They Want Good Roads

Enthusiastic Meeting at Hinckley Declares For Good Roads in Every Town

The "Good Roads" meeting at Hinckley, Monday evening, was one of the most liberally attended and one of the most representative gatherings ever held in the county.

But they want better roads—principally they all wanted better "east and west" roads for the farmers and townpeople to get and keep in touch.

From every corner of the county the echo came to get this money now, while the getting is good, and then turn public attention to the "leasers" that shall open up every corner of the county and give everyone a good road to haul and travel on.

The delegates present expressed themselves in favor of bonding the county if necessary for the completion of other badly needed roads aside from the State road.

On motion it was unanimously carried that the chairman and secretary be instructed to send a telegram to the State Board of Control asking that Sandstone be selected as the site for the State Trading school for women.

Since that meet Ramsey county has appropriated \$10,000 to assist Chicago and Pine counties and it is understood that the amount will probably be doubled.

All the villages along the line of the road are planning to levy the limit of ages to assist in raising the pot and townships will also do their share.

Court Ends Tomorrow

By Continuing Some Cases Sight Is Caught of End of the Term

Court convened on Monday afternoon, following the week-end recess and has been working hard this week to insure a clean up of jury cases before adjournment, since Judge Nethaway must open court at Center City next Monday.

The case of F. E. Smith of Superior against the G. N. Ry. for personal injury claimed the attention of the court right up to the time of recessing on Friday afternoon. The jury was sent out at 2 o'clock and within 3-4 of an hour had reached a verdict of \$20,000 damages for the plaintiff, only two ballots being taken.

The case of Emily Skevnek against Adolph Philip of Willow River was continued over the term. The case of Doyle against the Rock Creek school district to recover the value of the heating plant installed in the school house, has been put at the foot of the calendar and may be continued, dismissed or tried.

The case of Jack against O'Malley, growing out of the replevin of lumber sold to defendant at Rutledge, went to the jury Monday afternoon and they gave the plaintiff judgment for the full amount sued for—\$999.10. The jury was out four hours.

In the case of Winewick against Ed Olson of Sturgeon Lake to recover \$5,000 damages resulting from the death of plaintiff's son, who was claimed to have been run over by an N. P. train as a result of drunkenness caused by the use of liquor supposed to have been secured at Olson's saloon, went to trial Monday afternoon and occupied the attention of the court until Tuesday afternoon when, testimony being all in, the court directed a verdict for defendant on motion of his counsel, because of lack of authority of plaintiff to bring the action.

In the case of Pontikes against Frank Millern, the Henriette (Iverson) man, to recover for injuries resulting from the alleged use of a knife by Millern in a fight at Henriette, this last summer, Pontikes was given a verdict for \$500. The fact that Millern transferred his property to his son just after the action was commenced was brought

in the trial and may have injured his case before the jury. The case of Chairman Mottaz of the Dell Grove town board against Marchant Davidson of Friesland for slander resulted in a verdict for the defendant after the jury had been out over an hour, late yesterday afternoon.

This morning the court took up the case of Lawrence Olebrack of Sturgeon Lake, charged with arson. There are a swarm of witnesses and the case will hardly be finished before tomorrow—Friday.

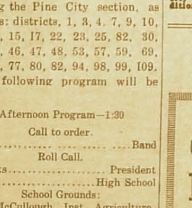
