

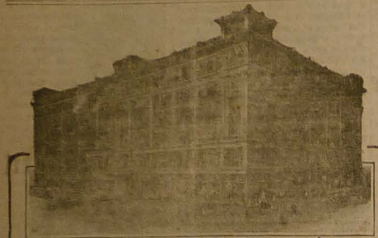

### Cars From Every Section Will Join Booster Trip to State Fair

Full details as to the proposed Auto Advertising trip to the State Fair, Wednesday, Sept. 6th, 1916, are as follows:

Leave Pine City not later than 8:30 or ten o'clock a. m. Stop at Rush City 10 minutes, music by the band. Stop at North Branch 30 minutes, where arrangements have been made for a light lunch, such as coffee, sandwiches, and doughnuts. Stop at Wyoming or Forest Lake 10 minutes, music by the band, stop at White Bear, 10 minutes, or long enough for all cars to line up, music by band. Arrive at Fair Grounds about 3:30 or 4 o'clock, where a tour of the grounds will be made. Pine County will be given by five feet have been placed on every car, small pennants of Pine County will be worn by all in the tour, several thousand cards or small booklets, advertising the many advantages of Pine County have been printed, and a supply of these will be given to every car, the occupants to pass them out as freely as they can, and where they will do the most good. that the plant has been purchased by the Clognet company, but that is not the case. By the new arrangement, the Kettle River Co. has leased the plant and in return will pay a fixed rate for all current they consume.

For several years they have been confronted by the proposition of being short of power during the long stretches of winter in the river, but under the new arrangement a wire will be run here from the Clognet line north of town, which will supply enough power for the operation of the quarry to its full capacity at all times of the year. The change will make no difference to the Sandstone users except that they also will be guaranteed all the light and power they need at all times.

Supt. L. P. Runkel of Clognet is here to look after the details and now has a crew of about 15 men and a motor truck busy on the construction of the transmission line when they expect completed in about a month.—Sandstone Courier, Aug. 24.

SCANDINAVIAN NEWS

SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS IN PART OFF NORTHLAND. ITEMS FROM THE OLD HOME

Resume of the Most Important Events in Sweden, Norway and Denmark—Of Interest to the Scandinavians in America.

DENMARK. The landing of the upper house of the Danish rigting, met as a committee of the whole to consider the treaty providing for the sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States...

Thousands of Swedes were induced to emigrate to Brazil in 1914. It did not take them long to realize that they had made a sad mistake.

A large number of Lapps in Fomrønne and Dikana have sent a memorial to the king asking him to grant them a concession of land.

The political situation that has come into existence as a result of the Danish West Indies question is so tangled that it is not clear what the politicians venture to predict.

King Christian of Denmark recalled the members of the political parties in the right wing of the rigting and delivered an address which is quoted as follows by Reuters Copenhagen correspondent.

SWEDEN. The Germans started a factory in Sweden for turning out paper made up of two thin films of ordinary paper with a film of rubber between them.

The chief of police of Stockholm has stated that there are about 10,000 foreigners in Stockholm. Russian Jews are the most numerous.

It has been proved that by using electric energy from the power station of the city of Stockholm one can save \$800 a day.

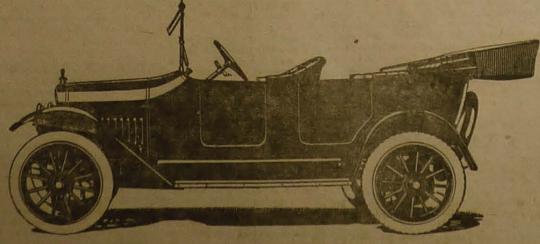
