WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, OCTOBER 14th, 1901.

It is common talk in Washington that President Roosevelt is growing very weary of the constant demands for patronage which now take up so much of his time that he finds it almost impossible to reserve to himself the time necessary for the preparation of his forthcoming message. Already he has given notice that he will see no one after 1 p. m. and it is considered most probable that he will soon be obliged to exclude himself from the public entirely for at least a short period. This course has been necessary by several of his predecessors. He has further let it be known that he is opposed to any wholesale change of office holders and that he will not consider the appointment of incompetent or unprincipled men whatever may be their claims on the party.

In regard to the Isthmian treaty the President has expressed the wish that the particulars be absolutely withheld from the public until all the details have been completed and he has submitted the treaty to the Senate. A Cabinet Minister, who will not permit his name to be used, tells me that the salient points of the treaty have been agreed upon and that he believes they will meet with the cordial approval of the Senate and of the people, regardless of party, but that the details are carefully withheld by the President's express wish.

Those who are in a position to know say that portion of his message which treats of our relations with Cuba is giving him the most trouble, that while he desires both the prosperity and the good will of Cuba and realizes that the surest means of securing both would be by the admission, free of duty, of Cuba sugar, on the other hand he is most unwilling to recommend a course which would prove injurious to the Louisiana planters and mean absolute destruction to the best sugar industry. It is a serious problem and one will tax every resource of the President and his party in Congress.

It is regarded here as somewhat remarkable coincidence that although there are now in progress eight democratic campaigns in as many different states, Mr. Bryan has never been invited to speak in any one of them and in the case of the state of Ohio his offer to stump the state seems to be treated as an embarrassment rather than as a subject of gratitude. Does it mean that the Democratic party in these states has turned down the free silver policy? is the question asked on all sides.

Ambassador Choate is on route to Washington and rumor has it that, owing to the wide diversity of methods and views of himself and the President, it will be intimated to him that his resignation will not prove unacceptable. It is further rumored that ex-Senator Wolcott, of Colorado, will be offered the nomination. There seems to be little foundation for the rumor beyond the fact that Mr. Choate is not the type of man that Mr. Roosevelt would have been likely to choose to represent his administration at any important court.

Secretary Hay has hastened to assure the press that there is no truth whatever in the statement given out by Secretary Gage that he (Hay) contemplates resigning and says that he is sure that the Secretary of the Treasury must have seen misquoted.

Another factor in the fight for the New York apprenticeship has developed in the person of Mr. Conwell, of New York, ex-Secretary of the Interior, who is urging the appointment of Mr. William F. Waldman. If the President yields to Mr. Bliss's wishes it will be in absolute disregard of the wishes of a member of his Cabinet, Mr. Gage, who is urging the appointment of Mr. Whitehead.

The appointment of Dr. V. P. Clayton to the position of internal revenue collector for the Palmetto state came in the nature of a surprise as it was generally understood that Mr. Loomis Blalock was selected for that place. Little is known of the reasons that led to Dr. Clayton's appointment beyond the fact that Senator McEaurin has been seen at the White House recently and he is supposed to have had a talk with the President on the subject.

The Schley Court of Inquiry is still in progress and promises to remain so until the middle or last of November. It is a rather remarkable state of affairs that if the Navy Department, through Judge-advocate Lemley, prove their case against Schley they will at the same time prove the Bureau of Navigation guilty of the grossest neglect of its duty in not having, long before, court-martialed Admiral Schley on the charges of insubordination and cowardice. If Schley were all that Lemley has undertaken to prove he would be a disgrace to this service. A notable feature of the proceedings during the last week has been the absolute unanimity of the testimony offered by the very young officers who have been summoned before the court, all of it derogatory to Admiral Schley.

The London Athenaeum concludes a very complimentary notice of President Roosevelt with the statement that he is more of a man of letters than any president of the United States since Thomas Jefferson. But what a difference between "letters" in Jefferson's and Roosevelt's eras! The alphabet alone is unchanged.

An amusing story is being told in society of the plight in which Miss Florence Eoraker, daughter of Senator Foraker, of Ohio, recently found herself. Before her departure from Washington Miss Foraker interviewed her dressmaker, who was about to depart for Europe, and gave instructions for the purchase of a very elaborate wedding trousseau, preparatory to her marriage with Mr. Francis King Wainwright, of Philadelphia. Having given her order to a thoroughly reliable "modiste," Miss Foraker gave the matter no further thought until the time for the wedding began to draw near. Then she cabled to Paris and wired to Washington only to find that the dressmaker had fallen in love on shipboard and on her arrival on the other side had married. When Miss Foraker cabled she was spending her honeymoon in Switzerland and had completely forgotten Miss Foraker's trousseau. Consequently Miss Foraker was obliged to patronize home industry for her wedding outfit. She declares she will employ only aged and unromantic dressmakers in the future.

GOLD CHAIN ON HER ANKLE.

New Fad of the Golf Girl That Has Become Popular of Late.

A young woman living in New York has astonished her friends by the new fashion she has brought home from abroad. Around one of her ankles is linked a gold chain bracelet or anklet of heavy Tussen gold fastened with a turquoise amulet clasp, says the New York Sun.

This is worn outside the stocking and is plainly in evidence when a golf skirt is worn.

It would seem far too striking a fashion to find favor with women of good taste, but it is difficult to tell exactly what will strike the feminine fancy. Already a few of her friends have ordered similar anklets in gun metal and silver, of less elaborate fashion than that worn by the young woman, who brought the fad direct from Paris, where it was introduced by a Russian woman of title.

One of these anklets being observed at a Turkish bath patronized by women, the attendant was asked if the custom was general.

"A great many women," said the girl, "wear these chain bracelets, some above the knee and others at the ankle. I have never known of their being worn outside the stocking, however, as I have been usually called to assist the wearer to adjust the stockings over the anklet, sometimes a difficult task to perform without tearing delicate hosiery."

All summer long women have been wearing bracelets outside the sleeve and the new anklet fad seems to have originated in the new and rather pronounced fashion of exhibiting the bracelet. These odd fashions, however, have a short life on this side of the water, although they are carried to extremes abroad, especially by the fashion makers of Paris.

TOMB OF AN ANCIENT KING.

Objects of Archaeological Interest and Value Unearthed in Russia.

The grave of a king or chieftain who was buried at Seldin, in Russian West Prignitz, 3,000 years ago, has been carefully excavated and many bronze objects added to the provincial museum in consequence, says the New York Times. There are beads and cast bowls, iron pins, rings and knives of bronze, necklaces with enameled beads and bronze tubes and other objects belonging to the bronze age. About the large tumulus was found the only means of determining the age of the interment is the style of bronze objects and vase. German antiquarians believe that it belongs to a very early Teutonic race in northern Germany which practiced cremation, a race that was succeeded by a Slavic people, who in turn were driven out very generally by the modern German tribes. It is not a little remarkable that the farming population of Prussia is tending again to Slavia. The German-speaking people are emigrating or moving into the cities and manufacturing towns.




Women All Beautiful in 1901.


