### The Kitchen Cabinet

Industry, economy, beauty and kindness form a quartet of virtues that will never be improved upon.—James Oliver

#### FOR AFTERNOON TEAS

Sandwiches of various kinds are always acceptable with a quartet of tea. Cheese with chopped olives, or two or three slices of buttered bread, toasted just before serving, is one that is well liked.

Butter or nut bread with gravy jelly and cream cheese, chopped cooked figs and cream cheese between slices of buttered bread are all good.

A dairy bit of bread to be served in various ways is prepared thus: Cut fresh bread very thin, spread it with butter, anchovies, caviar or any highly flavored and liked paste; roll up to the size of the finger, fasten with a wooden toothpick to skewer and lay them in a pan and toast in the oven. Serve hot or cold. Very nice with bouillon or with a salad.

**Toasted Bacon Rolls**—Split crisp, tender, oval-shaped rolls and toast delicately. Place three pieces of crisp, well-cooked bacon between the halves of each roll.

**Hot Deviled Eggs**—Cut hard-cooked eggs in halves lengthwise. Remove the yolks, mash, and half as much grated cheese or deviled ham, chopped cooked chicken, chicken livers, or veal. Moisten with melted butter or mayonnaise, season lightly with salt, pepper, lemon juice or mustard. Roll the whites and place two halves on a slice of toast. Cover with boiling-hot white sauce and serve at once.

**Fruit Salad**—Fresh pears with sections of orange and grapefruit free from rind, in a most delicious combination; serve with

**Golden Dressing**—Take three tablespoons of orange juice, one tablespoon of lemon juice, one-half cupful of sugar, a few grains of salt, all heated in the top of a double boiler. Add one egg slightly beaten, and cook until smooth and thick. Cool and just before serving add one-half cupful of cream beaten stiff.

**Biscuity Muffins**—Sift together two cupfuls of flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt and one-fourth cupful of sugar. Beat one egg, add three-fourths of a cupful of milk and mix with the dry ingredients; add three-fourths of a cupful of melted butter and when thoroughly mixed add one cupful of blueberries. Bake in a hot oven in buttered muffin pans.

Pears cut into sections and combined with very ripe tomatoes also cut into sections, served with a mayonnaise to which a few spoonfuls of cream cheese has been added, is a very tasty salad.

#### GOOD THINGS WE ALL LIKE

Between seasons, when the appetite fails, hearty dishes do not appeal, and one really needs a hot, a dish of nicely seasoned macaroni will touch the spot.

Macaroni, cheese, hard-cooked eggs and a cupful of rich white sauce baked, makes a hearty and well-liked dish. Cook a cupful of macaroni and five eggs in the shell, a half cupful of grated cheese and the white sauce with a bit of onion juice. Put the ingredients in layers, having the cheese between to avoid the strongest heat. Cut the eggs into eighths and bake just long enough to become heated hot.

**Grandmother's Muffins**—Mix one cupful each of corn meal, flour, one-half cupful of light brown sugar or maple sugar if it can be obtained, two cupfuls of cold water and one-half teaspoonful of salt; let stand over night. In the morning add one teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a tablespoonful of hot water. Beat hard and drop into hot, well-greased gem pans and bake in a hot oven twenty-five minutes.

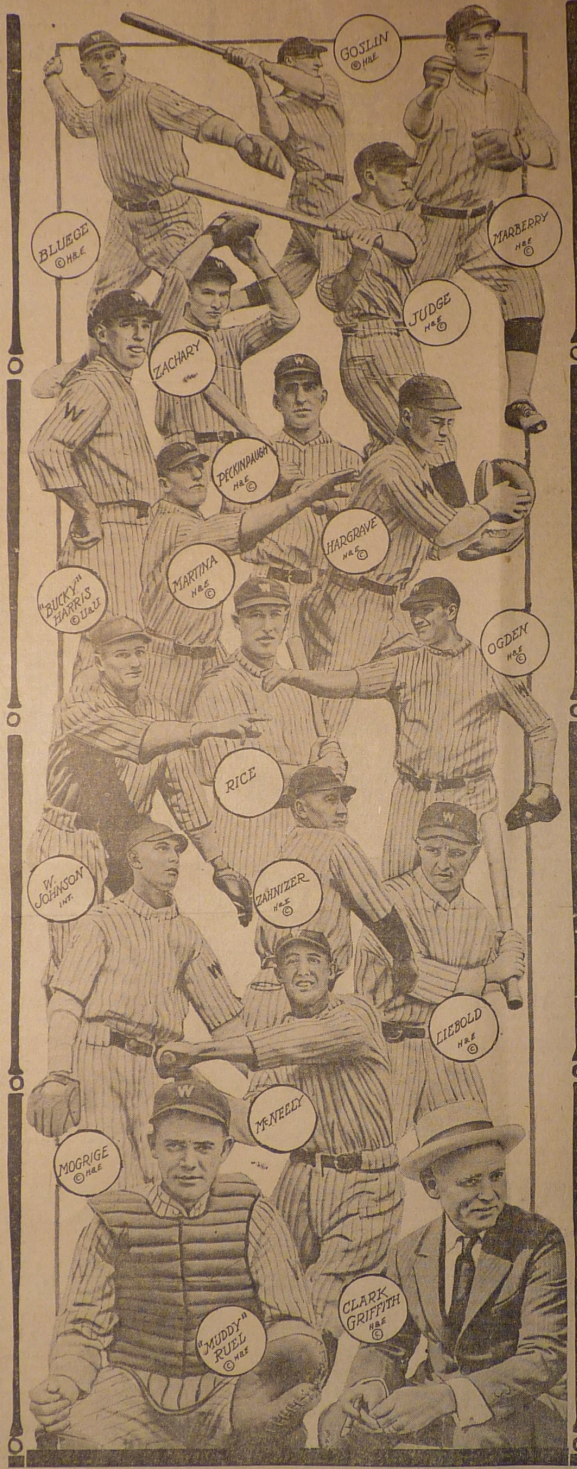
**Brussels Sprouts With Cream Sauce**—Boil a quart of brussels sprouts in two quarts of water until tender. Drain and serve with a rich white sauce prepared by melting two tablespoonfuls of butter and when bubbling hot add two tablespoonfuls of flour, cook until smooth and add one or one-quarter cupful of milk or thin cream; cook until smooth and thick, adding salt or eight cooked chestnuts which have been put through a sieve.

**Honey Hamlets**—Dissolve one teaspoonful of soda in one and one-half cupfuls of warmed honey; add one cupful of butter, cream together. Beat three eggs well and add to the honey and butter, then add five cupfuls of flour, then add five cupfuls of salt, two teaspoonfuls of cinnamon and two and one-fourth cupfuls each of chopped raisins and nuts. Stir until well blended and drop from a teaspoon on buttered sheet. Bake in a moderate oven.

### Johnson Is in Favor of Old System of Training

Indifferent physical condition and lack of proper spring training causes the midseason collapse of clubs which, at the start of the season, seemed certain pennant contenders, is the belief of Ben Johnson, president of the American league.

President Johnson said the present-day conditioning process is all wrong, and that it returns to the old-time system, when players started to harden

themselves physically as early as the first of the year, would result in better baseball.

"In the old days players did not think of starting to play baseball in the spring until they were capable of standing it," he said.

"By Young and many others, in the old days, went to Hot Springs and other winter resorts, and by climbing, walking and running, developed their strength gradually. Then they started to play baseball and did not fall victims to 'chirley-horse' and other

ailments. They were down to weight and as hard as nails when it came time to start the actual practice.

"Today it seems to be the general practice of every player to start right in and practice baseball pitching, throwing, running and batting with soft muscles and no wind.

"That is all wrong. If they started to condition themselves slowly soon after the first of the year they would be ready for practice when the training season started, and it would result in a better game."

## Community Building

### Advisory Committees for Town Beautifying

Ugliness in becoming the ruin in many of the extreme aspects of modern town life, the Literary Digest comments today. The magazine writer calls it "a deficiency of the greater public to the general artistic and natural amenities of towns and rural areas." The beauty of the past is sacrificed to make way for modern improvements, says the Christian Science Monitor, voicing a plea for concerted effort of town-beautifying.

"It is when things get bad, when they seem their greatest endurance reaches its limit. Already in parts of America something has been done toward the suppression of billboards that had fair to conceal the country as completely as the smoke screen in a battle at sea shields the fleet, and without the same reason or necessity. The preservation of the American amenities, if too local for the art commission in Washington, is left largely to woman's clubs. The English would take more thorough measures. Architects, through a restoration of the adness of a land from which beauty has flown, and eager to stay its flight, suggest the formation of advisory art committees in towns and country both. Their function would be such the same, though on a more restricted scale, as that of the English art commission modeled after the pattern of the American. The committee would advise and interfere in their own districts—interfere when some avoidable piece of vandalism was proposed, advise when new buildings were to be put up, new streets laid, new open spaces planned.

"They would have no power, but the hope is, would create an influence gradually growing irresistible as the public consciousness should awaken to a sense of the part beauty plays in life. Such, in a few words, is the scheme suggested by the Royal Institute of British Architects for the guardianship of beauty in England."

### Removed Billboards From All Highways

Billboards steps by civic organizations to eliminate billboards from the highways of the Pacific coast are expected to result from the impetus given the movement by the Standard Oil company of California, which has torn down 1,200 of its roadway signs in California, Oregon and Washington. The company removed its highway advertisements on the ground that they detracted from the beauty of the roads, and ordered that hereafter such signs should be confined to commercial zones.

"There was instant public response up and down the coast," said Kenneth R. Kingsbury, president of the company. "We have had entreaties, letters and telegrams by the hundreds indicating that a keen feeling exists concerning the marring of our great highways by signs."

The Skyline boulevard, a great highway being completed from San Francisco southward along the high ridges overlooking the Pacific ocean, is reported to be insured against billboards.

### Ugliness a Liability

Attractiveness has been deemed an important asset in the development of such thoroughfares as Fifth avenue in New York and Michigan boulevard in Chicago. There is no question that the beautiful home in an attractive residence district adds a value far in excess of an uneven development. But does attractiveness pay in commercial building in general as in the case of residences? Is it good business to put up an attractive office or store building rather than a plain, unadorned structure, even an ugly structure? It was observed in one of the large cities recently that the ugly commercial building was the one most often without tenants and that as a rule was the first to be torn down and replaced.

No doubt that observations would hold in many instances, in many cities.—Kansas City Times.

The man who builds a fire-safe home is a good citizen. He is adding something permanent to the wealth of his community, and he has provided a fire barrier that in itself will tend to lessen conflagration and provide stopping points for fires.
