al would, however, find it very difficult, in view of the tremendous calls that would be made upon him, to avoid making some remarks, and of course if he were with the President and his Cabinet he would not say anything in opposition to their policy. However, he is not likely to go unless President McKinley should make it a personal request. Governor Roosevelt's intimation on several occasions that he was entitled to the credit of discovering that Dewey was the best man to put in command of the Asiatic station before the war with Spain, has called out details from both Secretary Long and Senator Proctor of Vermont. The latter states that he saw President McKinley and that the President wrote a card directing Secretary Long to "assign Commodore Dewey to the Asiatic Squadron." This seems to settle another of Roosevelt's claims for distinction.

Although it seemed for a time as though the movement to raise a fund to present a home in Washington to Admiral Dewey would prove a failure, the money has been coming in very rapidly for the past few days, and now amounts to over \$50,000. A very handsome home for the Admiral is now an assured fact.

An interview with Gen. Otis recently cabled to the New York Sun from Manila, has been very generally discussed here because of the peculiar statement for a commanding general to make. He says: "The question is, whether after all it would be wise to hasten the ending of the insurrection." As the cable was transmitted from Manila direct, it must be assumed to have received the approval of Gen. Otis's censorship, but has stirred up a great deal of criticism even among those favoring the policy of expansion. That President McKinley's trusted lieutenant should admit that he is inclined to favor the policy of doing nothing to suppress the so-called insurrection, indicates very peculiar conditions, and gives color to the suggestion that has been made in some quarters, that Gen. Otis thinks too much of his job to see it come to an end by bringing the war to a conclusion.

The post office department has been moved from its ancient quarters in the graceful Grecian building at Seventh and F streets to the new city Post Office building on Pennsylvania avenue. The building vacated will be taken by a portion of the Interior Department.

The new offices of the Postmaster General and his four assistants are the best arranged, heated, lighted and furnished of all the departments in Washington. Each office has a palatial suite of rooms, and these are being put speedily to rights. When the new building, which has a large frontage and stands high and massive on the avenue, is fully illuminated at night, it makes a decidedly imposing and brilliant addition to the city. The growth of the country is shown very well by the complete filling of the new eight story building by the department. Large as it is, it will be but a short time before it is crowded far beyond its capacity and some annex will become necessary.

TIMING A RAILWAY TRAIN.


There Are Several Ways of Ascertaining the Speed it is Making.

Not one person in a hundred has any idea of the speed of a train, and even a large percentage of the regular trainmen cannot tell with any degree of accuracy. Engineers use their driving wheel as a gauge. They know its circumference, and by counting its revolutions within a certain time can tell very accurately the speed at which they are running.
A favorite method of timing among passengers is to count the telegraph poles. As a rule these poles are planted 50 to the mile, but in prairie countries, where only a single wire is used, the number diminishes to 25, so that rule will not always work. The most accurate method, and the one most in use by experienced railroad men, is to count the number of rail joints the train passes over in 20 seconds. The rails on nearly all roads are 30 feet in length, and the number passed over in 20 seconds is the speed per hour a train is running.
For instance, if a passenger can count 30 joints on a rail joint in 20 seconds, the train is running at a speed of 30 miles an hour. Actually, this method falls a little short, as in the example given above the number would be nearer 32 than 30 miles, but it is near enough for all practical purposes.



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ANENT PINE CITY. Painters Concerning the County Seat--Resources, Business Enterprises, Etc. For the benefit of those who intend, or are thinking of coming to this place to locate, we will endeavor to give a general idea of what we have in the way of a village.
