George Is Mistaken

Cunningham Accuses a Friend of Trading His Opinions For a Small Job

Friend George Cunningham of Sturgeon Lake, who is running for the legislature in this county against Friend Adolph S. Larson of Sandstone, writes a long article, published in his paper at Sturgeon Lake, in which he claims that The Poker is opposing his candidacy.

He seems to think that we committed a sort of "lese majesty" in mentioning that possibly some Republicans were interested in seeing a Republican elected as a member of the legislature from this county. Maybe George is right. We published it as a presumption—we know it to be a fact. But maybe George is right, even at that—maybe the truth ought not to be known about these matters. That is entirely a matter of opinion.

He said that The Poker said a few weeks back about the probable reason for the interest of some Chicago county citizens in Pine county was because we "probably figure it a good investment that may again land that clerkship."

It is very apparent that he does not know anything about what the editor of this paper was named as one of the committee clerks of the state senate of two years ago. Again, even if what Mr. Cunningham thinks about the matter were correct, it would be equally as fair and just—and vastly more true—for us to report that George is jollying the people of Sandstone about their magnificent school house, lap-dodging John T. Craig of Hinckley on his good judgment and political sense, and variously cajoling other people and localities in the county, just to get their votes at the election so that he may get a chance to boss some of the Pine county patronage in state affairs. If it were fair for George to assume the one thing which was not true, our friend will certainly not object to our assuming the other conclusion which is so apparent. And, anyway, why should George be so sorry that Pine county was once recognized in this way and afraid that she would be again? If we could not get the chance to do the work ourselves we would be glad to see our Friend George do it if he would, and could.

Did Friend George intend to threaten us when he said: "You have smacked me out. In doing this job, hope you don't get in the predicament of the fellow who thought to smoke out a coon and a skunk came out of the hole," and "Here's hoping The Poker's wireless don't quit working and Howard get torpeded in the stern." We have heard Friend George accused of "bulldozing" and "threatening" people whom he thought were opposed to him, but we have never believed these yarns. Have we been mistaken in our judgment of him? Is he really a "bulldozer"?

These thoughts are prompted by our old friend's statement, above referred to. They are honest and we sincerely hope, will do him no unjust injury. We feel a strong personal friendship for Mr. Cunningham and should have liked to have done so with Representative Larson under fire for doing the very things that we would have had him do in the state legislature—on County Option, the Blue Sky law, and various other important and needful legislation—while Mr. Cunningham has apparently studiously refrained from committing himself in this campaign on these very questions.

The Poker, however, has aimed to be strictly impartial, fair, between Mr. Cunningham and Mr. Larson. It has said some good things, which it honestly believes,

about each of them, and has not resorted to any intentional knocking on either side.

And, finally, whether Friend Adolph or Friend George should be elected, the editor of The Poker will ask no political favors from either of them. If, perchance, we should be again accorded the senate "clubship" to which Friend George refers, we want it to come because we did and can and will do the work well—not because The Poker supported or excused anyone at any time. We told this to Friend Adolph two years ago. Now we repeat, and likewise tell Friend George.

Court Adjourned Yesterday
Court set Monday forenoon, Judge Nethaway presiding, for the trial of non-jury cases. Owing to the continued work on the vaults at the north side of the court house, the session was held in the village hall as during the regular term. The calendar was finished up to Tuesday evening and the term closed yesterday afternoon.
Divorces have been granted to Carl Hauke of Willow River against Ellen Hauke, charging desertion; Elizabeth Pflaggerman against Jacob Pflaggerman formerly of Sandstone, charging desertion; and Louise A. Zack against Emil P. Zack of Willow River, charging cruel and inhuman treatment, in the latter case the plaintiff getting the decree without alimony, costs or attorney's fees.
The case of John Anderson against Emma S. Price and others of Brook Park town was continued to Nov. 16.
A motion was argued, Tuesday, for a new trial in the case of Joseph Wunswick against Ed Olson of Sturgeon Lake for damages resulting from the death of her son, claimed to have been brought about by drunkenness caused by liquor sold by Olson. The case was tried at the last term of court but the plaintiff being without proper authority to bring the action, the court directed a verdict for defendant. The motion for a new trial was taken under advisement of the court.
Some land title cases were tried and the land case of Anderson against Markham was on trial when court adjourned to Nov. 16, though the latter case will be finished at Stillwater on Jan. 5.

Big Rally at Hinckley

Senator Clapp and Lowell Jepson to Speak at Rep. Meet There Monday

A monster republican rally is planned for Hinckley to close the campaign in the county next Monday evening—the night before election. United States Senator Moses E. Clapp and Hon. Lowell E. Jepson, Republican candidate for congress from this district, will speak. There will probably be large delegations present from all parts of the county.

Senator Clapp has always been a general favorite in Pine county and his friends from all directions will want to hear what he has to say. He has been busy speaking in Wisconsin and parts of this state the past couple of weeks. He is an eloquent and forceful talker and will be eagerly listened to.

Mr. Jepson is also well known to our people, who will be anxious to hear what he has to say before election.

Court House Additions Enclosed
Contractor Joslin expects to put the roofs on the vault additions to the court house the last of this week and will have all outside work completed before the middle of next week. He would be able to complete the work entirely before Dec. 1 but for the advisability of waiting longer to give the concrete work more time to set before the false work is removed.

E. Z. Mark Buys a Circus
While in the cities this week Emmet Mark purchased the big Barrett & Zimmerman circus, including the 59 trained horses and performing ponies, 19 trained Spitz dogs, 22 wagons, big tent and everything belonging to the circus with the name, good will and contract of performers, trainers, etc. He plans to ship the circus here

and perhaps give an exhibit on our next Market Day, which will fall on Nov. 11 or on the 18th. This circus showed during the summer at Duluth, Superior and Range towns and has been a popular attraction for many years past, and will be improved and brought right up-to-date, by Mr. Mark for the next season.—Willow River Farmer.

TEUTONS HURLED BACK FROM RED TOWER PASS

Falkenhayn's Attempted Invasion of Roumania is Failed, London News—Austrians Lose 25,000 Men. London, Oct. 14.—General von Falkenhayn's attempted invasion of Roumania through the Red Tower Pass on the eastern border has been thrown back several miles into Transylvania, Bucharest dispatches reported that General von Falkenhayn's advance had been checked everywhere along the southern Transylvania frontier. On the eastern frontier, the Germans have been stopped on the Rumanian front wing and thrown back by a series of strong counterattacks. Elsewhere the Rumanian resistance is stiffening.

CARRANZISTAS DEFEATED, JOIN FELIX DIAZ FORCE

Thousand De Facto Troops Declare Themselves for Leader of Revolutionists, Dispatch Says. Laredo, Oct. 15.—The thousand de facto government troops who were defeated at Tepic on October 6, joined the Felix Diaz movement, according to seemingly reliable information reaching the border. This information says a column of five thousand troops, under the command of General Jose Robles, set against the revolutionists, declared themselves with their leader, Diaz, and another column of equal strength commanded by General Cesario Castro likewise deserted.
