### DELEGATES MEET AT HINCKLEY.

Pursuant to a call issued by W. R. McKenzie, Secretary of the Northern Minnesota Development Association, ninety-three delegates from the different towns in the county met in the L. O. O. F. hall at Hinckley last Friday evening at 8:00 o'clock. H. W. Harte of this place was elected temporary chairman and E. B. Lindsley of Willow River, temporary secretary.

In a very interesting talk, Mr. McKenzie explained the object of the association and told how much good it was doing in advertising the northern part of the state. He told those present that the association had exhibit rooms in Minneapolis and that all the counties in the northern part of the state were represented but Pine.

It was on motion resolved that a Pine County Development Association be organized to act in conjunction with the State Association, and that an exhibit be gathered to be placed in the booth reserved for this county at the Minneapolis exhibit rooms.

Geo. Empey, of Hinckley, was elected President, and Dr. James Slaven, of Sandstone, Sec. and Treas. Committees were appointed on Agriculture, Finance, Advertising and Emigration.

The meeting was one of the most enthusiastic ever held in this part of the state. The Commercial Club of Hinckley served a splendid banquet at the Phoenix Hotel at the close of the meeting. A great deal of credit is due the Commercial Club for the cordial manner in which they entertained the visiting delegates.

The majorities were all small, but when compared with the majorities the outgoing officers received at the election a year ago they are quite a gain. For example, last year R. L. Wiseman for Pres. received a majority over John Jelinek of 75, and Frank Poferi for Clerk received a majority over John Heywood of 68, and the trustees in like proportion.

FEBRUARY is the shortest month in the year, but it was busy every one of the twenty-nine days this time.

ROOSEVELT will find that he stirred up a hornet's nest when he clapped his hat over the presidential bees that LaFollette had in his bonnet.

It will be a long time before King Theodore the First is crowned in this country. No use in talking, the people will never stand for a third term even for a Rough Rider.

JUST to fill a long-felt want. That is why Theodore the First is again in the lists. But it is observable that the want exists only in the vicinity of Sagamore Hill. There will be one big lobster at Oyster Bay before this time next year.

There was never a President yet who did not make a good many enemies in his party during the first term and the trouble usually lies in the fact that he has an idea that he is the man the people elected to fill the office. The fellows who are fighting Taft just now are the men who thought they would be the whole smoke when the new president assumed the reins of office and the failures they have charged up against the present administration are principally due to the refusal of the administration to turn things over to them.

At any rate Governor Eberhart isn't a Clapp-tonnial. He is out with a declaration of loyalty to Taft and Republican principles. He is also a candidate for re-election and the people are with him. Senator Mose is going to be a rather lonesome figure in Minnesota this fall.

WHEN Roosevelt is elected on the platform he announced in Ohio recently we will see the dawn of the same era in American politics that Robespierre ushered in in French politics, but thanks to the good sense of the American people there is but little danger of such a calamity.

PERHAPS it is as well to have our March weather early in the month as it will clear the atmosphere for the spring breezes and it is just as well to have the blow out of bad politics at this time as it will clear things up for the national conventions in the summer.

The best thing that could happen to the country just now would be the uncorking of LaFollette's wrath as we would be apt to hear some news that would give the dear people some inside information as to how the country was to have been saved by these reformers. At the Chamber of Commerce Dinner in New Haven recently the President made one of his characteristic speeches in which he urged the business element to get in line with his administration for better business conditions. He said that the honest laboring business man would be protected but that the anti-trust prosecutions would proceed regardless of political consequences.
