## WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent)  
WASHINGTON, February 3rd, 1902

All of these diplomatic questions show, quite as much as the figures of our industrial progress, the fact that this country is not only taking a place among the world powers, long considered the prerogative of European countries alone, but is taking a commanding place. England and Germany are plainly bidding for our favor, and the strong disclaimers that are being made by every country of importance in Europe that it had no thought of interfering in the Spanish-American war, and indeed that it prevented the interference of other countries, show that the desire to propitiate the young giant of the West is an uppermost thought.

† † †

The last and the most brilliant of the card receptions of the season took place at the White House on Thursday evening when the officers of the Army and the Navy paid their respects to their President as Commandant in Chief, his wife and his official family. The decorations were artistic and appropriate. The flag was seen everywhere. The East room was particularly martial in its appearance, the windows being curtained with immense banners, the pillars wrapped with them and a mass of bunting arranged about the great chandelier, producing a pretty canopy effect. The ample folds of the flags were caught with ropes of similes and the mantels and fireplaces were banked with red and white azulejos. The long corridor was hung with flags of the "President, the Admiral of the Navy, the Secretaries of the Army and Navy, etc.

The receiving line was shorter than usual including, in addition to the President and Mrs. Roosevelt, Messieurs Root, Hitchcock, Payne and Knox. Mrs. Roosevelt was most becomingly attired in turquoise blue, a diamond necklace and a blue sash completing her costume. The dashing full dress uniform of the officers added brilliancy to the scene and the officers of the German ship *Moltke*, who were accompanied by the German Ambassador, added variety to the effect.

Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans was among the first of the Naval officers in the line and Mr. Roosevelt's greeting, which unfortunately failed to catch, caused a ripple of laughter to extend down the receiving line. General and Mrs. Miles arrived late and much speculation was indulged in as to the probability of their attendance. The meeting between the President and the General appeared to me to be as cordial as that between Roosevelt and any other officer. Notwithstanding the number of heroes present no person received more attention than Mrs. George Vanderbilt who was present with her husband and whose striking beauty was most effectively set off by a magnificent gown of white brocaded satin trimmed with pearls. She wore an armament of diamonds and rubies, which were greatly admired. Another young lady who attracted much attention was Miss Koto, the young Japanese girl who has come to this country to complete her education. She was present with Madam Tadahira and wore her native costume but had a white chrysanthemum in her hair.

After the reception Dr. Von Holleben and Miss Von Hebeir passed the wife of the naval and military attaché of the German embassy given a reception followed by dancing in honor of the officers and sailors of the *Moltke*, which was headed by Miss Roosevelt and other ladies of the Cabinet circle, and many of the American officers who had been seen earlier at the White House.

The leading social event of the coming week will be the marriage of Miss Helen May and Mr. Payne Whitney which will take place at high noon on Thursday next. Later

will come the corollary for the young people at the White House on the evening of the 11th instant, and then society will turn its attention to the coming of Prince Henry. The itinerary of the latter has been completed and officially announced. It will include stops, some of them very brief, at Annapolis, Columbus, Cincinnati, Nashville, Louisville, St. Louis, Chicago, Milwaukee, Buffalo and Niagara Falls, Rochester, Syracuse, Boston, Albany and Philadelphia in addition to Washington and New York.

The committee of fifty representative citizens, to which has been entrusted the arrangements for the G.A.R. encampment to occur in Washington next October, reports the most satisfactory progress. Subscriptions for the entire sum of \$50,000, which the committee will raise as an entertainment fund, have been received and \$25,000 has already been paid into the treasurer's hands. The formal invitation to the veterans has not yet been extended but will be at an early date.

Most of the work of Congress during the past week has been done in committee. The House of Representatives has passed a bill providing for a permanent census bureau and the Senate has enacted a measure providing for the establishment of a "Department of Commerce and Labor." The Ways and Means Committee has determined to report a bill abolishing the special war revenue taxes occasioned by the Spanish war. Nothing definite has been done in regard to the Philippine tariff measure which still lies on the Senate desk as "unfinished business." The question of reciprocal relations with Cuba remains in statu quo, the republicans having taken no measures and the democrats awaiting republican action.

At Friday's Cabinet meeting the President assured his advisors that he was unsatisfied in his contention for a 25 per cent reduction of the tariff on Cuban sugar and tobacco. He also issued a sweeping order regarding the use of influence to secure increases of salaries by government employees. He positively prohibits the solicitation of an increase of pay "either directly or indirectly, individually or through associations" and any "attempt to influence in their own interest any other legislation whatever, either before Congress or its committees, under penalty of dismissal from the government service." The order, if enforced, is likely to work an immense reform in the federal service.

Hon. John W. Ross, one of the commissioners of the District of Columbia, has made an appeal for civil service reform in the administration of the affairs of the District. He states that under the present system at least one third of the time of the commissioners is taken up "in listening to appeals for appointments," which Mr. Ross decries as most embarrassing to the commissioners and wasteful of their time. He declares that hundreds of appeals are filed for every vacancy and so feels confident that not only the commissioners but the Senators and Representatives would be greatly relieved were the offices of the District placed within the classified service.

An amusing incident happened Saturday at the Capitol. The chairman of the committee appointed to receive Admiral Schley at Nashville wired Congressman Gaines asking information in regard to the proper salute. Mr. Gaines posted himself in the Navy Department and wired back "A salute of thirteen guns with two ruffles and flourishes," the ruffles and flourishes referring to the part performed by the drums and trumpets. The chairman, however, did not understand and wired back "Please tell us what just means by ruffles and flourishes. We are not up on lingerie."

## A WEEK'S RECORD

All the News of the Past Seven Days Condensed.

### HOME AND FOREIGN ITEMS

News of the Industrial Field, Personal and Political Items, Happenings at Home and Abroad.

### THE NEWS FROM ALL THE WORLD

#### CONGRESSIONAL.

In the session on the 22d of December of 1893, the Senate voted the adoption of the Dingell act, which authorized the negotiations of reciprocity treaties with the time in a bill to appropriate \$10,000,000 for a permanent census bureau, to prevent the false branding or marking of ships, to prohibit the importation of heavy projectiles, to punish piracy, and granting a pension of \$5 per month to the last surviving member of the U.S. Marine Corps. On Oneida County, N. Y., aged 102 years. The republican members of the war and peace committee voted unanimously for the report of all the war taxes.

On the 28th bills were passed in the senate appropriating \$500,000 for improving the public building at Springfield, Ill., and \$10,000,000 for the joint state soldiers' and sailors' home. A joint resolution was adopted respecting the suspension of presidential electors, so that the president-elect should die before the time of his election, the bill for the creation of a permanent census bureau was passed and the ways and means committee reported a bill repealing all that remains of the Spanish war tax.

In the session on the 21st ult. a joint resolution was introduced in the United States proper and the Philippine Islands was urged by Senator Morgan of Alabama, who was in favor of the pending measure. The bill fixing the salaries of certain United States judges was discussed and it was voted that the president-elect should die before the time of his election, the bill for the creation of a permanent census bureau was passed and the ways and means committee reported a bill repealing all that remains of the Spanish war tax.

The public debt statement issued on the 1st shows that the debt decreased \$10,740,388 during the month of January. The cash balance in the treasury has \$23,750,046. The total debt less the cash in the treasury amounts to \$3,200,000.

The submarine torpedo boat *Hannibal* has been launched at Elizabethport, N. J.

John and Ed Biddle, the murderers who escaped from the Pittsburgh jail, died in New York on Saturday evening. Mrs. Sofield, was a critic in common. It transpires that the wounds of the three were self-inflicted.

Leahie M. Shaw has taken the oath of office as secretary of the treasury.

At Frankfort, Ky., Judge Cantrell presided over the trial of new trial in the Jim Howard case and sentenced him to imprisonment for life.

Gov. Taft, continuing his tour before the senate committee, said the situation in the Philippines depended upon the action of Congress.

Courier Hartz, a wealthy Chicago lawyer man, was shot and killed by Edward Coughlin, an employee, in a dispute over seven dollars.

Government receipts during January were \$46,529,143 and expenditures \$35,628,000, leaving a surplus for the month of \$8,900,000, against \$7,400,000 in January, 1901.

John D. Rockefeller has pledged a \$1,000,000 gift to Harvard.

Fire at New Haven, Conn., destroyed property in the business part of the city worth \$2,000,000.

Six thousand operatives are out owing to a strike at the American woolen mills at Oneonta, N. Y.

John A. Ladd, a textile company compares himself to Dennis White in the court's opinion in the Stevenson case in Chicago.

The railroad town of Clancy, Mont., has been nearly wiped out by fire.

At the close of business January 31, 1902, the amount of gold coin and bank notes was \$359,446,615, an increase of \$20,000,000.

Atlantic coast cities have been swept by a storm that did great damage.

The Chinese government refused to pay \$18,000 in salaries due foreign professors.

An arbitration board of preachers awarded a Baptist pastor at Portmouth, Va., \$200 for 202 sermons lost in a railroad wreck.

A St. Louis judge ruled in a damage suit against a railroad company that "smot" models must be accepted at their face value.

The sum of nearly \$1,000,000 was sent by postal orders from persons in the United States to friends in Norway during the year 1901.

Virtuous men are to be seen in America.

Admiral Schley's efforts to obtain the services of faith curists to call medical and for their daughter constituted no crime.

Andrew Carnegie made formal transfer of \$100,000 to the trustees of the Carnegie Institution, and Dr. Daniel C. Gilman, has been elected president of the institution.

The late President McKinley's birthday was generally observed throughout the country.

Miss Alice Roosevelt will attend the funeral of Mr. Whistler Reid.

Admiral Schley's appeal to the president from the decision of the court of inquiry has been made public by the navy department.

Col. Michael of Saratoga, N. Y., a noted gambler, killed himself. He was the fourth member of the family to commit suicide.

A highwayman who held up a farm near Lupton, Ind., was killed by the father of his victim.

Admiral Schley was given a reception and ball by the knights templar of Louisville, Ky.

The Carnegie institution has completed its organization by electing an executive committee.

James Howard has been convicted a second time at Frankfort, Ky., of complicity in the Goebel murder and given life imprisonment.

George Washington Lundy has filed a complaint in Schley's appeal, claiming he was in command of only one ship at Hampton Roads.

The first snow in the memory of the oldest inhabitant fell at San Diego.

Fire destroyed the Atlantic Hotel and other property in Norfolk, Va., the loss being \$600,000.

Judge Tuley of the U. S. Circuit Court for the District of Columbia has issued a writ of habeas corpus to the Zouaves to demand a re-examination of the Zouaves.

A detachment of 300 Japanese soldiers fought to death in a practice march over snow.

The exchanges at the leading clearing houses in the United States during the seven days ended on the 31st ult. aggregated \$2,157,123,942, against \$2,225,304,076 the previous week. The increase compared with the corresponding week of last year was 5.9.

There were 1,000 States in the seven days on the 31st ult., against 303 the week previous, and 202 the corresponding week of last year.

Lum You, a Chinaman who murdered Oscar Bloom at Bay City, Aug. 6 last, was hanged with Lucy, Wash.

An Atlantic Coast train was derailed by a sudden switch near Pontiac, Ill., the coaches overturned and five persons injured.

The amount of gold in the treasury on the 31st ult. was \$1,917,305, the highest that ever reached in the history of the government.

Admiral Schley arrived at Nashville, Tenn., where there was a repetition of the enthusiasm shown by other cities he had visited.

President-elect Palma of Cuba says anything less than a 50 per cent. cut on sugar duty means anarchy on the island.

One hundred miners were killed by explosion at the Hondo mines in Mexico.

Ambassador White called upon Prince Henry of Berlin and assured him of a cordial welcome to the United States.

J. Santos Zelaya has been inaugurated president of Nicaragua for his third term.

The empress dowager of China has issued an edict directing that the custom of binding the feet of women be stopped.

Heavy storms in northern Italy caused floods, in which 40 lives were lost and one village destroyed.

President Schlesinger has issued an order forbidding Federal employees from seeking congress to increase their pay, meaning the penalty.

A structure to cost \$7,000,000 is planned for the state department and department of justice at Washington.

Joseph W. Bailey and Robert D. Dall were killed at Portland, Ore., on the number of James B. Morrow November 14 last.

Some Loss of Life is Reported.

Life-Savers Work Heroically But In vain—French Vessel Lost Off Coast of Brittany and Twenty-one Perish.

New York, Feb. 4.—The first blizzard of the winter has struck Altoona and surrounding country. Temperatures prevail and the winds have been blowing hard in most places for the past 24 hours. The Pennsylvania railroad is feeling the effects of the blizzard. Its main line on the mountain west of here was blocked by drifts and it required the services of 100 men to keep the tracks open day. Many freight trains loaded with coal were held up in the snowdrifts and the men who had been working on them have been forced to sleep in their cars. It was not known up to midnight what vessels the men who had lost their lives came from. They might have been on either the barges towed by the tug Richmond, reported as passing without damage, or the steamer *Champlain*, which was lost in the night.

A circular letter has been received by members of the senate from Gen. Wood, military governor of Cuba, urging concessions on Cuban sugar coming into the United States. It is dated at Havana, Jan. 30.

In a fire near Wise postoffice in Monroe county, Va., Leahie, a infant child of Thompson Glover, was burned to death, two other children were perhaps fatally burned, but Mr. and Mrs. Glover, their son, their maid and a maid who had been trying to escape from their house.

Surgey is prevailing in and about Nome to an alarming degree. A great lack of all kinds of fresh vegetables is apparent. The poor of Nome are proving a heavy tax on the charity of the camp and the general welfare.

Since their father's return from the war, a cripple, Madge and Bennie had



In keeping away from the crowded streets little Madge soon reached the place where she and Bennie always stood.




