

Services might be released for the use-of the government or for work in other channels, due to the practice of issuing free service corpon books and service cards causing innecessary work—a great majority of which is of minor character, such as adjustments, etc., which the owner can make himself—should be eliminated as a very material saving of man power will be the result.

SUNDAY WORK! Practically all of the mechanical work done on Sundays is occasioned by the use of cars almost entirely for pleasure.purposes and is usually emergency service on the road. A proper curtailment of this Sunday service will bring about a material saving of labor and release mechanics. The closing of both new and used car salesrooms and discontinuance of Sunday demonstrations is particularly urged

Obstrations is particularly diged.

NIGHT SERVICE! A substantial saving of mechanics' time can be made by the elimination of all-night service except where absolutely necessary for cars used in actual essential pursuits, including work on commercial vehicles in use for commercial purposes and on trucks which may require attention. It is entirely practicable that emergency work be handled at some designated shop, thus releasing a large amount of labor now occupied in keeping open numbers of establishments.

ESTABLISHING CASH BASIS! It has been demonstrated that the cash basis for labor, parts and supplies is of great economical value as it eliminates a lot of unnecessary work, reduces clerical work, office maintenance and eliminates losses.

work, office maintenance, and eliminates losses.

Education of Users! Users are not properly informed regarding the handling of their cars, thus making demands for service and unnecessary work extremely great. If a user is urged to keep his car properly equipped, to see that his tools are in order and all there, that his jack is in working condition, that his extra tire and tube equipment is in proper repair, a large amount of nanecessary mechanic's time will be saved, as investigation shows that a large proportion of the road emergency work is occasioned because the user's equipment is not in proper condition so that he can take care of his road repairs himself.
