# GREAT WORLD OVER GERMAN ENVOYS ACCEPT ACKLED TERMS OF TRUCE

### Brief Official Announcement Is Made by State Department at Washington.

## JOY REIGNS AT BERLIN

### Capital Receives Tidings of Kaiser's Abdication With General Manifestations of Approval, Tempered by Fear for the Future.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The official announcement is made by the state department at 2:50 a. m.

There was no announcement as to whether hostilities had ceased or the hour at which they would cease.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The world war ended this morning at six o'clock Washington time, 11 o'clock Paris time.

The department's announcement simply said: "The armistice has been signed."

## AUSTRIAN SOLDIERS KILLED

### Many Lose Their Lives by Trains on Way Home.

Innsbruck, Austria, Nov. 11.—Bavarian troops have occupied the railway stations here.

## FOR GERMANS ABROAD KAISER DECIDES TO QUIT RULING

### Prince Max Appeals to Them Not to Lose Faith.

Chancellor Says People Have Won Big Victory Over Their Belief in Right of Might.

London, Nov. 11.—Prince Maximilian, just before tendering his resignation to Germany's imperial chancellor, issued an appeal to Germans abroad.

"The difficult days of the German fatherland are surrounded by manifestations of malicious joy and hatred, will be heavy.

"Our soldiers have fought to the last moment as heroically as any army has ever done.

"In the fifth year, abandoned by its allies, the German people could no longer wage war against the increasingly superior forces.

"From this victory we shall draw new strength for the hard time which will come and on which you also can build."

## GLAD YANKEES WERE THERE

### Italian Foreign Minister Thanks U. S. for Congratulations.

Washington, Nov. 11.—Giovanni Sottani, foreign minister of Italy, replied to a message of congratulations sent him recently by Secretary Lansing.

"I am in receipt of the gratifying telegram which you graciously sent me on the occasion of the Italian victory, which puts hors de combat the last and strongest ally of Germany.

## BRITAIN'S LOSSES HEAVIEST

### Percentage of Casualties Greater Than That of Colonies.

London, Nov. 11.—In the period between March 2, 1918, and Oct. 24, 1918, the percentages of casualties to strength among infantry for United Kingdom, the British Empire and Australian troops were, respectively:

United Kingdom Divisions—Officers, 11.5 per cent; other ranks, 13.1 per cent.

Canadian Divisions—Officers, 9.7 per cent; other ranks, 11.4 per cent.

Australian Divisions—Officers, 9.2 per cent; other ranks, 10.6 per cent.

## AMERICAN VESSEL IS SUNK

## EMPEROR RENOUNCES THE GERMAN THRONE AND CROWN PRINCE WILL FOLLOW SUIT

### Reign Will Result

Chancellor Maximilian Declares to Remain in Office Until Matters Connected With the Abdication Have Been Adjusted.

London, Nov. 11.—The German emperor and king of Prussia, William von Hohenzollern, has decided to renounce the German throne.

"The German crown prince will also renounce the throne and a regency will be set up.

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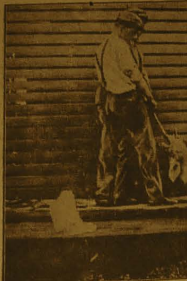

Special Information Service, United States Department of Agriculture. HOG-KILLING TIME IS HERE.



A Barrel Is Satisfactory for Scalding Medium-Size Hogs.

DESIRABLE HOGS FOR BUTCHERING

Well-Conditioned, Healthy Animals Gaining in Weight Make Handy Killers.

AVOID ALL AILING PORKERS

Breeding Plays Important Part in Producing Carcasses of High Quality—Barrel Is Convenient Recipe for Scalding.

In selecting hogs for butchering health should be first consideration. Even though the hog has been properly fed and carries a prime finish, the best quality of meat cannot be obtained if the animal is unhealthy.

A hog in mediocre condition, gaining rapidly in weight, yields the best quality of meat. Do not kill a hog that is losing flesh. A reasonable amount of fat gives juiciness and flavor to the meat, but large amounts of fat are not essential.

Hogs intended for slaughter should remain unfasted for at least 24 hours or better, 30 hours. Give them all the clean, fresh water they will drink. This will help to clean the system of food and will facilitate bleeding.

Use Barrel for Scalding. A special equipment for hog killing includes an eight-inch straight cutting knife, a cutting knife, a 14-inch steel, a hog hook, a bull-shaped stick scraper, a gimble and a meat saw. More than one of each of these tools may be necessary if many hogs are to be slaughtered and handled on a large scale.

Do Not Have Water Too Hot. For scalding the water should be at a temperature of 145 degrees F. If the water is too hot the hair is likely to set, causing more trouble than it is worth.

Shelter and dry bedding are important factors in finishing hogs for market, especially during these days of costly feed.

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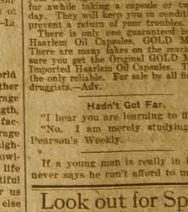
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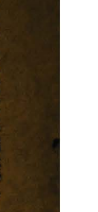
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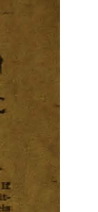

### ALL HOPE THE WAR IS OVER

The war is over, so far as "declared" war between nations is concerned. God only knows what other wars are in sight—what wars against anarchy and rapine and murder. Now that Europe has been made safe for democracy, democracy must be made safe for Europe. Peoples who have had no part in self government must be taught what Liberty is and that it does not mean the right to impose upon other people.

The poor, unsophisticated Russians are wading through Hades in their search for Liberty which is within their grasp, just as their Dukabor sect starts out in mid-winter over the prairies in nature's garb, every so often, in search of The Christ. The very thing they wish is in their hands but they throw it aside because in their ignorance and misunderstanding they do not recognize it. We fear this will be true of other races in Europe.

Liberty—personal liberty—is the most precious possession of an earthly life. The right to live, to think, to worship according to one's own desires—so long as those desires do not lead us to cross the rights of other folk—is the acme of earthly happiness. The trouble is that some folks regard liberty as the right to do as one wishes, regardless of others, and that is anarchy.

The Kaiser and some of the militarist leaders have fled from Germany to escape the wrath which they fear that their former subjects will wreak upon them. That looks like the end of autocracy in Germany. We have little fear that the German people will throw away the Liberty they have paid for so dearly nor trade it for license. The one especial requisite to German racial progress is a complete reversal of national practices and aspirations. "Culture" is dead and the lie of world domination and the practice of duplicity in international agreements must go. The German race is quite as good as any other just so long as it behaves itself as well, but when it resorts to the practices of Attila the Hun who loved to be called "the scourge of God" and boasted that the grass never grew where his horse set its foot, they must pay the penalty in human confidence.

The German race today faces the rising instead of the setting sun. Their national victories of the last century gave them a wrong impression of the right of might and it has taken years of bloodshed and heartaches for them to realize that their national success needs the confidence of their neighbors and the world.

That statement of the imperial chancellor, Prince Max, in which he warned the German race, "at home and in other lands," that it "is surrounded by malicious joy and hatred," was the last bid of the old-time autocrat to cement a national spirit by teaching more of their war-time hatred of other races. The statement was contemptible chicanery and an unparliamentary. The German people are not surrounded by hatred nor any malicious spirit, in this country at least, for they are judged here by what they are and they measure up to a higher type of human being than the double-dealing, brutish actions of German autocracy who wrought their fair land into a war machine with which to scourge humanity as did the Huns under Attila of old.

Those of German extraction in this country are not surrounded by hatred nor any malicious sentiment nor practice. They are measured by the same rule as are we all—how we behave.

We have a 30-day armistice with the German government, but that does not necessarily mean peace with it.

We have shown the German military that they must not count, run over the people of the world. Now it is up to us to show them that we know how to help them.

### THERE'S A QUESTION

The state highway commission has sent out a circular letter suggesting the issuance of \$40,000,000 of state bonds for building roads. They say that amount of bonds will build 2,000 miles of 16 foot road of the most approved type. Nothing under the sun will de-

velop a country more rapidly nor more substantially than good roads. They add to the safety, convenience and pleasure of country life; they put farm products closer to market; they are an incentive to "do things" along other lines and, in every way where they don't cost too much, are an advantage to development.

But it seems to us that the experience of this region has shown that road expenses find their finest fruition in "maintaining" the approved graveling highway under the pounding of monster, high powered cars. Figuring on a term of years, cost of construction is only a small part of the total expense of a road road. Don't forget that the original bonds have to be paid some time and that interest must be paid on them every year.

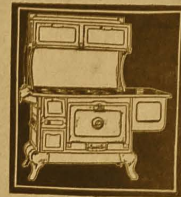
Minnesota wants good roads and is going to have them but we don't believe it is going into any wild, \$40,000,000 speculation, at this time at least. Some people are never satisfied with a good thing but always want to ride it to death. Supposing that Minnesota had issued \$40,000,000 of bonds for roads; Pine county, with about 1500 of the 83,000 square miles in the state, would probably get about 1-50 of those "2,000 miles of 16 foot road of the most approved type" or about 30 miles! We don't believe that Pine county needs those roads half as much as it does a bunch of east-and-west roads across the county (it is 30 miles across the county) of maybe not such high quality but good enough for the folks of the villages and farms to use for their actual needs.

We folks of Pine county might be in better position to judge these matters intelligently, however, if we knew something of what good roads cost. We have never seen a statement of expenses on any of the considerable road projects in the county, showing what was spent for engineering work, for bridges, grading, graveling, subsequent maintenance etc., and it seems to us that, where a much money is involved as there is in the road work of this county, the public which is paying the taxes ought to be kept informed in order that it may act intelligently. We submit this suggestion to the State Highway Commission.

Governor Burnquist has appointed J. M. McConnell of Manakota to succeed C. C. Schulz as state superintendent of public instruction. There has long been a feeling that Mr. Schulz was building the most powerful political machine in the state about himself. He is an able man, an excellent manager and a very, very shrewd, smooth politician. We regard him as quite a possible some-time candidate (at least) for governor—and he will be mighty strong, too. Through his work for the state university and normal school appropriations, his connection with the vast state aid to schools appropriation, and the teachers' pension act and state teachers' employment bureau, which he is supposed to have fathered, he has a hold on an immense following in the state who will yell their heads off for him. If the time should come, he has made a habit in favor of bringing parochial and private schools within the same laws of supervision and regulation that govern public schools and has, no doubt, made many enemies through this course. The papers quote Mr. Schulz as saying that possibly this had something to do with his removal. We are not at all concerned with the facts, but we doubt whether Mr. Schulz was correctly quoted, and we are from way down in the heart of Missouri when it comes to believing that Governor Burnquist was influenced by this matter against Mr. Schulz's reappointment.

The defeat of Congressman Clarence B. Miller for reelection in the Duluth district was very regrettable from our standpoint. He is recognized as one of the brightest young men in congress and we need men of his experience, knowledge and ability there in St. Paul. If we understand that Mr. Curry, the successful candidate, is a man of excellent ability and stands high in the brotherhood of inventive engineers, who he has had his training. We look with much interest and wonder at the judgment of an old-fashioned man who looks lightly on exchanging an experienced statesman for an experienced inventive engineer in the halls of congress in the present era and wonder whether his "invention" has given him any idea of whether it has made a job of him.

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REPUBLICANS HAVE MAJORITY OF SIXTEEN, WHICH MAY BE INCREASED. SENATE REMAINS IN DOUBT. Clear Contests in Michigan, Idaho and New Mexico Will Determine Which Party Secures Control of Upper House.

Washington, Nov. 7.—With session of the House of Representatives under the leadership of the Republicans by a majority of 19, and probably more, the attention of the country was concentrated on contests in three states—Michigan, Idaho and New Mexico, which will decide whether the Democrats or Republicans control the Senate as well.

Returns from five congressional districts were missing in Montana, New Mexico and South Dakota. Without them, however, the Republicans have won 220 seats. In the House of Representatives—16 more than the 218 votes necessary for a majority.

Democrats Lack 16 Votes. The Democrats, on the face of these returns, had 195 seats, and if the five missing districts were to be conceded to them they still would lack 16 votes of the number necessary to control the House.

Returns show plainly that Speaker Clegg, reported of being defeated, was reported likely, has been elected by a substantial majority. The contests which will decide the political complexion of the Senate were very close. As the Senate is not yet organized, a decision in these contests, there are 46 Democrats and 47 Republicans.

Michigan Race Close. In Michigan the race between Henry Ford and Truman H. Newberry was so close that it was said an official count would be required to decide the winner. Both parties were claiming the seat.

In New Mexico, where Republicans are claiming the election of Senator Fall by a majority of 1,000 at least, not a single county had reported complete returns.

In Idaho, where 74,000 votes out of an estimated total of 95,000 had been counted, Senator Nugent, the Democratic candidate for reelection, was leading Frank R. Gooding, the Republican candidate, by a little more than 200 votes. The race is in doubt.

Senate Loss a Blow. With the House firmly in the hands of the Republicans, the control of the Senate is more important than ever to the Democratic administration. If the administration can retain control of the Senate it can in a large measure check the activities of a Republican House. It is doubly important to the Democrats because of the nature of the party's constitution assigns to the Senate in the ratification of the peace and foreign trade treaties.
