Auditor Directed to Advertise For Bids on Building New Vaults, etc.

The county commissioners were in session at the court house Monday afternoon and Tuesday forenoon, and adjourned until next Wednesday when a short session will be held.

A resolution was passed authorizing the issuance of \$4,000 of bonds to care for expenses in connection with the building of new vaults. They will bear 5 1/2 percent interest and the owners of benefited lands will be taxed on the interest and principal.

A petition, signed by Gust Westman and 9 others, was received for a new school district to include the north half of the town of Arline, in the Hinckley district, and the south tier of sections 42-19, in the Sandstone district. Hearing will be held Aug. 21.

Roads Are Much Better

Trip Over Pine County Shows a Great Improvement in Condition of Roads

Road work is progressing as rapidly as the weather will permit in various sections of the county. A trip by auto to the north end of the county, the first of the week, the editor of The Poker saw, first hand, the effects of the work in all directions. Brother Colby of the Sandstone Courier seems afraid that The Poker's subscription contest will take some subscribers away from him. We believe and hope that he is mistaken. The Courier is such a good paper for that part of the county that people there would be foolish to stop it, even to take The Pine Poker. "The biggest and best paper in Pine county." The same thing holds true of all the other towns in the county in which home papers are published. But maybe there are a lot of people over the county who do not take any paper at present—even Brother Colby will admit that they should take some county paper—or, maybe, they do take their local paper and would also like to get the news from other portions of the county. Those are the folks The Poker wants on its subscription list—and we're getting them. Maybe we're the "roast" as Brother Colby says, but we're going to let the other fellows do the chewing of the rag.

We understand that the Chautauqua contract for next year's program already bears 75 cents and that half a dozen more are promised. This probably makes a representative guarantee of the entire community—at least it proves the interest of a large number of representative men in the local Chautauqua. In the opinion of The Poker it is vastly more satisfactory and beneficial to make this sort of thing a "community" rather than a sectional or class affair. No country was ever well developed without building its trading center, and vice versa. The more the men in town are taken into the confidence of the country people and those in the country taken into the confidence of the town people, the more satisfactory will be their mutual relations and the more extensive their mutual benefits. We believe that the right kind of a Chautauqua at Pine City is a matter of interest and benefit to the community—then it is a matter in which the entire community should take a hand. Pine City not only needs the men on the farms—it ought to want to advise with the men on the farms public matters.

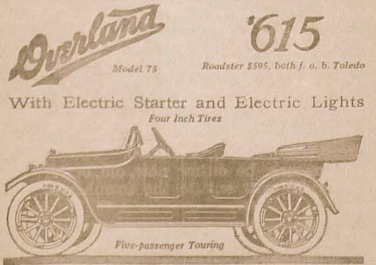
