TERMS OF PEACE

Japan Yields Disputed Points and Envoy Reaches Agreement.

No Indemnity for War Losses—Island of Sakhalin to Be Divided.

Formal Treaty Is Completed—A Synopsis of Its Most Important Provisions.

Cessation of Hostilities, Pending Ratification, Agreed Upon by Carr and Mikado.

Both Rulers Warmly Thank President Roosevelt for Bringing About End of War.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 20.—The long and bloody war between Japan and Russia is ended. The terms of peace were settled by Mr. Witte and Baron Komura at the seat of the conference Tuesday morning, and in the afternoon preliminary arrangements for an armistice were concluded, and the actual work of framing the "Treaty of Portsmouth" was by mutual agreement turned over to Mr. De Martens, Russia's great international lawyer, and Mr. Tani, who for 25 years has acted as the legal adviser of the Japanese foreign office.

For the sake of peace, the Japanese with a magnanimity worthy of their heroic achievements in this war, met the ultimatum of the czar and abandoned their demands, not only for reimbursement for the cost of the war, but for the repurchase of the northern half of Sakhalin, Russia at the same time agreeing to division of the island. The Japanese also withdrew articles 10 and 11 of the peace conditions originally proposed (demand for the surrender of the interned warships and limitation of the Russian naval power in the far east). Japan agreed that only that portion of the Chinese eastern railroad south of Chantou, the route occupied by Oyama, should be ceded to Japan.

Summary of Treaty.

Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 4.—The envoys of Japan and Russia have completed the work of making peace. The document only awaits their signatures and ratification by the czar and the mikado. The treaty contains 17 articles. It will be disappointing to the American public, perhaps, because it falls to contain formal recognition by the contracting powers of the principle of the equality of the nations. General Peace.

There shall be perpetual peace and friendship between his majesty the emperor of Japan and his majesty the emperor of Russia, and between their respective subjects who shall enjoy equally in the respective countries of the high contracting parties full and entire protection of their persons and property.

Japan pledges herself to maintain intact the integrity and independence of Korea. Russia recognizes that Japan has preponderant interests in that kingdom. Russian subjects and commerce shall have in Korea the right of the most favored nation.

Russia transfers to Japan, with the assent of China, the lease of Port Arthur and the Liaoning peninsula and islands covered by the lease.

Evacuation of Manchuria.

Japan and Russia agree to evacuate simultaneously the province of Manchuria, which shall be retroceded to the exclusive governmental and administrative authority of China. Russia surrenders all exclusive rights in Manchuria and agrees with Japan not to make any effort to acquire the future exclusive privileges of any kind. If China grant any concessions or privileges in Manchuria to one power, they will be enjoyed by other powers.

Agree as to Sakhalin. Russia cedes to Japan all rights and interest in the Chinese Eastern railway, including Port Arthur and Kwantung, and will not oppose construction of the Kirin branch. Japan recognizes Russia's rights in the trans-Manchurian line, and will take no action which will affect them. This line, as well as the Port Arthur-Kwantung line, shall be used only for commercial purposes. The two powers mutually agree to do nothing to prevent freedom of traffic over the line.

Russia cedes to Japan that portion of the island of Sakhalin lying south of the 41st parallel and accords to Japan the right of commercial and industrial exploitation of the island. The two powers mutually agree not to fortify the island and that the straits of La Perouse shall remain open to navigation without restriction or hindrance.

Russia cedes to Japan's subjects equal fishing rights with her own along the Siberian littoral.

There shall be immediate exchange of prisoners. Each power will appoint two commissioners, who will consent as to the cost of maintenance. The rules, when proposed, shall be examined and the difference paid by the power having the larger.

Commercial Relations. The commercial treaty in force before the war shall enter into operation upon the ratification of the treaty. Russia engages to enter into negotiations with Japan for a commercial treaty upon the basis of the most favored nation treatment.

The treaty shall be ratified by his majesty the emperor of Japan, and his majesty the emperor and autocrat of all the Russias, as soon as possible, and at least within 90 days after the date of the signature.

Carr Thanks President. Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 1.—News of the receipt by President Roosevelt of a cablegram from the emperor of Japan, congratulating Carr Nicholas, has put the pessimists to utter rout. Those who could see no prospect of peace at the end of the war, and those who Wednesday predicted that Russia would repudiate the terms and plunge again into war, have had the last word in their pessimism knocked from under them.

The cablegram received by the president at Oyster Bay is as follows: "Petioh, Alexandria, Aug. 31.—President Roosevelt: Accept my congratulations and warmest thanks for having brought the peace negotiations to a successful conclusion. I wish your personal energetic efforts, my country will gratefully recognize the great part you have played in the Portsmouth peace conference."

"NICHOLAS." Mikado Expresses Gratitude. Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 4.—President Roosevelt on Sunday received the following cablegram from the emperor of Japan: "Tokio, Sept. 4, 1905.—The president: I have received with gratification your message of congratulations conveyed through our plenipotentiaries and thank you very much for it. To your disinterested and unselfish efforts in the interests of peace and humanity I attach the high value which is their own, and assure you of my grateful appreciation of the distinguished part you have taken in the establishment of peace based upon principles essential to the permanent welfare and tranquility of the far east."

"MITSUHIKOTO." Armistice Agreed. Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 2.—An armistice has been signed to take effect after signature of the treaty. The delay cessation of hostilities was due to refusal of Japan to consent to earlier time.

STRANGE PHENOMENON.

Sudden Upheaval of Mountain in Mexico Causes People to Flee in Terror.

Mexico City, Sept. 5.—News from the state of Michoacan, Mex., says that a great volcanic upheaval threatens the city and valley of San Lucas. The people are fleeing in terror. The entire side of a precipice on a mountain called Cerro Dolores, about 200 feet square, suddenly took an upward movement and great masses of rock broken loose by the upheaval fell into the valley with a thundering noise. For 15 days the movement was plainly discernible.

Boy Makes Confession.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 5.—George Toft, aged nine, of McKeesport, confessed to the coroner here that he had thrown the stone into a Baltimore & Ohio passenger train at McKeesport on July 17 last which killed Albert P. Campbell, a resident of Chatham, V. A. The boy says he did not intend to do harm.

To Become a Spaniard.

Madrid, Sept. 4.—Spain have been taken for the Spanish naturalization of Prince Ferdinand of Bavaria, who will receive approval of Spanish rank in connection with the project for his marriage with Infanta Maria Teresa, youngest sister of King Alfonso.

The Public Debt.

Washington, Sept. 4.—The monthly statement of the public debt shows that at the close of business August 31, 1905, the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$1,052,824,000, which is an increase as compared with last month of \$2,475,894.

Veterans Meet in Denver.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 4.—The thirty-third annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic began in this city Monday. The city was crowded with veterans, and the trains were arriving from all directions.

EFFECTIVE WORK CONQUERS FEVER

PHYSICIANS DECLARE THAT THE CRISIS IN NEW ORLEANS HAS PASSED.

Believe Pest Will Be Completely Stamped Out Before First Frost Comes—Latest Record of Its Progress—Cases in Atlanta, Ga.

New Orleans, Sept. 2.—Signed statements of all the leaders in the fever fight, Surgeon White, Presidents Kohls and Souchon, of the boards of health, Dr. Beverly Warner, Dr. Metz of Tulane university, and Chairman Janvier of the citizens' committee, indicating that the crisis has passed, that the campaign of science is meeting with unbounded success, and that the fever will be practically forgotten by frost, were printed here Friday.

Contrary to all expectations, the fever is assuming a milder form at the period when it was expected to grow more deadly, and the deaths have grown in significant number. That is true not only of New Orleans, but at the various points in Mississippi where the disease has appeared. In the state there have been about 70 cases to date and only one death. Wherever there has been a heavy death rate, as at Leesville and on some of the plantations contiguous to New Orleans, it has been because the victims were Italians who either did not have or refused to accept medical attendance.

In carrying on the work here money has been expended with a lavish hand. More than a quarter of a million was subscribed by the state, city and citizens, but even this amount does not represent by any means the total expenditure. Of the expenditure of money have been expended by the volunteer ward organizations and many thousands more by the individual householders. The expenditure of money under the direction of the marine hospital service, Dr. Warner said that not a penny has been distributed that has not resulted in lasting good to New Orleans.

The Latest Record.

New Orleans, Sept. 2.—The yellow fever record up to six p. m. Monday is as follows: New cases, 58; total cases, 2,082; deaths on Monday, 5; total deaths, 29; cases under treatment, 321; cases discharged, 1,469. The hopefulness of the situation among the public at large was manifested in the fact that many viewed the labor parade Monday.

Spreading on the Gulf Coast. Jackson, Miss., Sept. 2.—Yellow fever is spreading steadily along the gulf coast. Five new cases were reported from Gulfport and two from Mississippi City. The removal of all military guards around infected points has been ordered, owing to the prevalence of the disease among soldiers, six of whom have been infected.

Disease Appears in Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 4.—A case of yellow fever developed here, and the patient, John C. Carothers, who came from Pensacola, Fla., August 31, is confined in the special detention hospital. There are a number of refugees in Atlanta, and more are pouring in on every train and further cases are expected. There is absolutely no fear of infection here.

Honored by the President.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 5.—President Roosevelt Monday afternoon announced officially the appointment of Robert B. Bacon, secretary of state to succeed Francis Pickens. The announcement was accompanied by the statement that Mr. Bacon would not assume the duties of his office for some time, perhaps not until the middle of October, after Secretary Root has become settled in the office of secretary of state.

Bent to Prison for Life.

Detrit, Mich., Sept. 2.—Frank Weckley, 21, of Detroit, who was charged with the murder of Joseph Meyer in his garret here July 28, and sentenced to life imprisonment.

THE ARCANUM RATES.

Supreme Council, at Put-in-Bay, O., Modified Action Taken at Atlantic City.

Put-in-Bay, O., Sept. 5.—The following statement concerning the final determination of the Royal Arcanum controversy was authorized by Supreme Secretary Robson:

"The laws were amended striking out option 'D' by a very decided vote. We also made options 'B' and 'C' applicable to the present membership only, and restricted new members to a selection between the regular rates and option 'A'. An amendment was also adopted for the reinstatement without new medical examination of members suspended since June 1, if they apply for reinstatement before November 1. The proposition to create a fraternal fund by annual contributions of 20 cents from each member, to be used in payments of assessments of aged members, was referred to an executive committee, with power to procure the necessary state legislation, the proposition being contrary to the laws of the state of Massachusetts. An amendment was also adopted providing that members over 65 years of age may pay only one-half of their assessments, and that the remainder may be charged against their certificates, deduction to be made when the benefits are paid. The supreme report was directed to act upon the reading of unauthorized circulars in the councils."

VESSELS ARE LOST.

Three Ships Known to Have Sunk in Lake Superior—Others Missing—Sailors Perish.

Duluth, Minn., Sept. 5.—The stories of shipwreck and loss of life that are beginning to come to shore prove that the gale which swept over Lake Superior Sunday and Monday night was the most destructive to life and shipping in years.

The schooner Pretoria, with five of its crew of ten men, was lost, and the schooner Olive Jeanette is believed to have gone to the bottom.

Fifty ships—steamers, schooners, and barges—are known to have been out on the lake during the gale. Many of these have not been reported, but all vessels arriving at Lake Superior ports report passing large quantities of wreckage of all kinds.

From 15 to 22 lives are believed to have been lost and the property loss will reach nearly half a million dollars.

Six persons who escaped in a boat from the steamer Savonia have reached Duluth. The bodies of Capt. McDonald and one of his crew were washed ashore at Sand Island.
