## ANOTHER ROAD DIED HERE FRIDAY

### A Probability That Pine County Will Have Another Railroad Next Year. Soo Line.

For some time there has been talk in railroad circles of the possibility of another railroad crossing the northern part of the county. It has been reported for some time that the Soo System which recently gained control of the Wisconsin Central, wished to get to the head of the lakes and tap the northern part of the state of Minnesota. The extension of what was once the St. Croix branch of the Soo up into Northwestern Wisconsin was one step in this direction.

Under date of January 16 the Milwaukee Sentinel published the following special from Frederic, the present terminus of the Northwestern branch of the Soo:

"A large crew of surveyors in the employ of the Soo Line has been encamped in this village for the last month. The crew is making a complete survey of the surrounding territory trying to find the best line for the extension of the Frederic branch of the Soo Line, north to the head of the lakes. The surveyors are now about five miles northeast.

Although there is nothing definite to indicate the direction the extension of the road will take, the best founded rumors are that the road will probably be built northwest to connect with the Soo Line at or near Moose Lake, Minnesota.

It is known that some of the officials of the Soo Line have large land holdings in Pine County, and it seems likely that an effort will be made to reach this property by the railroad.

Rumors are persistent, however, that the road will run northeast and connect with the Wisconsin Central at Gordon or Solon Springs, Wisconsin.

### FIRE AT STILLWATER.

Fire broke out in the basement of the Schiek stone two-story double building at the corner of Main and Chestnut street about 7 o'clock Sunday morning. The loss is about \$15,000.

The fire started over the steam heating furnace and soon the first floor was burning briskly. The fire department was able to prevent the flames from getting to the second story but the first floor and the contents of that part of the building suffered heavily from flames and water.

The heaviest losses were to the St. Croix Drug Company and the John Caesar jewelry establishment.

The offices of Dr. E. J. Merrill and Dr. E. F. O'Donnell, the dentist, on the second floor, were damaged by smoke. The St. Croix Shoe company was also damaged by smoke.

The loss on the building owned by Mrs. Eliza Schenk of St. Paul is in the neighborhood of \$2,000.

All the property was insured. The amount of insurance on the building was \$5,300. The St. Croix Drug Co. carried \$5,000; John Caesar had \$2,250 on stock of goods and \$1,250 on store fixtures. Dr. Merrill carried \$800 insurance and Dr. O'Donnell, \$600.—Stillwater Gazette, Wednesday, January 18.
