WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, DECEMBER 23rd, 1901.

"Merry Christmas! Good bye Merry Christmas!" were the greetings heard on all sides at the Capitol on Thursday when Congress adjourned for the holiday recess. Many of the members wore sprigs of holly in their buttonholes and some of the more vainglorious had intertwined with the holly, bits of mistletoe. In the Senate and House "restaurant" large bowls of eggnog added to the atmosphere of Christmas cheer and on the desk of Senator Frye was a large wreath of holly and evergreen.

It was with a feeling of material satisfaction that Congress took its holiday recess this year for an exceptional amount of work had been accomplished and preparations had been made for the prompt consideration of many measures on reconvening. On Wednesday afternoon the Philippine tariff bill was passed by the House. On Monday the Senate had ratified the Hay Pauncefote treaty in the House. Representative Hepburn's Nicaraguan Canal bill had been reported and January 7th, the day after Congress will reassemble had been fixed upon for its consideration. It will come up on that day but will probably be under consideration for at least a week before it is finally passed.

Senator Morgan's bill for the same purpose had been reported favorably by the Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals and will be taken up on the floor of the Senate soon after the holidays; although it may have to give place, for a day or two, to the Philippine tariff bill which will come up from the House and the passage of which the administration is most anxious to accelerate. Already there are gathering in Washington men who expect to secure contracts for the canal and hope for a liberal share of the \$18,000,000 which the canal will cost.

I noticed about the corridors some gentlemen who are interested in best sugar and who are said to be in Washington for the purpose of preventing legislation which will admit Cuban sugar to the markets of the United States at less than the present duty. I asked a venerable Senator his lobbyists worked.

"Contrary to popular supposition," he said "the clever lobbyist does not offer these. That is a crude and almost useless method of procedure in Washington. I venture to say that the most liberal offers of money could not obtain tea votes in Congress."

The three most powerful weapons of the lobbyists are medals, "trades" and influence. The man who works through influence works outside of the Capitol and generally outside of Washington. He through personal popularity or in other ways, secures the friendship of men prominent in various parts of the country, men who can influence votes. These men are persuaded of the desirability of the measure which the lobbyist desires and they write to their Congressmen urging the passage of the measure as the reason may be.

Trades are simply an exchange of votes. Constituents are often unreasonable in their demands and expect their congressmen to accomplish the impossible. Now the man who is in favor of the erection of a postoffice, at Smith's Crossing, which his constituents regard as an extravagant waste of public money, will agree to vote for the passage of a bill granting a railway franchise on these grounds he can get a vote for his postoffice. The people back home will not care what he votes for on Mars but they will hold him responsible for that postoffice. The lobbyist frequently facilitates these trades. The third method of influence is usually employed in the case of legislation which would be detrimental to the lobbyist's principal. I will tell you a story as an illustration.

A number of years ago the Illinois legislature proposed to curtail the profits and compel greater consideration of their patrons by the insurance companies doing business in that state. The insurance companies immediately sent a lobbyist to Springfield. He offered no bribes and opposed no anti-insurance legislation. On the contrary he was loud in his denunciation of the insurance companies, emphasized the injustices they practiced and in every way facilitated and abetted every detrimental proposition. His efforts resulted in arousing a perfect furor of opposition to his principals. Finally the bill came up for passage and he played his trump card. "An amendment requiring the payment of life insurance within forty-eight hours in cases of death by suicide was before the House when a member, who had been worked up to the proper pitch of indignation, secured recognition and moved to amend the amendment, to include death from apoplexy, leprosy, etc. The motion was promptly seconded, carried and accepted by the Speaker. The edifice which followed all of the entire bill and the lobbyist had accomplished his purpose."

The recent resignation of Postmaster General Smith came in the nature of a surprise as did also the announcement that Mr. Henry C. Payne of Wisconsin, had been selected to succeed him. Mr. Smith resigns entirely of his own accord and will return to his former position as editor of one of the leading Philadelphia dailies. Mr. Payne, who has the reputation of being an excellent business man who is vice chairman of the republican National Committee, will assume the duties of his office about the middle of January. Mr. Payne will be the fourth Postmaster General to be selected from that state were William F. Villase, Timothy O. Howe, and Alexander W. Randall. As one looks back over the record it would seem that the Postmaster Generalship has very frequently gone to a Western man.

It has been announced from practically authoritative sources, that Lyman J. Gage, Secretary of the Treasury has resigned and that his resignation will take effect as soon as the President can appoint his successor. Secretaries Hay, Long and Hitchcock are the only men left in the Cabinet whose resignation is rumored and it is reported that Mr. Hay will remain if the President can prevail upon him to do so.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie has been to Washington again and has again lunched with the President. After he left it was given out that before Congress reconvenes he will have presented his generous gift of \$10,000,000 in a form that will be acceptable to Mr. Roosevelt and to Congress and it was rumored he had said that, if necessary, he will double the amount.


