### WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, October 8th, 1901.  
The modest Little Dutch Reform Church chosen by President Roosevelt as his place of worship is to profit largely by his preference. The members of his denomination throughout the Union are raising a fund of \$50,000 with which to erect a more commodious and stately church on the ground now so humbly occupied. President Van Buren was the only other member of this particular communion who has occupied the presidential office. In his day there was no society of the Church, or church building of the name, at the national capital. President Roosevelt's selection of the church is likely to give wings to the denomination during his term of office and the prospects now are that the society will become a strong and notable factor in the religious life of the city.

That part of the social contingent which has returned from the summer resorts has had two tones of interesting gossip, one the marriage of Miss Helen Morton, daughter of former Vice President Levi P. Morton, to the Comte de Perigord et Sagan, of France. Miss Morton was well known and greatly admired here and is deemed well worthy of a noble husband and an ideal wedded life. Many congratulations were cabled from official and social leaders of the city. The other—and more sensational item is that Chauncey—"Our Chauncey," as the nation calls him and "De Peach," as the Bowery club dub him, is to be married again—soon, and sure and safe enough! The statesman, orator, wit and wealth maker has surrendered to the charms of Miss May Palmer, a Knickerbocker Southern belle whose beauty, wit, diplomacy, and American womanliness are celebrated on the two continents of Europe and America. Of course, the coming season will bring the Senator's bride to grace his capital home and to adorn the highest official and social circles. The elect are all agog to see her and refuse to believe that the alleged portraits of her in the newspapers do her any sort of justice. When the Senator does come upon the scene, he will need his reastate to ward off the merry jibes of his host of admirers.

The independence which characterizes President Roosevelt seems also to obtain in his family. Mrs. Roosevelt is a loyal communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and has been granted possession of the famous "Presidential Church," but Wm. Henry Harrison, his successor, John Tyler, Harrison, Fillmore, Pierce and Arthur, worshipped in the edifice, and so gave it the distinction which, in part, Mrs. Roosevelt will renew.

A strong movement is being inaugurated in this city and is to be extended throughout the country, to the end of having the projected bridge across the Potomac converted into a magnificent McKinley Memorial bridge. It is deemed a most appropriate form of honoring the martyred President, as it will constitute a great connecting link between the national district and the northern section of the country and the great south. The remarkable manifestations of personal affection and regret made throughout the South, upon the occasion of President McKinley's assassination and death, have emphasized, in the public appreciation, his patriotic efforts to stamp out sectionalism and to make the southern people feel themselves real and equal co-partners in the nation's government and glory. A meeting in furtherance of this opportune project will be held on October 9th, and through it, the movement, it is hoped, will gain an impetus that will carry the idea into splendid and speedy realization. It is not doubted that Congress will be favorable to the noble scheme.

Secretary Gage is quoted in dispatches from Colorado, where he is visiting, as predicting the retirement from the Cabinet at an early date of Secretary of State, Bay. Such an event would not be surprising. The Secretary is in heavy sympathy with the proclaimed policy of President Roosevelt, unshakable, but both his health and his personal interests allow him little time for official cares. He does not feel that his services are indispensable to the new administration and he is tired of the stupid misrepresentations of what he has been a constant victim to the partisan yellow journalism. As he has ample fortune and quiet tastes, public office is a burden rather than a privation to him. However, he is likely to remain in his present office until the Senate disposes of the several treaties, which he has negotiated, and to the application and defense of which he has been completely committed. On his retirement, it is generally assumed that he will be succeeded by Secretary Root, now at the head of the War Department.

The United States Steel corporation is to expand \$40,000,000 in improving its railroads.

Gov. Horace H. Fairbanks issued an order to prevent the delivery of any lecture by the anarchist leader, Emma Goldman, in Chicago. *Isak's* paper, anarchist organ, is excluded from the mails.

The steamer M. M. Drake and large freighter were lost in a storm on Lake Superior.

The steamer *Humboldt* has arrived at Seattle with \$1,000,000 in gold from Alaska.

## NEW CANAL TREATY.

Great Britain Is Reported to Have Agreed to It.

### CLAYTON-BULWER PACT ABROGATED.

United States Will Control the Canal—New Proposition Makes the Waterway an All-American Enterprise.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—Walter Willman, Washington correspondent of the *Standard-Herald*, telegraphed that paper as follows: "Great Britain and the United States have reached an agreement concerning the isthmian canal question, and the new treaty will be presented to the senate for its ratification early in the coming session. I am now able to give the substance of this treaty." It is understood that the Clayton-Bulwer pact is to be abrogated.

"For abrogation of the old Clayton-Bulwer treaty in toto.

"For a neutralist canals in case of war, open in time of peace to the ships of all nations upon equal terms.

"Great Britain is guaranteed by the United States alone, and other maritime powers are not bound to respect it.

"Great Britain is inferior to the United States in naval power, and she is a party to this treaty.

"The United States reserves the right to make such steps for its own protection as it may deem proper."

#### Objects Objections.

"It will be seen that the new treaty meets the principal objections which were offered to the old Hay-Pauncefote convention and which led to its rejection by the senate.

"The principle of neutrality is preserved, the United States guarantees that neutrality, and no European powers are invited to give their assent to it.

It was this feature more than any other which led to the defeat of the former treaty. Many nations were willing to join with Great Britain in a scheme of the neutrality of the proposed new waterway, because England already enjoyed certain treaty rights upon the isthmus, but they were decidedly unwilling to invite other European nations to give their assent. These nations had no objection to the case, and it was deemed most unwise to invite them to participate in a purely American affair, fair with which they had no direct concern.

#### To Be "All-American."

"Up to the terms of the new treaty the United States may, in time of war, deal with the canal as it deems best for its own interests.

"It may close the canal to the ships of its enemies, and could, if it were thought advisable (which no one believes it even to do), prohibit all commerce with the enemy.

"Formerly, the former treaty was willing to join with Great Britain in a scheme of the neutrality of the proposed new waterway, because England already enjoyed certain treaty rights upon the isthmus, but they were decidedly unwilling to invite other European nations to give their assent.

THE St. Paul Globe of Sept. 28th paid a higher tribute to State Auditor Dunn and other Republican members of the board of equalization than it ever paid to even a Democratic official. What the Globe said, in part, was this:

"Auditor Dunn has been taking a very prominent part in the proceedings of the state board of equalization, and on three or four occasions has succeeded in having assessments raised above the figures agreed upon in the first place. He has not done this which every item and no individual or corporation has escaped full and fair taxation because of any negligence on his part."

So long as the Republican party puts, and keeps, such men as this in office the Democratic press is disarmed. In a campaign the Globe would probably never make such an admission as this, but having been made, the admission is on record, and will return to plague the Globe a year hence, if it will probably be advocating some other man for the position now held by Mr. Dunn.

The Republican party knew what they were about when then put in a man for Vice-President like Roosevelt; and our lamented President, Wm. McKinley, showed his fore-thought and sagacity in wanting as a running mate a man like our present President. McKinley seemed to have a presentiment in wanting a man with his ideas, and a man that would stand up for his convictions to bring to a successful conclusion the policies that had been inaugurated during the unparalleled era of prosperity now being enjoyed by the American people. McKinley did not need the popularity of Roosevelt to secure votes, as his election was admittedly a foregone conclusion even if some unknown man had been given the second place on the ticket, but it was the wish of McKinley that Roosevelt should occupy the second place on the ticket. The sequel has shown once more the wisdom and farsightedness of the lamented president, whose judgment of men was as unfailing as his judgment of measures.

MANY of the most sincerely afflicted mourners for the dead president were Democrats, and particularly Southern Democrats, who loved McKinley for his work in welding the North and South, and making one people of all. And it is especially worthy of note that such representative Democratic papers as the Brooklyn Eagle, the St. Louis Republic, the Washington Post and indeed all the truly respectable Democratic journals, join the Republican press in probation of the yellow Democratic organs such as the New York World and Hearst's string of indecent publications stretching from New York to San Francisco. Whether or not the assassin was egged on to his atrocious crime by the sensational slanders put in circulation by these leprous sheets, the fact remains and is patent that their senseless and malicious charges and insinuations are calculated to fire the imagination and nerve the cowardly hand of the anarchist. The people who read these papers do not stop to consider the mercenary character of the men who own them, nor do they understand that Hearst, for instance, whose papers are always arraying "the masses against the classes," is himself a traitor-magnate, a monopolist and millionaire, whose fortune came to him by just such means as those which his papers declare to be "monstrous." These papers are addressed to the comparatively illiterate classes, and because the illiterate classes are generally blinded by popularizing and breeding a contemptuous government that is next of kin to anarchy. It is but

fair to say, too, that if Bryan had been elected they would, from the same base motives that prompt the business office to murder character and sell papers, have been as vilely abusive of him as they have been of McKinley, and as they already show a disposition to be of Roosevelt.
