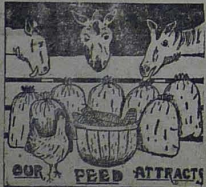

FROM PINE CITY TO SAN FRANCISCO

Commander Eaton, of the Duluth naval militia has just received orders from the naval department to take the Duluth companies and the company to be organized here next Thursday, during the coming summer by special train to New York city, where they will be put aboard of a battleship, go down the Atlantic coast to Florida, through the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean sea to the Panama canal. The battleship the boys will be on is to be the first ship to go through the canal. After passing through the canal they will go up the Pacific coast to San Francisco and from there home.

It is expected that it will take between four and five weeks to make the trip. Every expense will be paid by the government and the boys will receive \$1.50 per day during the time they are absent.

This will be a trip well worth taking, and the boys will see sights that if they did not join the militia they would, in all probability never see, to say nothing of having the honor of being on the first ship to go through the big ditch that no country but the United States and United States engineers could dig.

If you want to be one of those to take this trip, be sure and be on hand next Thursday morning at 9 o'clock in Stekl's hall when the company will be organized.

Pine City, Minnesota, Jan. 24, '13

The State Legislature has elected Henry Rines, of Mora, Speaker of the House, and is grinding out considerable good legislation.

CLARENCE S. DARROW, who was before the courts on the charge of having bribed a juror in the McNamara case, is up again on a similar charge. It is said that the present case will occupy much less time than the former, which lasted for 69 days, after which he was acquitted.

The reception given by Gov. Eberhardt and wife in the rotunda of the State Capitol on Thursday evening, Jan. 24th, was one of the largest and most pleasant events ever occurring in the State Capitol. The large building was filled to its utmost capacity and the crowd was very orderly, considering the number of people that were in attendance. Two policemen formed the many people in couples in the west corridor and in this way they proceeded slowly to where the Governor, his wife and attendants were standing, where each one reached the Governor and shook hands with him, he introducing them to his wife, who in turn introduced them to the attendants, then they passed out of the east corridor. It is estimated that over four thousand people took this opportunity to shake the hands of the Governor and his wife.

The Naval Militia that is being organized at this place will, if it materialize, be one of the best things for the town, and young men of the town that we could possibly get at this time. It is something that every young man between the ages of 18 and 45 in the town and surrounding country should try and get into. If it materializes, it will in a short time mean an armory here costing \$11,000 and this alone is an item that should not be overlooked, as it will be a place for the members to lounge in, being equipped with a gymnasium, which is one thing this town is sadly in need of, a shower bath, reading room, and last, but by no means least, a large floor space, that when not in use for drill, can be used for indoor sports, dramatic entertainments and parties of all kinds. There have been about one hundred of our young men signed as candidates, and the Council at a special meeting, held Saturday evening, passed a resolution to furnish a hall for the company to drill in, which was required before further steps could be taken. Let every citizen put his shoulder to the wheel and make the undertaking a grand success and push the enterprise along so as to let the government and state know that we mean business, and we can have the armory before next winter.

The evening service will be a union service at the Presbyterian Church. Sermon by the pastor.

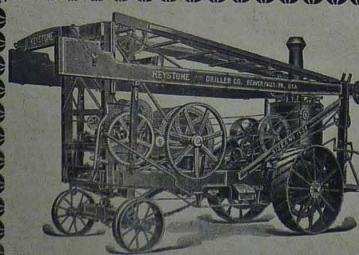
The Sunday school meets at 9:45. Let us keep up the attendance during the absence of our former Superintendent.

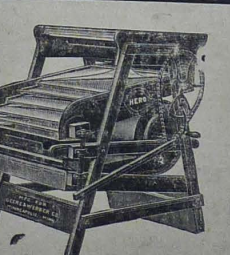
