Governor Burnquist on Saturday



County Dads Met Monday

Federal Road Being Graveled at Both Ends of Pine County

County Commissioners met Monday, all members being present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The board granted the formation of two new school districts. One from dist. 90 in Arlene town, and one from dist. 85 in Crosby town.

The board voted to let go off school districts, one from L. P. Jacobson of Partridge and one from Frank Womela of Pokegama. Hearing on same was set for Sept. 13.

Nim C. Roos, manager of Northwest Tel. Co. at Piney, put in an application for a franchise for his lines in Finlayson, claiming that they are used exclusively for telephone purposes and therefore exempt from assessment. The board recommended referendum by Tax Commission.

Engineer Buckley was directed to order road machinery consisting of road building and traction engines. The planers to be used in leveling the roads will run on portions of the Federal highway which is inclined to be way as it is traveled on.

Anton Erickson, engineer of county ditch no. 9, filed his final report, and a committee will inspect the work Saturday, Aug. 24 at 9 a.m.

The committee will be directed to notify the town boards of Pokegama, Mission Creek and Rock Creek to issue orders payable to county for aid subscribed towards construction of Federal highway.

Committee appointed to inspect the application of Pinayon & Co. on the Federal highway filed a report accepting same. The report was adopted and auditor directed to draw his order for the balance unpaid.

Committee recommended that Robt. Doran of Rock Creek be paid \$20.00 for damage done to his land by the Federal highway, where the new road north of Rock Creek joins the old road, west of the track.

There were a number of bills allowed.

Board adjourned to meet Sept. 13th next.

Pine County Food Regulations

No rules have been issued by the food administration on the marketing of the 1918 wheat crop and the owner of wheat raised in Pine County is at a loss as to what he desires. The announcement is made by the state food administration in answer to many inquiries on the subject from throughout the state. For the present at least the farmer will enjoy the same choice as to marketing his wheat and all of his cereal crops that does not normally exist.

The food administration announced this week county and local food administrators may permit grocers to sell extra sugar to farmers where they have extra crews for harvesting and threshing on the basis of August 2 lbs. for every ninety nine bushels harvested.

Permitting the use of beef, which permitted the serving of beef but once each day in public eating places and purchase of not more than 11-4 pounds of clear beef per person per week in the household, have been removed upon order from Washington. Drought in the southwest has made it difficult to catch cattle and to catch and market a large quantity of light weight beef, creating an unexpected surplus which permits the removal of consumption restrictions.

Heavy beef animals are still particularly desired for use in furnishing meat to the army abroad and the people are urged to favor the light weight animals.

The general policy of conservative meat consumption is still advised by the food administration.

August sugar-for-eating regulations provide up to 10 pounds for every member of the household, less whatever sugar a person has been previously obtained this season for canning purposes.

In a household, hotel, or any other institution where there is a per capita sufficient to justify the purchase of more than 100 pounds of sugar for canning, the O. K. of the county food administrator is required before any such sugar can be sold. One hundred pounds or less may be bought upon signing certificates with the retailer, but where more than 100 pounds is required the county administration must approve

the sale, first assuring himself that it will be used for canning and for no other purpose and that it will be used in August or previous month.

The lending of meat sufficient for a family is an act of thrift and one to be commended, is the statement of the federal food administration for Minnesota.

The food administration will not interfere in any way with the custom that has existed for years, among some people, of killing some of their home grown animals and curing the meat for their own use during the winter, and any individuals killing and curing a supply to meet the needs of the family for the winter need have no fear that the supply will be confiscated.

County Fair Coming Next Month

Preparations are being pushed to make the Pine county fair, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Sept. 13-14, one of the best fairs ever held in the county. The new fire-proof live stock and poultry building is in completed readiness with wire tops, sheep and poultry having nearly found accommodations that they have ever had. The main building will be replaced, we understand, by a big tent, this year.

The big day will be Saturday, Sept. 14, which is planned for "Patriotic day." Governor Burnquist will be present to deliver a patriotic address. A military band will furnish music and plenty of entertainment will be provided to have the Hinckley, Rock Creek and Pine City home guards present for the grand opening.
