WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, March 31st 1902.

No important legislation was accomplished last week in the Senate. The first four days were devoted to the discussion of the anti-oligonarchic bill and on Thursday adjournment was taken until this morning. This does not mean, however, that the senators were idle, for a large amount of important committee work has been disposed of. Senator Lodge has practically completed the Philippine Civil bill and it will be reported to the Senate at an early date. The minority have outlined their views in what may be presented as a minority report or may be used merely as a basis on which to contest the passage of the measure on the floor of the Senate. Senator Proctor's committee has considered the advisability of presenting a distinct bill providing a tax on renovated or "process" butter and of amending the oleomargarine bill to the same effect. Senator Harris of Kansas, is the instigator of this movement. Senator Allison has been doing a large amount of work on the appropriation committee, there now being four appropriation bills which have been passed by the House but which have not yet been considered by the Senate. On Thursday, Senator Patterson of Colorado brought up the subject of General Funston's capture of Aguinaldo and read in support of the contention that the capture was not in accordance with the principles of civilized warfare, the major portion of a magazine article written by the General himself.

The House of Representatives passed the Army Appropriation bill with but one important amendment. That provides that the Secretary of war may call into active service those officers who have been retired for disability and have later recovered from such disability. The amendment is aimed at certain officers who have been retired and have later so far recovered as to be able to earn competencies outside of the service. On Friday the House devoted itself to the pension bills of which there were a great number on the calendar. Saturday was devoted to the consideration of a bill making various changes in the Revenue Cutter Service and to the consideration of the Sundry Civil bill, which will begin. This bill provides for a number of military and other parks, a large number of public buildings, etc.

On Thursday, Representative Richardson, the democratic leader, started the House by the introduction of resolutions calling for the investigation of certain charges of bribery in connection with the ratification of the treaty effecting the sale of the Danish West Indies. These charges were made in an alleged report of one Captain Christmas, a quasi-agent of the Danish government. Speaker Henderson appointed a committee consisting of four republicans and three democrats to make the investigation. On Friday the full text of the alleged report appeared in the Congressional Record and a careful reading conveys the idea that Captain Christmas, with a view to securing his reinstatement in the Danish army from which he had been discharged, came to this country to promote the transfer of the islands. He came with the conviction that political methods in this country were particularly corrupt and accordingly sought corrupt methods of effecting his ends. He appears to have come in contact with certain members of the "Third House," as the lobbyists are called, and they, leading him to believe that they could exert great influence with members of Congress, induced him to entreat them lavishly. His methods becoming known to his government, which had never officially authorized him to negotiate with the United States, he was promptly discharged and is now seeking to recover the funds he foolishly expended. The only serious aspect of the

situation seems to be that Secretary Hay received this man and at his suggestion permitted a representative of this government to accompany him to Copenhagen, where our representative immediately opened negotiations with the proper officials. The fact that Christmas introduced a representative of this government to the Danish Minister of Foreign Affairs seems to be the only valid grounds on which he can base any claim of having participated in the negotiations. If Secretary Hay was aware of the existence of Captain Christmas' report he may be open to some criticism for not having called the attention of the Senate to the matter before the ratification of the treaty. The members of both houses of Congress seem to be glad that the matter has been officially called to their attention as they believe that the investigation will serve to remove any shadow which the undisclosed report might have cast on Congressional action.

General Dick of Ohio has made his report on the new militia law in the House. Speaking on the subject the General told me recently that his bill had the approval of the President and the Secretary of war. "The bill provides" said the General, "that practically all able-bodied citizens between the ages of 18 and 45 shall be liable for military duty. The militia is organized into three classes, the organized militia, the national volunteer reserve and the reserve militia. The present national guard will be organized and equipped like the regular army and will be subject to the call of the President for a period not to exceed nine months. When so called they will receive the same pay and allowances as the regular troops and will be subject to the same discipline. The equipment of this branch shall be at the expense of the national government. The payment of funds to the different states and territories, which has heretofore been available only for equipment, will hereafter be available for any legitimate expense, but the militia must have fulfilled certain conditions in regard to drill, marches, encampments, etc."

"An important feature of the bill provides that officers of the militia, who shall have been nominated by the governors and appointed by the President, shall be entitled to a course at a military school or college, shall receive the same travel allowances and quarters as an officer of the regular army and subsistence at the rate of \$1.00 per day. Militiamen in the service of the national government will come under the same provisions in regard to pensions as the regular troops."

"Another provision of the bill authorizes the Secretary of War to enroll not to exceed 100,000 men, who shall have served in the national guard, who shall constitute a volunteer reserve, each enrollment to cover a period of five years. This reserve shall be next called into service after the national guard."

I WAS A DEADLY BLAST

Terrific Explosion in a Mine at Dayton, Tenn. Due to Workmen's Carelessness. Twenty-two Men Known to Have Lost Their Lives—Ten Dead Bodies Recovered—The Foreman's Disaster.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 1.—At 4:45 o'clock Monday afternoon an explosion of gas in the Nelson mine of the Dayton Coal and Iron company at Dayton, Tenn., ignited the dry dust in the mine and caused a terrific explosion...

Gas exists in the Nelson mine and the miners are required to use safety lamps. It is the rule of the company for the miners to place their lamps to be lighted for blasts just before quitting work each day, and there are workmen known as "firmins" who go through the mine after all the miners are out...

It is supposed that one of the fuses was defective and resulted in what is known as a "blow back." The flame shooting out from the mine ignited the gas which in turn ignited the accumulation of dry coal dust in the mine. The explosion that followed was horrible in its intensity...

The mine has been the scene of two serious explosions in the past. In 1889 four men were killed and eight seriously injured by an explosion of gas. December 20, 1895, an explosion of mine dust occurred in which 29 lives were lost. This was caused by a miner carrying an open lamp contrary to regulations...
