Pine City Will Be Liberally Represented at Educational Affairs

John Curtis will open school in District 1 at Hustletown next Monday.

Miss Ella Lahody will teach at Beroun, her school beginning Sept. 13.

Miss Laura Cole will begin teaching in the Backley school, southwest of town on Sept. 13.

Miss Winifred Daley expects to leave Sunday to attend the St. Cloud Normal school the coming year.

Miss Louise Wilcox will teach near Sturgeon Lake, though her school will not open until next month.

Phillip Hamlin began work the first of this week at New Ulm where he teaches science in the high school.

Miss Myrie Fisher leaves tomorrow or Saturday for Owatonna where she will teach languages in the high school.

Miss Stella Babcock will leave tomorrow or Saturday for White Pine where her school will open on Saturday.

Misses Margaret and Julia Hurley intend leaving Monday for Duluth where they will attend the Villa Scholastica.

Miss Helen Bede has been engaged to handle the work in district 47, northwest of town, where school begins on Sept. 13.

Miss Julia Rybak expects to leave next Wednesday for St. Catherine's college at St. Paul, for her second year's work.

Rudolph Wosmek is busy with the county exhibit at the state fair but will again take up his law studies at Minneapolis, soon.

Miss Anna Chapin left yesterday for Minneapolis to take up the study of music in the Northwestern Conservatory of that city.

**Elwell Road Petition Allowed**  
The county commissioners met in the court house at 10 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and granted the petition of the taxpayers along the route of the proposed Elwell road from Sandstone north, along the Great Northern railway line.

The matter now goes to the State Highway Commission for their approval and the next step will be to dispose of the necessary bonds of the county, amounting to about \$65,000 or \$75,000. Thereafter, bills will be advertised for and the road built. It hardly looks as though actual work could begin before next spring.

The commissioners gave the matter a thorough hearing and it was about five o'clock before final action was taken.

Arguments were made, both for and against granting the petition but probably the most interesting was the one by undertaker, who was made to the effect that if the petition was not granted tonight cause the removal of the court house. This was very interesting since the Pine City county only has two of the five commissioners.

There was quite a large attendance from along the proposed road with five autos and 15 voters from Askev two autos and about 10 from Bruno 2 from Kerriek and 1 from Nickerson.
