## VILLAGE ORCHARD

Pine City Should Have About 10 Acres of Land Adjacent to the Village in Fruit Trees.

One day this week a gentleman of Swedish extraction in talking to a reporter of this paper said, it would be a good idea for small towns and villages to follow the same plan that Sweden has tried very successfully, i. e. that of having an orchard near by where the boys could go out and work.

He said that in the old country the orchard was placed under the supervision of a practical gardener and nursery man who took charge of the orchard and taught the boys.

We thought the idea a good one. If the village would get at least ten acres of land that sloped to the north, near town and set it out in fruit trees we believe it would be a paying investment in more ways than one. When the trees were small vegetables and garden truck could be planted between the rows of trees thus giving a revenue from the first year, and after the trees began to bear there would be no danger but what it would pay.

The gentleman who was talking to us said that the first objection that would be raised, would be that the boys would steal the fruit and destroy the trees. He said that he did not believe the boys in Pine City were any worse than the boys in Sweden or in the country. He said he knew of a farmer or a few miles from Pine City, that this fall sold over a hundred and seventy-five dollars worth of apples, and during the summer sold over a hundred and sixty dollars worth of small fruits, and this man has never had even one apple stolen.

If the boys knew that the village had purchased the plot of ground, and set it out with fruit trees, for their special benefit, instead of stealing and destroying the property, they would each and every one guard and protect it.

It is a well proven fact that Pine county is well adapted to the raising of small and large fruit, any one that doubts this should attend the annual fairs of the Pine County Agricultural society held at the fair grounds on the north side of Snake river every fall, and they will be convinced that we know whereof we speak.

Now if the people will look this matter over carefully, we believe that they will see that it would be to the advantage of the village, and would keep the boys out of mischief and also learn them how to raise fruit and garden truck.

**DAY TO GIVE THANKS**

GOV. EBERHART ISSUES HIS FIRST PROCLAMATION.

SETS NOVEMBER 25 AS THE DAY

Says We Have Abundant Material Reasons For Returning Thanks This Year.

St. Paul.—Governor Adolph O. Eberhart issued his Thanksgiving Proclamation, naming Thursday, Nov. 25, as the day of general praise and thanks. The document, which is the first by the new governor, reads:

"The people of this state are ever mindful of the sources from which come all their blessings. Conspicuous as they are, blending here the blood, the heart, and conscience of all that is best in old-world civilization, they approach the Thanksgiving period with sincere appreciation that 'All good cometh from on High.'"

"Of material reasons for spiritual thanking and praise there are abundant cause—our unity as a people, our enjoyment of peace, our increasing opportunities for educational advancement, our splendid school system that guarantees to every child the right to liberal educational advancement, our peaceful journey in the direction of higher ideals of civilization and society. These are blessings that our people will do well to remember and to raise their voices in praise and gratitude therefor. Let us each and everyone, whether in the quiet of our homes or in the places of public worship, give thanks to Almighty God for these, our privileges and blessings, and with fervent resolution and reverent mind let us justify the faith of our fathers by consecrating ourselves anew on this autumnal day to service in the cause of the Great Giver."

"Thankful, indeed, that the fire and good have not devastated our domain, that public health and public morals are both on a high plane, that our harvests are not only bountiful, but our products command a premium in the markets of the world, we of Minnesota should give thanks for these signs of the heavenly beneficence and devote ourselves to works of highest attainment, not forgetting that through service to others lies the road to individual happiness and the accomplishment of the ideal."

"Now, therefore, I, Adolph O. Eberhart, Governor of the state of Minnesota, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the laws of the state and the custom honored since the admission of the state to the union, do hereby appoint Thursday, the 25th day of November, in the year nineteen hundred and nine, as a day of general Thanksgiving."

"Done at the capitol in the city of St. Paul, this twelfth day of November in the year nineteen hundred and nine."

Sauk Center.—Governor Adolph O. Eberhart will address the Central Minnesota Editorial Association here on Dec. 3 on "The Newspaper as a Factor in the State's Development." Frank M. Eddy will also address the association. Editor Welles of the Sauk Center is in at Sauk center on an entertainment program, and the citizens are preparing a special welcome to the editors and their out-of-town guests. Business matters of vital importance to editors and publishers will be discussed and the social side will be amply provided for by the committee. The scope of the association was enlarged at the last meeting at Benjdji and the territory was increased. Originally this association was called together by a few editors on the Sauk center and Benjdji branch of the Great Northern railroad, to try and get better train service for the towns on the branch line, Long Prairie, Alekey, Park Rapids, Cass Lake, Walker, Brownville and Walker.

A public reception will be held in the Opera house, where Governor Eberhart will give his address.

**TWO FILE IN BANKRUPTCY.**

Mankato.—Ellis Parker, of Minneapolis, formerly of Mankato, filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy. He has been engaged in the elevator business, and gives his liabilities as \$24,899, and his assets as \$15,522, and \$6,900, stock, etc., \$1,220, and \$6,500 exempt. Lawrence J. Parker, of Henderson, an elevator man, also filed a petition in bankruptcy at the same time, with liabilities of \$2,252, and assets exempt.

**MOTHER AND FIVE PERISH.**

Husband and Father Builds Fire With Gasoline at Warroad.

Warroad.—Mrs. Nell Jensen and five children lost their lives, and Jensen, the husband and father, probably will die as the result of injuries sustained in a fire caused by a gasoline explosion. Jensen was starting a fire with gasoline. His wife was upstairs sick with a week-old baby and these, with four other children, had no chance to escape.

**WHEATON IS GRAND OFFICER.**

Minneapolis Man, Keeper of Records and Seals of K. of P.

Chicago, Texas.—To fill the vacancy caused by the death of H. L. C. White, of Nashville, Tenn., Henry C. Brown, supreme chancellor of the Order of Knights of Pythias, has appointed

pointed Fred E. Wheaton, of Minneapolis, and keeper of records and seals of that lodge. The appointment is effective at once.

**REFUND OF HIBBING FUND.**

Money Raised for Range Sufferers Will Be Returned.

Minneapolis, Nov. 12.—Sixty-one per cent of the money given by Minneapolis people for the relief of the sufferers on the Mesaba range, after the forest fire in September, 1908, will be returned to the givers. There will be 61 cents for each dollar given.

The committee, composed of B. F. Nelson, Perry Harrison, Geo. H. Partridge, W. S. Jones and Wallace G. Nye, has made its report, which showed that \$29,082.47 of the amount received remained.

The committee reported that within two weeks \$47,625 was raised. Of this amount \$20,000 was sent to the state commission at Duluth to be distributed among the sufferers. Early in October, 1908, E. T. Lies, general secretary of the Associated Charities was sent to the range to ascertain the actual conditions. He learned that all the money needed was already available.

It was not until October 23, 1909, that the affairs of the state commission, was made its report, which showed that \$29,082.47 of the amount received remained.

Of the money left, \$325.50 will be sent to the Associated Charities. This came from anonymous donors.

**THREATEN LIQUOR DEALERS.**

Wholesalers Said To Be Responsible in Indian Districts.

St. Paul.—The wholesale liquor dealers of the Twin Cities are threatened with prosecution by the State prohibition society if they continue to encourage the sale of liquor in the prohibited districts of northern Minnesota. W. G. Calderwood, secretary of the state prohibition committee, stated that in many cases the wholesalers are responsible for the violations because of their eagerness to sell liquor to the retailers.

"The wholesalers, whose places of business are not within the prohibited district, are just as liable as the saloonkeepers who purchase their liquor," said Mr. Calderwood. "The treaty state specifically that no liquor shall be sold or distributed within the limits of the territory described. This certainly means that the companies shipping in the liquor are liable. We of course intend to prosecute the saloonkeepers first, but when they are satisfied that the wholesalers are just as much responsible we intend to make them answer for it."

**STOCKTON MERCHANT ROBBED.**

Postmaster A. F. Swindler Loses \$800 in Cash.

Winona.—A. F. Swindler, postmaster in the village of Stockton, 10 miles west of this city, was the victim of a daring hold-up on the doorstep of his establishment, the robber securing \$800 in cash.

The merchant closed his store at 9 o'clock, after turning out the lights, and started in the direction of his home. At the corner a pistol shot fired up in the darkness a few inches from Swindler's face. The man fell and the hold-up man jumped upon him and took his wallet from his pocket. The victim got no description on account of the darkness.

**Two Boys Killed by Train.**

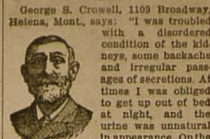

The crime for which the guilty man is to suffer the extreme penalty was the deliberate murder at Anton DeMoe last July. Rossi had an altercation with DeMoe earlier in the summer, procured a revolver and shot the victim, first shooting him through the heart and then stabbing him in the head. Both parties are well known to local Italian residents.
