PINE CITY, Minn., Dec. 3, 1906. The common council of this village met at the recorder's office at 8 o'clock in regular session. The meeting was called to order by the president. Members present, Julius Dosey, President; J. M. Collins, Prochaska, and E. L. Wilcox, councilmen, and F. Poferl, recorder. The minutes of the meetings of Nov. 5th and Nov. 20th were read and on motion approved.
