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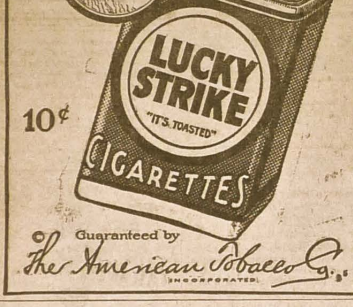

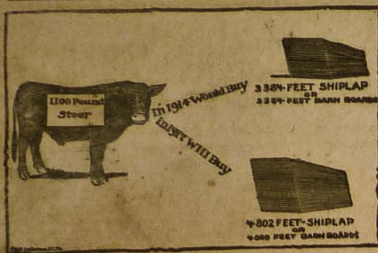

FINANCIAL CONDITION IMPROVES

The report of Clark Buirece of Pine City village, published in The Pine Poker last week, contained much of interest to every tax payer in the village. It showed the following figures:

Total orders issued during year..... \$8,910.37
Cash received during year 8,228.67

Ord. issued in excess of receipts..... \$ 681.70

Total orders issued during year..... \$8,910.37
Orders issued for sewer work..... 4,608.00

Orders issued for general exp..... \$4,302.37

Cash received during year \$8,228.67
Orders issued for general exp. 4,303.37

Net saving during year \$3,926.30

In the above figures we have purposely given first a set of figures that shows that the village has gone into debt \$681.70—someone would think he had "discovered something" if he ran onto that.

But, \$4,608 of these orders were not for money spent at all but was, rather, for money advanced to tax payers for sewer construction in the east part of town and will later be paid back into the treasury, by the people whose property was benefited—not by the tax payers as a whole. And, since the total issue of orders was \$8,910.37 and \$4,608 of these represent not an outlay but a loan, it is evident that the expenditures for general village purposes was only \$4,302.37. And, if the total cash income of the village was \$8,228.67 and the general expenses of the year were only \$4,302.37, then the net saving by the council during the year (remembering that \$4,608 will be returned by those to whom it was loaned) was \$3,926.30—nearly \$4,000. A similar saving this year, together with repayment of the \$4,608 advanced for sewer will more than clean up the \$6,269.29 of floating indebtedness and leave the village on a cash basis with only \$20,000 of water bonds and \$8,000 of sewer bonds outstanding. The fact that the village is obligated to contribute \$5,000 toward the new bridge over the river, however, is not taken into consideration in the above figures. But the general survey of the situation shows clearly that the council has greatly improved conditions in the village the past year. Another year or two of the same treatment will put us on a cash basis and allow lowering the tax rate.

There is considerable lack of understanding as to how and when a school flag should be displayed, and for the benefit of everyone—for we believe there are few who know exactly what should be done—The Pine Poker quotes the following from a letter received by the school board of district No. 69 from Assistant State Supt. P. C. Topping on the subject: "There is no state law or regulation prescribing the hours of the day during which the flag is to be displayed. The only provision of the law is that the flag should be displayed outside the building on every legal holiday occurring while the school is in session and at such other times as the respective boards may direct. At all other times it shall be displayed within the principal room of the building. It would not be contrary to any law or rule, then, to leave the flag up day and night, but because of the wear and tear on the flag it would seem wise to leave it up at all times. If displayed outside during the day it should be taken in when school closes in the evening. On all public buildings or in the service of the United States, the flag is always lowered at sun down."

Editor Colby of the Sandstone Courier, who is awfully sore because we knocked him out of his share of the "meag" in the county printing graft, thinks he has the laugh on us because we turned over our Sandstone home—

The death of Attorney General Lyndon A. Smith of St. Paul, following a paralytic stroke, takes from the service of the people of the state a thorough gentleman and an able and conscientious official. To know General Smith was to admire and like him. He never played favorites—he treated a humble citizen from up-state with the same kind consideration that he did the governor of our commonwealth.

The program was excellent and greatly enjoyed by everyone. Following the banquet tables were cleared away and games enjoyed until midnight. There were about 50 present and it was rated one of the very pleasant social events in Pine City in a long time.

now occupied by the Duxburys.

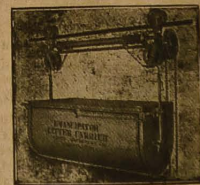
