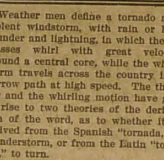

### The Farmers Creamery Pine City, Minnesota



A mighty effort is being made to get Mayor Power of Hibbing into the gubernatorial race as a candidate of the Labor unions and the Nonpartisan League, but we have not any idea that it will succeed for Mr. Power is too far seeing a man to be caught "between the upper and the nether mill stones" as anyone would be should he succeed in being elected by those factions. There is no more similarity of thought or purpose between the "walking delegate," who controls the labor union, and the successful farmer than there is between the millionaire and the anarchist.

If there is one class of business men who ought to be licensed and bonded it is the garagemen. A man puts his car, valued at from \$200 to \$2,000, into a garage for repairs and is immediately completely at the mercy of the owner of the plant, who, sometimes at least, employs cheap, incompetent help and charges expensive, professional prices for their time besides inconveniencing the owner as much as it is to have their car having one bit of a "come back." Thank the Lord, Pine City garages do not qualify in this class—but there are some of them scattered about.

There is going to be a scarcity of coal in the northwest and, as people must have some thing to keep them warm, there will be an increased demand for Pine county wood. Producers of wood are entitled to a reasonable price but they are no more entitled to a large profit than are the coal producers of Pennsylvania or elsewhere. A man hasn't got to be a millionaire to be a proffiter.

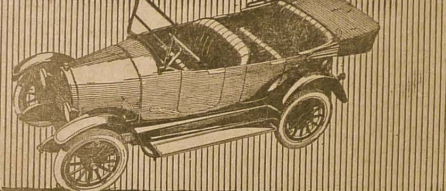

The annual school election, last Saturday evening, aroused considerable interest, 148 votes being cast, which gave Jos. F. Petschel 85 votes, B. P. Tilden 71, J. J. Maden 65, W. A. Sausser 61 and J. H. Wehrle 24 and resulted in the election of Petschel and Tilden. Treasurer Madden's annual report and also the report of Clerk Hoyje were read, showing that Mr. Madden handled \$15,000.00 for the school during the past year and had on hand at the time of the meeting \$18.51. The reports showed that there were outstanding against the district for the amount of \$16,236.46 but this will be cut to about \$10,000 this week by the receipt of tax money from the county. Everything considered, the district is now about \$2,250 better off in its financial condition than it was a year ago, though it still owes about \$10,000 on orders outstanding and \$23,000 in bonds which were voted by the district for the high school building. The total cost of operating the village schools last year was \$20,192.07 of which \$13,170.35 was for teachers; \$2,179.82 for fuel, water and light (including 100 tons of coal on hand); \$346.86 for text books; \$874.77 for school fixtures and equipment; \$86.15 for improvement on building; \$261.93 for upkeep of grounds etc.; \$1,983.90 for janitor's wages and repairs; \$146.11 for library; \$256.02 for sundries and \$1616.29 for general expense, such as freight, drays, insurance, etc.—the latter amounting to about \$700, being paid for a period of three years.
