WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

Ever since Admiral Dewey predicted that the next war the United States had would be with Germany, there have been periodical stories alleging an intention on the part of Germany to provoke a war with us. Just now, the latest is being discussed. It started in Berlin, its foundation being a published interview purporting to have been given out by high German officials, which, in speaking of the rapid growth of German interests in South and Central America, markedly ignores the Monroe doctrine. That interview has aroused considerable interest in Washington, particularly in official circles. As all the world knows, the Emperor of Germany is desirous of greatly strengthening his Navy—he wishes Germany to become a great sea power—and while he has partially succeeded and is now constructing a fleet of warships that will make his navy about as strong as ours, he wants more money for naval purposes and is desirous of influencing public opinion in Germany in that direction. For that reason, warlike talk in the German is not very seriously considered in Washington. But one thing may be set down as certain. If Germany, or any other power thinks the United States will not fight to maintain the Monroe doctrine, they will make a costly mistake.

protection principle, which they claim to be the keystone of success of their party as well as of the country's prosperity, which they cannot safely encourage. On general principles, regardless of party, the people are overwhelmingly in favor of legislation that will curb the power of the trusts. This Mr. Babcock claims his bill will do. 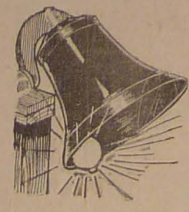

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Our Sidewalks.

Ada has many things to be proud of. Built on what might be called a "prairie" with hardly a tree within its limits, there are now to be found within its borders some of the most beautiful residences in the valley surrounded by elegant shade trees. But Ada has one thing it should be ashamed of and that is the deplorable condition of its sidewalks. Passing along it is almost impossible to find a walk that is not full of holes and loose boards. Of course this is not the case all over our village but which is the condition of the walks in the larger portion of the village. Now why cannot the residents of our village remedy this state of affairs. We believe it would be advisable for the council to repeal the ordinance providing that all new sidewalks must be constructed of two inch lumber. There are several places where entire new sidewalks would be put in but the property owners do not feel like expending the amount of money necessary to build a walk made of two inch material and extending to a length of from 50 to 200 feet. And who can blame them? But at the same time it should be a matter of pride with our village to keep their walks in somewhat decent shape.

Again we say REPAIR YOUR SIDEWALKS! - Norman Cour Herald.

The above is in every way applicable to this town. The sidewalks in Pine City are in a most deplorable condition, and the village authorities should make a tour of inspection, and wherever they find a defective walk, notify the property owner in front of the place where they find such, to repair the same, within a certain time, and if not done at the specified time, have the street commissioner do the work and tax the expense to the property.

This is a matter that every taxpayer is, or should be interested in, because if a person were in anyway to sustain an injury on any defective sidewalk the village is liable for damages. Other villages have had this experience and paid dear for it. By all means let us keep our sidewalks in REPAIR.
