WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 29 '99.—Adjutant General Corbin on Saturday received a dispatch that brought much gratification to the administration and bore out the assertions that the end of the war in the Philippines is in sight. Enclosed, Aguinaldo's secretary of state, Aguinaldo's eldest son, four years old, and Aguinaldo's mother were at one time in the hands of the Americans. Subsequently the woman escaped, but \$2,000 in gold found with her, is in General Wheaton's hands.

There is a strikingly interesting feature in the annual report of first assistant Postmaster General Heath, which has just been made public. In some localities, it is said by Mr. Heath, that opposition to the rural free delivery of mail has developed. One of Mr. Heath's correspondents having discovered that the system is vigorously opposed by saloon-keepers who agree that their business is being injuriously affected by the failure of the farmers to come into the towns for their mail, and in consequence do not leave their dimes and nickles at the rum-sellers bar. This is a phase of the rural free delivery problem that should command itself to temperance organizations all over the country, and no doubt will receive attention as it becomes more widely known.

The United States Consul at Portoria, Mr. Macrum, has received instructions from the State Department to bring President Kruger to a realization of the fact that the usages of all civilized nations sanction the services of a neutral representative in event of war. This announcement is made that it may be known that our government intends to insist upon the execution of the trust it assumed in promising to look after the interests of British citizens in the South African Republic. A dispatch from Cape Town had conveyed the intelligence that Mr. Macrum has been refused permission to leave Transvaal territory.

That the Administration has decided to take all precautions against the entry of the Bubonic plague is attested by the appointment of a number of surgeons to his attaches of the European consulates. The precaution was recommended by the Secretary of the Treasury, and the duty of the surgeons will be to advise the consuls upon sanitary matters, to keep the Marine Hospital Bureau informed as to the prevalence of the plague and other epidemic diseases, and they will act in connection with the consuls in giving clean bills of health to vessels leaving ports in the United States, Cuba and Porto Rica.

There will be no change in the rules governing the House of Representatives as had been suggested in a number of metropolitan dailies. This decision was reached at a conference of Republican members with General Henderson a few days ago. The rules, it is said, will remain as they are, in order to assist the new Speaker in the expediting of public business, it being pointed out that because of the narrow Republican majority to step should be taken that in any way would hamper General Henderson. In this decision the Republicans follow closely the policy of Speaker Reed, and this endorsement of his decision must be gratifying to that popular and prosperous New York attorney.

Prospective Speaker Henderson is being besieged by callers at his apartments in the Normandie. Some time ago Mr. Henderson determined not to disclose to the members of the House his relations to the important chairmanship, even to the members most intimately concerned. This decision was reached because the Speaker has not as yet actually been elected, although Mr. Henderson had been regarded the prize by the fact approval of a large majority of the Republican members. There no longer appears doubt, however, that Mr. Payne will be continuing at the head of the Ways and

Means Committee, and that Mr. Cannon will once more be chairman of the Committee on Appropriations and be the floor leader of the majority. The belief is growing in Washington that Congressman Sulzer, of New York, will be the leader of the minority, since at the recent Democratic conference at Chicago he secured many pledges from southern members because of his assertion that his selection would strengthen the party in New York, and give the Bryanites a chance to carry the state.

Senator Quay's friends are beginning to doubt that the Senate will, after all, vote to admit him on the governor's certificate of appointment. From the best canvasses made by Quay managers it appears that he is still short at least four votes to secure his admission. The Quay case is as clear an example of attempted violation of constitutional requirements as could be presented. Here is a vacancy which the legislature of Pennsylvania after full and extended voting refused to fill. A deadlock was secured by Quay's managers, in order to beat his rivals, relying on the promise of the Governor to appoint him again after the adjournment of the legislature. The duty of the governor was plain and all the precedents of the Senate indicated it to him. The legislature should have been assembled in extra session, and kept there until a decision had been reached. The Senate invariably has refused to admit a senator presenting a governor's certificate of appointment, where the legislature has failed to elect after being in session. Quay however relies upon old comradeship in the Senate, to enable him to sit for another full term, without election. It will be interesting to watch the result. If the Senate justifies itself, and reverses all previous action in like cases, it will be a further argument in favor of the election of senators by the people of the states.

WHITES ARE THICK ON THE SCOTCH COAST THIS YEAR. As Sand in the shoals, a school of 71 bottle-necked whales was driven ashore and captured in one day. It was the first time in 44 years that whales had appeared there, though in former times they stranded frequently.

The largest city in the world is London, which has a population equaling the combined population of Paris, Berlin, St. Petersburg and Rome. Its streets, placed in a row, would reach round the world, leaving a bit over long enough to reach from London to San Francisco.

Although odders are comparatively rare in most parts of the world, there are people hardly past middle age, who remember when they were so common on the south side of Glasgow common, London. That it was necessary to put up a warning to children that it was not safe to play on that spot.

It has been found that the pain caused by the sting of nettles is due partly to formic acid and partly to a chemical resembling snake poison. Our nettles are comparatively harmless, but in India, Java and elsewhere there are varieties the painful effects of which last weeks, and in some cases months, like snake bites.

Martin Lambert is still at Seman near Fontainebleau. The bullet in his back caused him considerable suffering and prevents him standing upright. The bullet could only be removed when it leaves the muscle, in which it is present adheres. In this way it is hoped that a simple incision in the skin will suffice to bring about its extraction.

In 1859 a law was passed in Germany that every German with an income of \$700 and over must insure his life against sickness and old age. In 1894 there were 1,200,000 insured in Germany, thus insured, and so many of these had pulmonary consumption that 27 of the insurance companies were erected at their own expense as a guarantee for the care of these persons.

In an official report of a government inspector of factories for Coulog-Gotha some interesting figures are given as to the labor of children under 14 years, who make buttons, toys, etc., at their homes. They work from four and one-quarter to six hours a day, and earn in tuition making from one cent to seven cents, in doll making, from 2 1/2 cents to 15 cents, from work on toys, 1 1/2 cents to 14 cents.

NEXT year it is expected that Rome will draw as many pilgrims as the Paris exposition. According to calculations which have been made by the Vatican secretary of state, at least 1,200,000 pilgrims will visit Rome during the year of 2,000 a day. The amount of money they will bring is expected to reach \$10,000,000, while the amount of money they will spend in Italy is reckoned at \$300,000,000.

WE TWO KANG, the first Chinese minister to America, came to converse in English, has already begun to pay the penalty for an ignorant knowledge. He has been interviewed by a reporter concerning his opinion of American women, and, being as yet a stranger to the particular brand of diplomacy needed in such cases, he said that "gentleness is not American quality," and that he preferred the women of China to those of this country.

IT IS supposed, owing to the number of accidents which occur each year, that the main legislature pass a law prohibiting the wearing by hunters of buff-colored clothing. It may be mistaken at a distance for a deer. Ordinary hunting clothes are the worst possible thing for a man to wear in the northern woods. Accidents have been most frequent, and each year several hunters are killed, often being shot by their friends, who think they see a deer.

GREAT SALT lakes is receding on account of the excessive drains made upon it by irrigation enterprises. This lake is not fed by underground streams, but by the Jordan and other rivers, and when the waters of these streams are intercepted for irrigation purposes the water supply of Salt Lake is of course diminished, so that the evaporation, which is constantly going on, is not made by a new supply. In time it looks as if the lake would only be a bed of dry salt.

THE German emperor possesses a family diamond, which, of course, they prefer to call a gemstone. It is a black stone, which is said to be valued at \$100,000,000. 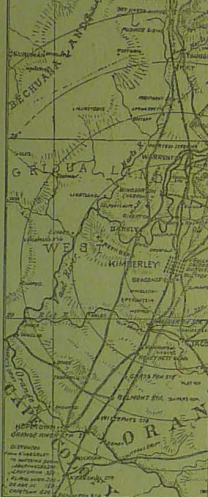
