GOOD ADVICE

Senator Borah, Republican of Idaho, sounded a warning to the United States Senate last Tuesday when he addressed both the Republicans and Democrats and advised them that it was time for the Senate to get down to some jiving and get down to some constructive legislation for the benefit of the country.

"The next campaign will not be won on the platforms written at Cleveland," he told his party leaders. "We must make our record here if we are anxious to continue in power."

"Home owners are being sold," he said. "Business is embarrassed, and farms passing from their owners because of taxes."

Official Washington has developed a mania for investigation, and mud-slinging is the order of the day with Republicans trying to blacken the record and character of Democrats and the Democrats strenuously trying to do the same to the Republicans.

The investigation has convinced most of the public that there has been considerable graft going on in Washington. If the investigating committee is sure of this fact, which they claim to be, it is time the parties concerned should demand the guilty parties prosecuted to the full extent of the law, regardless of who they may be, or what their political affiliations are.

The condition of the American farmer has reached the point where it is absolutely necessary, if such a thing is possible, and it is time Congress was getting down to business.

While he did not oppose the pursuit of the pending investigation the Idaho senator went on, senators must realize that the time is near at hand when we should dispense ourselves as a grant-in-aid and assume the business of legislation. He suggested that at the present pace there already would be time the present session to consider adequately the necessary appropriation bills.

"Unless we depart from this objective program," he continued, "we not only shall fail to represent the people, but to add to that when the session closes we shall have added to rather than lessened the tax burden. If that is so, there is only one judgment due us."

I cannot imagine anything more humiliating nor more disastrous to the Republican party than for it to go to the people having spent the remainder of the session as it has that portion already consumed."


