

COOLIDGE TO HALT BIG EXPENDITURES

President Hits at Pending Bills Providing Special Payments As Unjustified.

Washington—The numerous bills pending in Congress calling for large appropriations are regarded by President Coolidge as disturbing to the prosperity and welfare of the country.

Each of these measures in the opinion of the President would go far toward destroying property and creating a situation from which the country would be long in recovering.

A survey of the various bills involving appropriations which have been introduced has convinced the President that their enactment would call for appropriations larger than the entire expenditures of the government outside of the Postoffice department before the war.

Among the measures which Mr. Coolidge regards as inimical to the country's welfare are those calling for increased compensation to the chief clerk, grants, the bonus and aid for grants of money to numerous special classes. If such bills are enacted the President believes the budget statement would be broken down and a separate one taken from that which would be a wise policy of holding the executive responsible for the financial state of the nation.

Village Debt is Growing Smaller

In this week's issue of The Piker will be found the village financial statement for the past year. Every taxpayer of Pine City should read this statement.

Pine City is in excellent financial condition and is decreasing its indebtedness rapidly each year. The village is now on a cash basis, has no outstanding warrants and over \$100,000 is being applied on the bonds. This leaves a total indebtedness of \$27,850.00. The indebtedness has been reduced approximately \$8,000 during the past three years and \$2,500 last year.

A big saving has been made in interest. This is due to the \$15,000 bond issue passed a year ago to take up outstanding orders. We are now paying 4 1/2 per cent on the bonds.

In addition to the saving made the past year there has been many permanent improvements. The town has been resurfaced for water consumption, the water tank painted and cleaned outside and inside, considerable sewer and water extension, more cement crossings and sidewalks, the village well repaired, better drainage by more catch basins installed, and many of the streets have been improved.

The village council is deserving of commendation for their efficient handling of the village affairs the past year and The Piker welcomes the opportunity to voice its appreciation and we believe the appreciation of the taxpayers of Pine City, for the excellent manner in which village business has been administered.

Pertinent Pointers for Practical Farmers

ALFALFA GROWERS SHOULD HAVE STATE ORGANIZATION

Central Cleaning Plant Needed to Prepare Seed for Market. Need of a Minnesota state organization of growers of Grimm alfalfa seed has an impressive list upon farm crops men of the university that they are sponsoring a movement for a state meeting at Morris, Minn., February 27, for the purpose of organizing a Minnesota Grimm growers' association.

ALL MINNESOTA CAN HAVE PLUM ORCHARDS

State Fruit Breeding Farm Develops Many Outstanding Varieties. Many different varieties of plums, some of them recent origin, can be grown successfully under Minnesota soil and climatic conditions. The Ashbush, which was originated in South Dakota, is recommended by W. H. Alderman, chief of the division of horticulture, University of Minnesota, as a plum adapted to northern Minnesota. It is of good size and fairly good quality, he says, and matures about the middle of August. It is a red plum and will fruit in three or four years after planting.

SEED TREATMENT WILL ELIMINATE GRAMIN SMUT

Cereal plant disease specialists of the university agree that there is little excuse for growing smutty grain because most of the smuts or smut diseases can be controlled by seed treatments in Washington state the copper carbonate dust method should be used with great success for the last few seasons. In 1920 only ten acres of wheat were planted with smut given the dust treatment. This year seed wheat for 1,600,000 acres will be treated, says the plant disease specialist of the Washington extension service.

QUALITY, CONFORMATION SPELL MORE PROFITS

High Grade Calf Worth \$26 More Than Scrub of Same Age. That quality counts is one of the lessons intently stamped on the minds of farmers at the first of the best cattle demonstrations and schools held by A. A. Powell, livestock specialist, and V. L. Gavett, farm management specialist, of the agricultural extension service. Interesting comparisons have helped to drive the lesson home. One of these was staged on the farm of Bert Malmskog of Rushmore, Minn. Among the 30 good Hereford calves on the stand were two of copper color and one driven into a corner. One of the best Hereford calves was then placed beside it. Mr. Malmskog said the two calves were the same age—both calved in February, 1923. The good Hereford calf was out of one of his best cows and had, of course, suckled its dam during the summer. The other calf, which he had purchased from a neighbor, was out of a common cow.

Safe Practice to Feed Dairy Cattle Roughage

Feed the dairy cow all the roughage she will eat. Under ordinary conditions, this is safe advice, says E. S. Savage, authority on dairy rations at the New York State College of Agriculture at Ithaca. Silage and legume hay have been the best combination. The silage should be fed at the rate of about three to four pounds a day for each hundred pounds of live weight. This will usually mean that a cow will then consume about a pound and a half of dry matter every day for each ten pounds of live weight.

Feed Heifer Generously in First Milking Year

A heifer should be fed generously the first milking year to get her into the habit of milking generously and to develop her milk yielding functions. Possibly the second breeding time should be extended a little so she may be milked a long time the first milking year in the hope of creating the habit of heavy production. In such cases and gentlemen have much to do with the development of the dairy calf.

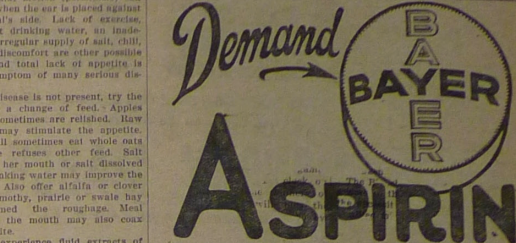

The Scientific American, in illustrating and describing a ventilating cover for containers, the invention of G. T. One of the primary objects is to provide a container in which the interior will be at all times in communication with the exterior, to afford proper ventilation of the contents. It is a further object to construct the cover free of all containers that the cases generated within the container may be discharged therefrom.
