The East is buried under several feet of snow, while the North Star State is enjoying regular banana-belt weather.

England has come to the United States and floated a \$50,000,000 loan with which to continue the Boer war. This is different than under the last Cleveland administration when our bonds were floated in England at a discount. Who says we are not prosperous?

Organized labor will give Governor Van Sant credit for the recommendation which result in the passage of a law making eight hours a legal day's work on all contracts for public improvement. Under the provisions of the new law contractors on state work must pay full wages for an eight hour day.

During the campaign of 1900 the Democrats talked loudly of what they would do if they controlled the legislature, and of what the Republicans "dare not" do. Let those who heard such talk calmly and impartially review the work of the Thirty-second session of the Minnesota legislature and give credit where credit is due.

Shippers of grain are given a new advantage in the law authorizing the railroad and warehouse commission to declare any station in the state a terminal and put in force such regulations as are desirable. This is an innovation that will prove highly satisfactory to the farmers and shippers in the grain producing districts of the state.

The Republican party needs nothing better than the record of the Thirty-second session of the Minnesota legislature on which to go before the people in the campaign of 1901. Every pledge made or tripled in the campaign of 1900 was religiously redeemed, and no duty was left undone. A system of financing which adds \$600,000 to the appropriations for public improvements and the betterment of the public service, and at the same time reduces the general tax levy nearly 5 per cent, must speak for itself, and that is exactly what has been done.

The primary election law was passed in direct response to the expressed will of the people. The newspapers of the state, almost without exception, favored the bill and the governor had given it his endorsement. There was, of course, some opposition, but this opposition came mostly from country districts, whose members feared that it was to long a stride to take. The cities were, almost without exception, in favor of it, and it received a majority which conclusively showed that the public was behind it with a vote of approval.

The Washington correspondent of the Brooklyn Eagle writes his paper that President McKinley may soon wipe off the tariffs laid by congress, in disregard of "our plain duty," upon imports from and of Porto Rico. The act limited the duration of the tariffs to two years, but contained a provision that when the internal revenues of the island equaled expenses, the president might remove the duties levied on imports from the island and the Porto Rican duties on imports from this country and establish the same freedom of trade that exists between our other territories and the states. He says that Gov. Allen accuses the president that, when the Hollander tax, which levies a land tax, much to the disgust of land owners, the revenues will very soon meet all expenses, and that the president is determined to perform "one plain duty" the moment that condition is reached.—St. Paul Dispatch.

MODEL COW STABLES.

Constructed Along Modern Plans and Supplied with an Exhaust and System of Ventilation.

Mr. H. E. Cook, of Denmark, N. Y., is one of the conductors of the New York Institute. He has been much anxious to learn building and ventilation. He keeps on his farms in northern New York about 100 cows...

A few years ago, before farms were built to build warm stables, when the most of the stables were so open that there was always plenty of pure air for the cattle, we heard of little about tuberculosis. Farmers began to build stables that were very tight and warm, but they gave little attention to the subject of ventilation...



VENTILATED DAIRY BARN.

In poorly ventilated stables has been cattle disease, and no doubt is one of the causes of tuberculosis, which has destroyed many herds in this state. Much of the poor milk which goes to the creameries is caused by the conditions in the stable. The best material with which to build a stable is pine lumber...

You can build a cement floor as cheap as you can build a plank floor and it is much more durable. Little can be done for the foundation of the cement floor...

The King system of ventilation is now acknowledged to be the best, and is explained by the cut. The intake flues are "C" with an opening at "B" provided with an opening at "C" which means more durable. Little can be done for the foundation of the cement floor...

Practical Dairy Dots. The good cow is a comparatively lean one. Breed is well enough, but it will take feed to show what there is in the breed.

In the dairy generally large yields per animal means a less cost in making them. Good and regular milking is of the utmost importance, as it develops the milk-secreting organs.

Plant a Plot of Cow Beets. I think many farmers, and particularly those who have no silo, lose a great opportunity in failing to plant a field or plot of cow beets. On good land it is easy to grow 12 to 15 tons per acre. These roots will keep without any trouble in any cellar or frost-proof basement, and prove a great addition to the winter food for cattle and hogs.

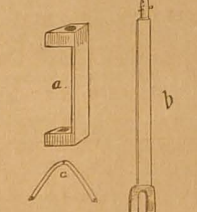
Nothing Enables a Dairy Farmer to Create a Private Home as Effectively as Attention to Details.

The farmer who wishes to make butter at home must pick up a route and retail his own butter, as it will find that the stores don't want it and won't handle it. They can get creamery butter that is reasonably uniform, and will give them less trouble than trying to handle butter made by Tom, Dick and Harry. Even the careful private dairyman at a disadvantage unless he has regular private customers. To-day our farmers told me "I can winter a separator and take great care to have everything neat and clean, and do make first-class butter, but can't get it any of the stores. The creamery near us only averages 10 cents per pound for butter fat, and we can't make anything at that price, but their butter always sells and ours won't. We dropped out because we got discouraged trying to give them clean good cream, while there were lots of patrons who took no care of their milk and were very dirty." This man acted discouraged and wanted to sell some of his cows. He only hope is to work up a private trade. One man from a neighboring town recently brought in a lot of cows, but couldn't sell a pound or hardly get an offer. He was discouraged, but he has a reputation for being neat. A near neighbor of the latter brings in weekly with 30 good cows milk, and has a steady trade at 25 cents in summer and 30 cents in winter. He also sells chickens, eggs, apples and beef. He makes good butter, is neat, and I believe in prosperity. It all depends on the man.—Rural New Yorker.

HINT FOR DAIRYMEN.

How to Make a Barrel Churn That Will Do All the Butter-Making on the Average Farm.

An improvised barrel churn may be made in a simple way, as illustrated. Make the piece (a) from a piece of old wagon tire five inches long. On each end weld a block not one-half inch thick and one inch square. Make a one-half-inch round hole through one end and a square hole the size of the churn axle through the other end. Piece (b) is made of old piece of buggy tire seven inches long; on one end weld a crank pin seven-eighths inch in diameter and long enough to reach the axle in summer and 30 cents in winter. piece is welded and shaped so as to make a fork, as illustrated. The fork should be 3 inches long and 1 inch thick. Two braces, shaped as at c, made of buggy tire and put on the churn frame with screws, will make the churn more rigid. A lever is made of hard wood 1 inch thick by 1 1/2 inches wide and 2 1/2 feet long. Bolt lower end to base of churn frame. Remove crank from churn and put the piece (a) in its place, attach it to a by putting the crank pin through the round hole in a and fasten by spring key. Slip lever into fork (b) and insert a board that will fit loosely through both fork and lever. The hole in lever should be the same height as churn axle. Put on the braces and you have an improved barrel churn.—C. F. Spicer, in Farm and Home.

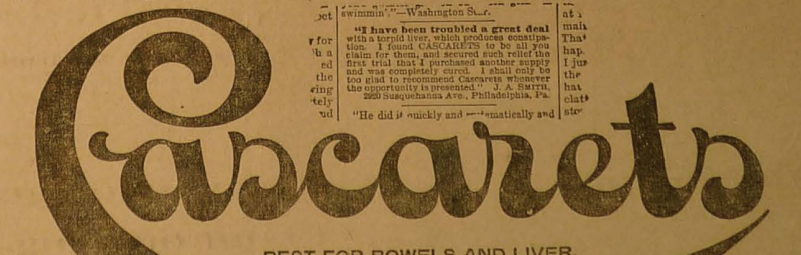
