Big Event at Hinkley While Another Picnic Will Be at Pokegamme

The June first conditions and acreage of wheat, oats and barley in Pine county compares very favorably, considering the conditions in our county with other parts of the state.

Our acreage of wheat compared to last year is 180 percent, oats 115 per cent and barley 110 per cent and their condition is 96, 95 and 97 respectively. Compared to the state as a whole we are making a good showing. The average increase of wheat over the state is 22 per cent, oats 1 per cent and barley 4 per cent. The small increase in oats and barley is due to the very large increase in the acreage of wheat.

State's Revenue Increased
Interest received upon state funds in the hands of Henry Rines, state treasurer, for the year ending May 1, 1918, amounts to \$170,721.95, an increase of \$60,259.78 over the previous year. Some of this increase is due to an increase in funds, but the greater portion is due to larger deposits having been kept in the inactive banks which pay three per cent interest as against two per cent in the active or checking account banks.

If the whole Canadian army are as full of pep as he is it is a mighty good thing for Germany that all of the soldiers over there are not Canadians.

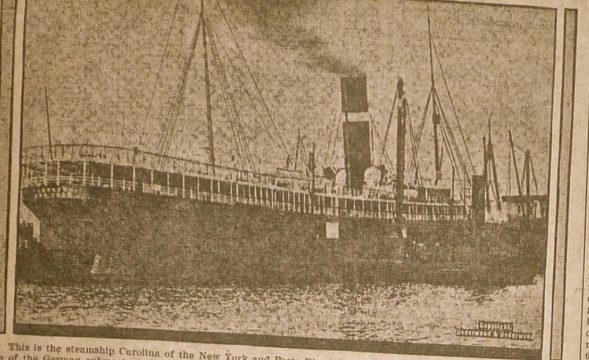

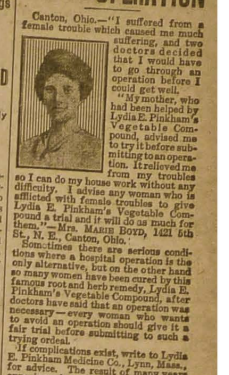

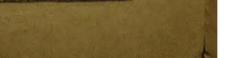

Further evidence that fish obtained a place in every diet was observed from a recent series of digestion experiments in the United States department of agriculture...

In the experiments Boston mackerel, Atlantic salmon and grayfish—a variety not generally used in this country—were made into "fish loaves" and served as a basis of a simple mixed diet to young men of healthy appetites...

Both the protein and the fat of the fish were well utilized. Following the percentages of protein digested: Boston mackerel, 83.3 per cent; butternut, 83.3 per cent; grayfish, 82.2 per cent; and salmon, 83.2 per cent. The percentages of fat digested were found to be: Boston mackerel, 82.2 per cent; butternut, 83.3 per cent; grayfish, 84.3 per cent; salmon, 83.7 per cent.

In addition to the fish loaf, the diet included potatoes, crackers, fruit, sugar, and tea or coffee. On the average the subjects each ate 440 grams of Boston mackerel, 471 grams of butternut, 440 grams of grayfish, or 455 grams of salmon...

The department recently has completed an investigation of the commercial freezing and storing of fish, and a bulletin on that subject says that this method of food preservation holds them for many months in the condition in which they were received, but will not deteriorate...
