And the fact that this is an off year goes to prove that a majority of the voters are satisfied with the present administration and the prosperity we are enjoying.

Pine County gave J. Adam Harris a majority of about 400, but this is small considering the fact that he is a Pine county man, and should of received every vote in the county. It would have been no more than just for party prejudice to have thrown to the winds, and for grand old Pine county to show to the world that politics cut no figure when it came to supporting a home man.

Ton County officers for the next two years are practically the same as they have been for the past two, there being but two changes, viz: Robert Wilson succeeding Judge Veenhoven as Judge of Probate, and M. H. Hurley succeeding S. G. L. Roberts as County Attorney. Pine county seems to know the value of good men no matter which political party they belong to. And when they find one they stand by him, as is proven by their record in the past for whenever a good office has been found he has been kept in office for several terms.

The grand old North Star state swung into line again this year and showed by her vote on Tuesday that her citizens upheld Gov. Van Sant in his fight against the merger and now Jas. J. Hill, the Great Northern magnate, and the Northern Security Co., of New Jersey, can well shake in their boots, as the Governor knows now beyond a doubt that a large majority of the citizens of the state are with him and uphold his policy, and he will now fight them to a finish.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3rd, 1902.

The campaign is ended and everybody is awaiting with interest the result of the voting. The apathy which characterized the early days of the campaign has given place to greater interest as the elections approached and there is prospect of a reasonably heavy vote. The managers of both Congressional committees claim victory, although they are wide apart on their figures, and the majority of unprejudiced authorities in Washington look for a Republican victory but with reduced majority.

There was a scramble among the newspaper correspondents a few days ago for information in regard to the attitude of the United States of Colombia towards the construction of the Panama canal and as a result some very sensational stories were sent out of Washington. Subsequent events have shown that many of these were unwarranted. The State Department is now assured that Minister Concha has erred in judgment of the position of his government and, on the representations of U. S. Minister Hart, at Bogota, it is not improbable that this Government will complete the purchase of the Panama Canal Co.'s property without waiting for the formal ratification of the treaty in process of negotiation. Advice from authoritative sources in Bogota are now reaching the Department, which warrant the statement that complete concord will not be difficult of attainment. The surrender of Gen. Uribe Uribe and his return to Bogota, it is predicted, will soon be followed by that of General Herrera commanding the insurgent forces on the Isthmus and that will bring the insurrection to an end.

It is believed that with the restoration of peace, the claims of the United States will be promptly taken up and favorably acted upon and that actual operations on the construction of the canal can be commenced in the very near future.

try to the alleged discovery by Lieutenant George T. Emmons, retired, of the Navy, of certain boundary marks on the disputed line between Alaska and the British possessions. That Lieutenant Emmons may have discovered such monuments, buildings, etc., is not probable, as it is known that at one time the Russian missionaries penetrated at least 100 miles inland and established missions, many of them in stone buildings. These landmarks, however, no bearing on the argument between the United States and Great Britain. It is a matter of record that after prolonged negotiations Russia and Great Britain signed, in 1825, a treaty establishing the boundary along that section of Alaska which is now under dispute, at three leagues from the coast, this entirely irrespective of any previous arrangement or settlement. The United States interprets that agreement to mean 30 miles from tide-water. The rights of that treaty were purchased by the United States for \$7,000,000, in 1867, and all evidence calculated to establish other boundaries has no bearing on the case but is merely encouraged by the Canadian officials with the hope of belying the real issue. Secretary Hay perfectly understands the situation, which is as clear as could be any legal case, and he will not only pay no attention to such evidence as Lieutenant Emmons is now preparing to submit to the Navy Department, but he will never submit the matter to arbitration which usually results in the arbitrators concluding to 'split the difference' between the claimants. In this case the United States would have everything to lose and nothing to gain by arbitration and Mr. Hay will not take any chances.

With a determination quite characteristic of him, the President moved into the renovated White House last week. He said that between the architects and the contractors the renovation promised to last the rest of the winter and he had concluded to move in, whether the work was completed or not. He could settle in two minutes, if he was on the ground, questions that were now argued for days. He proposed to hustle the renovators from the chief contractor down to the laborers and he had been doing it. He stopped the work long enough to hold a little reception, shaking hands with all the men, and then told them that he was being put to serious inconvenience by the slowness with which the work was progressing, that he proposed to bring Mrs. Roosevelt back with him from Oyster Bay after election, and he wanted them to "hustle" and probably never was the work on a public building pushed with such energy as has been on the White House since. Every man feels that he is, in a way, personally responsible to the President to have the White House ready to receive Mrs. Roosevelt.

The alluring tales of quail and turkey which some Virginia gentlemen have been telling proved too much for the President and he determined to slit away and get at least two days shooting. Accordingly he ordered a special train and, accompanied by Secretary Root and Secy. Corry, he went down to the grand old place of Representative Bixby. Mr. Bixby's farm contains 1,900 acres, much of it located on the battlefield of Bull Run, and a large area has been permitted to run wild and is overgrown with sassafras and other underbrush. The turkeys and quail are abundant and when Mr. Roosevelt left Washington he anticipated some excellent sport. It was his intention to pass through Washington tonight and proceed direct to Oyster Bay, where he will cast his vote. He will leave Oyster Bay on Wednesday morning, accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, and will stop over in Philadelphia to assist at the sesquicentennial of the initiation of George Washington as a Mason. He will return Thursday morning to Washington and will then begin work in earnest on his annual message to Congress.


