## OFFICIAL ORDER OF POSTAL DEP'T.

### IMPORTANT TO PUBLISHERS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

We are in receipt of a communication from the Third Assistant Postmaster General, James J. Britt, calling our attention to the law which says:

"Copies sent to persons after one year from the date of the expiration of their subscriptions, unless expressly renewed for a definite time together with an actual payment of subscription or a bona fide promise of payment, will not be accepted at the pound rate but will be accepted at the transient second-class rate prepaid by stamps affixed."

Accompanying this communication is a request for a statement of the number of copies printed, number mailed to subscribers, number sold, number of sample copies, and asks:

"Of the number of copies mailed as to subscribers, how many were sent to persons whose subscriptions at the time of mailing this issue were in arrears more than one year and had not been expressly renewed?"

This statement must be signed and sworn to and returned to the Third Postmaster General, and the penalty for submitting any false evidence is punishable by a fine of not less one hundred dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.

To secure delivery of our paper by affixing postage stamps to each is prohibitive. The postal department will not deliver them to delinquent subscribers any longer at the pound rate. We have got to make a report of our list under penalty.

### PINE CITY AGAIN VICTORIOUS

(Sunday afternoon Hurley's Barringtons played the fast Minnesota Transfer team on the diamond on the north side of the river and defeated them by a score of 9 to 11. The Minnesota Transfer team is leading the Mercantile League of the Twin Cities, in which there are nine of the strongest amateur teams in the state. This is saying a good deal for the kind of a team Pine City has this year.

The boys have played four games this season and won them all. The first game played was with Mora, Pine City easily defeating that team by a score of 20 to 5. The next game was with the fast team at Cloquet and again the local team won by a score of 14 to 13. On the Fourth, the fast team known as the Flor-de-Knispela went down in defeat to the tune of 13 to 12, and on Sunday they defeated the Minnesota Transfer team by the score given above. Pine City certainly has a team of base ball players she can well feel proud of. The game Sunday was not patronized as well as it should have been and the team as a result went in the hole about \$14.00. If the citizens want to see games played here, they will have to turn out and patronize them or the boys will have to quit playing as they can not stand to go in debt every game they play. Pine City has the reputation of being a good ball town, and a good team, but unless they receive better financial support they will have to disband or play all games away from home.

Sunday there was some excuse for the crowd being so small as the weather was very threatening at about the time the game was scheduled to start, but those who did attend were well repaid for the time and money spent. Up to the seventh inning it was as pretty a game as anyone could wish to see.

In the first inning the visitors made one run and the local boys three. In the second the visitors were blanked and the locals added another to their score making four in all. In the third the visitors ran in three more, tying the score and it remained a tie until the unlucky and lucky seventh. After the locals had two men out, one from short to first and the other remaining, they fell on Cunningham for four safe singles, which with a man hit by a pitched ball netted five scores. This looked bad for the locals but in their half they fell on McMahon and batted out 8 hits and scored 6 runs which put them one to the good. In the 8th Cunningham struck out three batters that were up. The locals added another score making eleven in all. In the 9th Cunningham used the spitball and succeeded in putting out the first two men by throwing them out at first, the ball each time falling between the pitchers box and the home plate. The last man up struck out, finishing the game with the above score.

### COUNTY FATHERS MEET.

Auditor's Office  
July 8th., 4 p. m.

The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to law, all members being present. The minutes of the meeting of June 17th were on motion read and approved.

After due consideration a petition signed by Gustave Sanberg and seven others, asking for the formation of a new school district out of territory comprised in Districts 87-88-11, said petition was granted and ordered placed on record.

The petition for the formation of a new school district out of territory comprised in District 5 was laid on the table.

Three bids were offered for the construction of bridge no. 371 across Willow River on State Road no. 1 in sec. 24, T. 45, R. 18. The bid offered by the Great Northern Bridge Co. was accepted.

A resolution was unanimously adopted transferring the sum of \$1500 from the County Poor Fund to the County Road and Bridge Fund, and the sum of \$1000 from the County Revenue Fund to the County Road and Bridge Fund.

The Auditor was instructed to advertise for proposals for the construction of that certain part of State Road no. 1 lying south of the bridge across Mission Creek, and north of the south line of sec. 27, T. 40, R. 21.

\$10,000 of the County Road and Bridge Fund was proportioned among the Commissioners to be used on the roads in their districts.

By a resolution unanimously adopted the sum of \$350 was transferred to the credit of the Incidental Expense Fund.

The following taxes were levied upon the taxable property of Pine County: For ordinary County Expense, Revenue Fund \$25,000; For support of Poor \$4,000; Bond Interest \$1,000; For General Road and Bridge Fund \$10,000.

Board adjourned to meet July 16th.

### MRS. NEVILLE INJURED MONDAY.

On Monday morning Mrs. Mary Neville, who resides south of here, was struck by an automobile and seriously injured. The machine was driven by the owner, Henry Rolf, who resides on a farm some two miles southwest of this city.

The accident occurred early Monday forenoon and happened when Mrs. Neville attempted to cross the street to the Rybak store. Mr. Rolf had transacted some business matters about town and was about to start for his home. The machine was standing in front of Sanser's Hardware store when he started and when he turned the corner was running at perhaps four or five miles an hour. Had no one called Mrs. Neville would have passed on in safety, but at the sound of the warning call she stepped directly in front of the approaching car. Mr. Rolf had turned to miss her but the fact that she stopped made the collision inevitable.

The impact carried Mrs. Neville perhaps twenty-five feet and when she reached her she was in an unconscious condition. Kind hands carried her to the office of Drs. Tofta where she has been closely watched by nurses and attending physicians. Upon examination it was found that her skull was fractured and that she had suffered internal injuries.

The past couple of days have witnessed a slight change for the better and it is sincerely hoped that she may recover.

Her daughter, Mrs. Koop, of Brainerd, was sent for and arrived Tuesday morning accompanied by her husband, Misses Julia and Lucy who are visiting relatives in Eastern Canada, were also sent for, but at this writing have not been heard from.

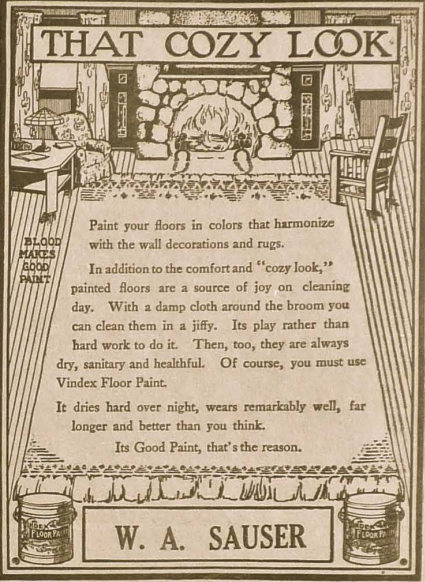
