Both Mr. and Mrs. Fairbanks are well known here and the Poker joins their hosts of friends in best wishes for all the happiness that life can afford them.

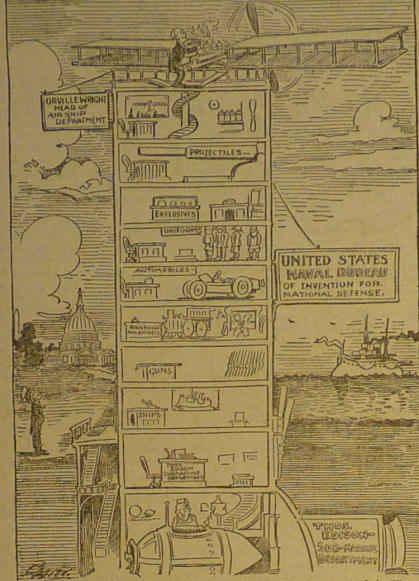
Button Factory to Operate Again

The Pine City button factory—the Madden factory—resumed operation last Saturday after a year's shut down owing to the unmanufacture satisfactory and qualified help can be obtained, the factory will probably continue in operation throughout the coming year at least for steadily they have on hand enough shells to insure operation for that length of time.

At present four men—Tom Fitzgerald, Jim Cherry, Fred Cherrier and Raymond Hoeller—are cutting and three more will be put on as soon as possible. A good cutter can make about \$2 a day.

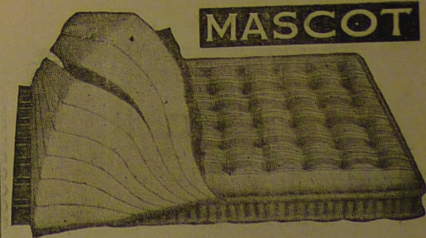

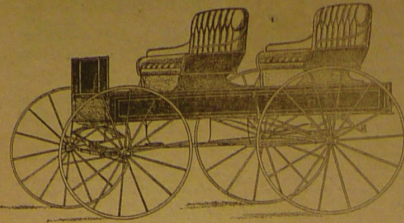
