The same old "bunk" is used every time. Some pessimist surmises that this is election year and therefore business will be "junk." It is an old superstition that belongs to the limbo of witchcraft, but so many unthinking souls accept it for truth every four years that it continues to operate to the detriment of the people.

Electors do not hurt business, but business men think they do and therefore they do.

The result is that prosperity is frightened to death. But there's no room for that. The next time someone says the election is stranglehold business, don't look serious and agree—laugh at them.

## INVENTS ELECTRIC PHOTOGRAPH DEVICE

Engineer's Odd Machine Is Called Klydonograph.

New York—Photographs of electrical disturbances can be made in twenty billions of a second, it was announced. Such photographs can be made with light.

The device was perfected by J. F. Peters, electrical engineer of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company.

The shall find by the German "big brother" at Paris could travel but five-tenths of an inch in twenty-billionths of a second, not fast enough to make the visible motion visible in that space of time.

In one-tenth-millionth part of a second the device travels twenty feet, although it could encircle the globe seven times in one second.

The electrical photography device is called a klydonograph.

It consists of a photomultiplier, which is provided with electrical connections, so that disturbances may be brought into contact with the sensitized side of the plate.

No light is needed. Electrical disturbances can be measured thousands of times over, the reason, but it appears to involve a principle something similar to that involved in X-ray.




AID VOTED FOR TORNADO AREA

Treasury-Bureau Farmers Are Made Oscillate—Property Not Insured.

St. Paul—The state board of relief, at the call of Governor Preus, Tuesday voted \$10,000 as a relief for farmers struck by the tornado which destroyed their homes and killed three persons in the Tracy-Balaton district late Sunday.

Relief was voted by the board following a report of conditions by Adjt. Gen. W. C. Johnson, who returned from that district where he had been sent to investigate by Governor Preus.

General Blawie reported that he had a railroad trip in the Walnut-Balaton district and found that farmers were made destitute by the storm which wiped out their entire farms. Between 40 and 50 houses were destroyed and in most instances property was not insured, he said. He urged that the state board of relief immediately vote a sum to meet the amount of direct expenses of building shacks to house these destitute farmers.

GETS PRISON FOR TAX FRAUD

Brown & Bigelow Company Must Pay \$10,000 More—\$148,000 Taxes.

St. Paul H. H. Bigelow, president of Brown & Bigelow Company of St. Paul was sentenced by Judge W. A. Cant in United States District Court in St. Paul Tuesday to serve two years in Fort Leavenworth penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$10,000.

Mr. Bigelow pleaded guilty to an indictment charging conspiracy in connection with income tax state-meets of his firm.

William Priest, compiler of the company, and Robert F. Galloway, architect and treasurer, each were fined \$1000 when they pleaded guilty to similar indictments.

The Brown & Bigelow company was fined \$10,000 also and was ordered to pay \$148,000 back taxes.

U. S. MAY JOIN PARLEY

MacDonald and Heriot to Call London Conference in Mid-July.

London—Prime Minister Mac Donald told Sir Edward Grey that his conference with Premier Herriot of France was preliminary to an international conference to meet in London, probably July 16.

FLOOD COVERS CHINESE CITY

Foochow Under Water—Shipping Menaced by Floating Log Rafts.

Shanghai—Private advices from Foochow report the most disastrous flood in the history of that city. Millions of dollars' worth of rice and many canneries have already resulted and the water which has reached a depth of 60 feet at Yanping is still rising.

Three-quarters of the city of Foochow, including warehouses containing huge stocks of rice and tea, is under water and shipping is menaced by huge log rafts which are floating about uncontrolled.

PITTSBURGH PLUS ARGUMENT BEGUN.

Washington—Final arguments in the Federal Trial commission case against the Pittsburgh plus practice of determining the price of steel were begun. On the side favoring the Pittsburgh plus system appeared attorneys for the Steel Corporation, who argued that it was a natural for the association, for the associated states in interest, to settle the case, the Western Association of Rolled Steel Consumers. Federal Trade commission examiners recently recommended abolition of the Pittsburgh plus practice.

COMMUNITY BETTERMENT

The Committee on Agriculture of the Missouri State Bankers Association has sent out a questionnaire to all members to secure a frank opinion as to what are the most important community problems to be solved in the state. The questionnaire covers bank deposits, crops, agriculture, manufacturing, roads, public club work, agricultural agencies, co-operative associations, farm abandonment, land values, drainage, and social life, with a view in determining what work should be undertaken for the year.



## FALLACY OF SO-CALLED GUARANTEE OF BANK DEPOSITS BY LAW

An Attempt to Create Integrity by Legislative Act—Mere Words No Good Substitute for Individual Responsibility, Says Bankers' Chief.

The bank deposit guaranty is an attempt to establish fictitious value—to create value by order of government. Adopted first in Oklahoma in 1909, this plan was carried into several western states and threatened, in a brief time, to become a serious issue in commerce. Recent experience has proved, in this instance as in others, that sound economic law cannot be disregarded with impunity.

Oklahoma adopted the deposit guaranty as a result of the failure of a number of banks in the state. It was a time to start. It was not a guarantee, in any true sense of the word, but simply a form of mutual insurance. The various state banks were limited a small amount, in proportion to their respective deposits, to pay the losses incurred by failure. For a time it worked well. The plan was mismanaged at the start of development of territory, and opened to settlement, prevented failure. But the depression of 1920-1921 brought about a crisis in the state, and the new all time record of the natural law of economics. And yet we have today in the Congress of the United States a Representative of the State of Oklahoma who wants to foist this iniquitous, impractical system upon the National Banking System.

**Integrity Cannot Be Legislated.** The fundamental principle with the majority of bank depositors is that the correct name—that is it an attempt to create integrity and financial ability by legislative act. Depositors insist that the principal of safety, as their principal assurance of safety, a golden sign upon the bank window, "This bank protected by the state guarantee." From this day to the next, mere words were not a good substitute for individual responsibility, simple and sound of gold or green. No longer was it safe to depend upon the character of the bank; no longer did depositors feel the necessity of giving preference to more conservative when selecting their banks. They felt that the guaranty fund took the place of that. But the guaranty of bank deposits in Oklahoma failed—as all efforts to subvert the natural law of economics.
