Minnesota Cares for Blind.

The following letter of information has been received for publication from Jas. J. Dow, superintendent of the school for the blind, which is located at Faribault. It may not be necessary for any of our readers to send stricken relatives or friends to the institution, but if necessary further information can be secured from the above named gentleman.

The Minnesota School for the Blind is maintained by the State and furnishes board, tuition, and care, free of charge, to all blind persons of Minnesota between the ages of six and twenty-five years who are capable of receiving instruction.

The work of the school is conducted in three departmental literary, music and industrial. The literary department has an elementary course of eight years and a high school course of four years, corresponding to the course of study of the city schools of the state. In the music department instruction is given upon the piano and organ, the violin and other orchestral instruments, in singing, harmony, and in the art of piano tuning. In the industrial department training is given in broom, hammock and net making, in sloyd and reel work, in hand and machine sewing, knitting, and in various kinds of fancy work.

The school year extends from the middle of September to the middle of June.

A library department is maintained which furnishes raised print books to any responsible blind person in the state without charge for carriage of books going or returning.

READY TO OCCUPY

Is the New "Hotel Agnes"—A Credit to
Builder and Great Addition to City—
Leased by Annandale Parties.

The Hurley block has at last been remodeled into a big, up-to-date hotel building. The finishing touches are fast nearing completion and nothing will soon remain to inconvenience the traveling public that wish to make Pine City a stopping point.

Over four months have transpired since the work of remodeling the building was begun, and today nothing remains to show that it ever was anything but a building fit for the most particular and exact occupant.

The building has been leased by Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Tuelle, of Annandale, Minn., and they, together with their furniture, will be here tomorrow (Saturday). The work of setting up the furniture and arranging the rooms will occupy about a week's time after which everything will be in readiness for the reception of patrons. And providing calculations will carry right this will make the date of opening about September the 16th.

The Tuelles are experienced hotel people and come highly recommended to conduct the hotel in a creditable manner.

Geo. Reiss, a St. Paul contractor, planned the building and Mr. Hurley employed Henry Spahr to oversee the construction of the same. During its construction a big crew of men have constantly been employed and over \$10,000 has been expended in putting it in its present shape.

A large brick addition was built onto the rear of the building to within eight feet of the Volence butcher shop, and thus an eight foot alley way is allowed for the necessary traffic.

The basement has been cemented and virtually converts the structure into a three-story building; as the entire cellar will be made use of here to be found the boiler for hot and cold water, a boiler for the steam heating plant, a dynamo for pumping water, ice chests and storage room. On this underground floor will also be located the barber shop and a bath room, which has been leased and will be operated by Stephen Bordeaux.

The first floor has been modeled into a hotel lobby, reading and writing and sample rooms, dining, crockery and silverware rooms, wash room, kitchen and store room. From the lobby a hallway leads into the buffet, which has occupied the southwest corner room for a month or more past. Together with those rooms are a number of closets for different purposes.

Nearly the entire second floor is devoted to sleeping rooms and, as the plans dictated, twenty-five sleeping apartments have been provided. A very convenient and suitable bath room has been installed on this door and a wash stand has been placed near the head of the rear stairway which leads down to the kitchen way. A cosily arranged parlor is designed to occupy the northeast corner room, and from this a door opens, allowing guests to saunter out onto the large balcony. The balcony extends the entire breadth of the building on the front, and serves for a double purpose; it acts as a protection during rainy or snowy weather, and during nice afternoons and evenings its lofty structure offers an agreeable lounging place.

Each and every one of the many rooms in the large brick structure has been finished with a marked degree of taste in regard to painting, papering and woodwork, and the stairways are conveniently arranged.

A large double doorway leads from the lobby into the dining room and the front staircase leads either outside, into the lobby or into the dining room, as one may choose to go. Everything has been arranged to a nicely for the accommodation

of transients or steady boarders, or for employees, and we are sure all those who have occasion to stop at the "inn" will be greatly pleased with its up-to-dateness.

Mr. Hurley is to be congratulated for his enterprise in constructing so useful a commodity as a hotel, and the residents of Pine City should feel grateful to him for his public spiritedness.

For a Fishway.

The Pokegama Tuxedo Club, which is composed largely of men who fish, are vitally interested in the movement started by the Commercial Club of this place to have a fishway placed in the Chengwatawa dam.

They regard it as a sheer waste of money to stock the lake with game fish and then as soon as they are grown, open the dam and let them go down stream while providing no means by which they can return.

Fish are not steep climbers, and cannot ascend perpendicular heights through a few trickling drops of water.

It is a fact well known to fishermen that since the new dam was built many kinds of game fish—once so plentiful—have almost disappeared from the river and lakes above the dam, though seen in great numbers below the dam, which fact outweighs all the sophistry heard on street corners.

The law provides for a fishway that can be used by the fish, and it only needs a little energetic effort to secure action on the part of the Game and Fish Commission.

Section 17 of Minn. Game Laws, 1905, reads:

"Any person owning, erecting, managing or controlling any dam or other obstruction across any river, creek or stream within or forming the boundary line of this state, shall construct in connection with such dam, durable and efficient fishways in such a manner and of such shape and size that the free passage of all fish inhabiting such waters shall not be obstructed. Such fishways shall be maintained in such condition and kept in good repair by the person so owning, controlling, managing, operating or using such dam or obstruction."

Death Claims Two.

Frank Joseph Janacek died Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 6, 1905, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. L. Lahodney. His demise was due to old age, and kidney troubles, from which he had been suffering for eighteen months past. During the last week of his illness he had been considerably weaker, and death came as a welcome release.

Mr. Janacek was born in Pioneville, Moravia, May 10th, 1840. In 1868 he was married in Stephanov, Moravia. He and his wife moved to this country in 1888 and settled at Salem, Ohio, where he resided until 1899, when he moved to this place, where he had since made his home.

A widow and three children survive to mourn his death. They are Mrs. Lahodney, Bozena and Amelia Janacek, all of Pine City. A brother at Salem, O., also survives him.

The funeral will occur tomorrow (Saturday) morning at 9 o'clock. Rev. Koerner officiating. His remains will be laid to rest in Calvary cemetery.

Mrs. Nightingale died at her home at Pokegama last Wednesday, Sept. 4, at three o'clock in the morning.

Typhoid fever was the cause of her death, which resulted after a brief illness.

She leaves a husband, a child, a daughter, seven years old, and an infant boy, left to mourn her loss. She was a native of Elkhorn, Hennepin county, and had been a resident of this county for about six years. The funeral service will be held yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. George Parish officiating, and the remains were interred in Birchwood cemetery.
