur, were presented and all were chosen. The chair was authorized to appoint committees of six, one from each judicial district, on credentials, resolutions and permanent organization. Henry Felt of Kanaboth was chosen as reading clerk, and through him the committees were announced.

CUSH DAVIS ENDORSED.

Declared to Be the Choice of Minnesota Republicans for Senator. It was 2:15 when Chairman Leo Clark congratulated the first and second session. The committee on credentials, through its chairman, F. L. Deany, reported that there were no changes in the names of the delegates. The temporary organization was made permanent, after Mr. Street, one of the three secretaries, had withdrawn. As soon as the permanent organization had been perfected W. H. Grimshaw of Minneapolis got the floor, announcing that he had introduced a resolution in support of United States Senator Cushman E. Davis, whose name called forth a great burst of applause. The resolutions were as follows:

Whereas, The Republican state central committee in calling this convention extended an invitation to the Republicans of the state to here express the choice of the party for United States senator for Minnesota, and the committee in compliance with the invitation thus extended therefore. That we express our confidence in the distinguished ability, high character and invaluable public services of Cushman E. Davis, the senior senator from this state. During his entire congressional career he has reflected honor upon the state and nation. The matchless skill and judgment which he has shown in dealing with the difficult problems that have confronted him have challenged the admiration of men of all parties and give him an established reputation as the foremost American statesman. Believing the highest interests of the state and nation to be subserved by his reelection to the national senate, we, the representatives of the Republican party of the state of Minnesota, in convention assembled, hereby present him to the incoming legislature as the only candidate of the Republican party of the state for United States senator, and to the end that the people of the state may be enabled to express their choice of the Republican party on this question, the committee do hereby pronounce and we do hereby concur in the adoption of the platform of the party to be adopted by this convention. The resolutions were then adopted unanimously and the chairman was instructed to telegraph them to Senator Davis.

EUSTIS IS NOMINATED.

The Break Came Before the Second Ballot Was Announced. As the committee on resolutions was not ready to report the motion of Hon. J. E. Jacobson of Lac qui Parle county to proceed immediately with the election of state officers was promptly carried. W. B. Anderson of Winona made the first nominating speech, presenting the name of Captain Samuel R. Van Sant for governor. His speech was full of patriotism and was greeted with a roar from the floor and from delegates. A similar reception was given the name of William Henry Eustis of Hennepin county, presented by Hon. W. B. Anderson of Goodhue county and E. Matson of Wilkin county. The first ballot resulted: Berg, 45; Eustis, 85; Peterson, 281; Matson, 25; H. G. Hays 12. The second ballot was announced: Berg, 283; Eustis, 511; Peterson 114; Matson, 12; Hays, 1. The result was a break, but the third ballot was started and continued until Grant county was won by Eustis, 100 more than needed, to 213 and 287 for Merrill and Hays, respectively, and the friends of the two latter candidates moved to make the nomination of Douglas unanimous.

For secretary of state four candidates were presented: Albert Berg of Chitago county, the present incumbent; John W. Peterson of Goodhue county and E. Matson of Wilkin county. The result was a break, but the third ballot was started and continued until Grant county was won by Eustis, 100 more than needed, to 213 and 287 for Merrill and Hays, respectively, and the friends of the two latter candidates moved to make the nomination of Douglas unanimous. Dar S. Reese of Ramsey county, for re-nomination as clerk of the supreme court, was opposed by Jacob Grish of

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As Soper counted, but the first ballot was not completed. Mr. Grish's name was withdrawn and Reese was nominated by acclamation.

For the Supreme Bench.

For associate justices of the supreme court the names of William Mitchell of Winona, C. L. Lewis of Duluth, C. L. Brown of Murray, John A. Lovely of Albert Lea and H. W. Childs of St. Paul were presented. There was some confusion over the method of voting, but it was finally decided and one ballot settled the nomination of Judge Brown, Judge Lewis and Mr. Lovely, the vote standing: Brown 958, Lewis 864, Lovely 866, Childs 495, Hays 495, Canty 21, Elliott 2.

THE PLATFORM ADOPTED.

Principles of the Republican Party of Minnesota.

Believing in the great value of the proposed international convention for the highway and its need for commercial extension and national defense, and that it is in the best interests of the people of this government, we earnestly commend the project to the consideration of our representatives in congress.

In view of the coming senatorial election we take this occasion to express our own confidence in the distinguished ability, high character and invaluable public services of the Honorable Cushman E. Davis, the senior senator from this state. During his entire congressional career he has reflected honor upon the state and nation. The matchless skill and judgment which he has shown in dealing with the difficult problems which now confront the nation, has won for him the admiration of men of all parties and given him an established position in the front rank of American statesmen. Believing the highest interests of the state and nation to be subserved by his reelection to the national senate, we, the representatives of the Republican party of the state of Minnesota, in convention assembled, hereby present him to the coming legislature as the only candidate of the Republican party of the state for United States senator. We further recommend practical legislation which shall arrange for better highways throughout the state.


