GERMANY MAKES LARGE PAYMENT

29,750,000 Marks Is Credited to
Britain on Account of
Export Levies.

Berlin.—Germany's reparations payments of goods in kind during September and October totaled approximately 179,000,000 gold marks, according to a statement made yesterday by Dr. Max Parker Gilbert, agent general for reparation payments.

More than 142,000,000 of this total has been turned over to the various countries since the agent general on his cash balance of 25,000,000 on hand.

Germany's cash payment under the armistice proviso specified in the London Agreement totals 1,000,000,000 marks. She is also credited with 29,750,000 on account of export levies assessed by Great Britain under the reparation regulations act, while France's share from the same source is given as slightly over 10,000,000. The French figure being of comparatively recent origin.

The sum of compensation is set at 1,000,000,000 marks while 23,000,000 was turned over to Germany's credit by France and Belgium on the account of receipts emanating from the occupied territories.

The armistice provides that Germany's reparations payments will be made in kind until the sum of 1,000,000,000 marks is reached.

Mexican Murderers To Die
Slayers Judged Guilty Despite Claims
Another Fired Shot.

Mexico City.—Alfonso Garcia and Francisco Diaz were condemned to death for the murder of Mrs. Rosalia Evans, the American-born widow of a British subject, who was killed last August near the hacienda in the state of Puebla.

The trial of the two men had been in progress for several days in the town of Puebla. The verdict was reached at midnight after a day spent by the court in deliberation. It was agreed to establish the fact that the bullet which caused the death of Mrs. Evans was fired by John Siricus, superintendent of the Evans hacienda, in attempting to repel an attack made on bandits on Mrs. Evans.

IOWA SENATORS BATTLE CLOSE

**Official Cayugas Give Brookhart 753
Lead—Two Counties Out.**

Dess Moines.—With the official canvass of the senatorial race completed in all but two lowa counties and Senator Smith W. Brookhart leading Dan F. Quinn in Des Moines by only 550 votes out of the total of more than 500,000, a contest for the seat of the junior lowa senator seems a certainty.

Definite announcement of his intention to contest, the election was withheld by the Democratic candidate, but close political associates told it he would be preparing a legal action to have the result voided, indicating an outcome of the ground upon which he would petition the Senate for a re-count.

Chicago.—A kind of punch and splendor of a funeral, including a band of Chicago musicians, gunman bear ranger and big-jester, was carried to the grave by his associates. Gangland, death and deacons, with their usual sang-froid, attended the funeral of the man who had been shot down by three gunmen as he stood among the roses and flowers of his flower shop. Buried without respectability his operations were cleaned.

Devoid of the offices of the church, the friends of the deceased, who was a man of few words, paid him the last respects with all the panoply and elaborate display that a lavish outpouring of money could buy to give grace to the funeral.

POLAND FUNDS OBLIGATION

**Nation Agrees to Liquidate "Debt of
\$179,545,025 in 62 Years.**

Washington.—The American government has agreed to liquidate its debt with Poland for funding that nation's debt to the United States. The agreement will endow Poland with the power to whomsoever it may please to name the funding institutions which have preceded it, and called for full liquidation of this obligation of \$179,545,025 in 62 years.

With the signatures of Secretary Merton and President Coolidge, and that of Minister Wolowski for Poland, the agreement took effect yesterday. Poland's signature was put on the document by Dr. J. G. Clark, who was seen to be ready for submission to Congress.

London.—The British cabinet is going to meet in Downing street to discuss policies regarding the social policy which is estimated to wind the net of the rule of the labor party. It is the opinion of the members of the cabinet that the time has come for a general strike of organized labor to force a general royal commission to inquire into the results for the little cost of the strike.

GUST ANDERSON GOES TO PEN.

Judge Sturges ordered Gust Anderson brought into court last Friday and the court sentenced him to from 5 to 10 years in the state penitentiary at Stillwater. He was taken into custody by Sheriff Hawley and kept in the local jail until Tuesday when the sheriff took him to Stillwater where he has started serving his sentence.

In sentencing Mr. Anderson the court revoked the 30 day stay of sentence and placed him on the ball.

We understand that Mr. Anderson does not intend to move for a new trial, although he has until December 16th to make such a motion if he so desires.

Rye Estimated at 171 Million
Bushels Below Normal—
Shortage of Bread Grains.

Ottawa.—The world this year faces

an estimated bread grain shortage of 574 million bushels—401 million bushels of wheat and 173 million bushels of rye. This is estimated at 171 million bushels below normal.

COVERING ALL PHASES OF NORTHWESTERN FARM LIFE

WINTER CARE OF THE BEEF HERD

Economical Methods of Feeding and Management Must Be Practiced to Win a Profit.

Edited by the Agricultural Extension Dept., University of Minnesota.

"The beef cow which yields a six months old calf will yield a calf in the spring. This calf must be maintained cheaply throughout the year in order to make a profit. During the pasture season this problem is an easy one, but the cost of wintering the herd may easily offset the enterprise unless careful, economical methods of winter feeding and management are practiced," says H. W. Vaughan of the University's husbandry division.

"Winter management is much simplified and yearly feed costs are considerably lower if beef cows are bred to drop their calves in the fall instead of during the winter season. Less winter feed and shelter are required for dry cows than for cows nursing calves."

"High-priced barns and expensive equipment are not needed on the beef cattle farm. Beef cows may be wintered best in open sheds which are comparatively inexpensive. They may be made comfortable by bedding with straw which goes back to the land in the manure. Cows wintered in open sheds have the advantage of most healthful surroundings, and they are not subject to much hard labor than in stalls in a barn. A barn with hex stalls and tie stalls requires daily individual handling of the cattle, and daily cleaning and bedding. Cows wintered in open sheds have the advantage of being able to walk directly into a wagon. If the sheds are connected with yards, as they should be, the cattle can be driven into the open or under cover as they choose. The labor of driving and handling them is eliminated, as is also the necessity of trying to determine where the mother cattle go to defecate annually. After the winter run begins to diminish, hog prices can be expected to rise. It need not surprise anyone to see a \$12 top on the hog market at Chicago by next spring."

This is a time to plan for a good pig crop for next spring and fall. Breeds will be the same as last year, but hogs will sell this winter a matter of conjecture but in my judgment, the pigs born next spring will be fed milk, grain and during summer, then grain, hay and the formula will be the same as last year. The price of weaner hogs will be greater, and therefore yield a greater return on the feed consumed.

This production comes at a period of the year when it is easier to derive a greater return on the feed because of the greater price of the feed. The use of 1921 or 1924, and I believe it will sell at a higher average price and return more real profit than the pig crop of 1921, which went to market from the fall of 1922 to the summer of 1923.

"In the last few years farmers have justly complained that their efforts to produce came in naught because of the market price. The only human judgment market predictions are all right, and if the caring farmers can solve the production problems confronting them they need have no fear of the outcome."

LITTER CONTEST BIG SUCCESS

Clarence B. Kraft, of Farmington, Dakota county, has won first place in the first really state-wide pig litter contest ever held. The litter of 11 high grade Duroc weighed 5,182.45 pounds, or more than a ton and a half, at the end of the 180-day contest.

John Reese of Charles City, Iowa, came second prize winner with a litter of 14 which weighed 2,796 pounds at the end of the six months. Gordon E. Sunney, a junior livestock club boy of Lansing, Mower county, had a litter of 13 purchased Chester Whites which weighed 2,720 pounds.

Two hundred fifteen farmers from 13 counties originally enrolled in the contest were invited to compete. Each farmer made a ton or more of pork from a single litter in the 180 days. The first 20 of the 41 will receive cash premiums, several hundred dollars being raised in the process.

In addition, different breed associations will award prizes and trophies. The weights of the 41 litters range from 2,008 to 3,102 pounds.

The average number of pigs in the litters was 10.7 and the average weight per pig was 216.4 pounds.

The contest was organized and promoted by the Minnesota Livestock Breeders Association, the Minnesota Department of Agriculture and the agricultural extension committee of the State University.

In charge were H. A. Deralent of Wykoff and Prof. G. H. Zavoral and E. F. Johnson of the University.

Zavoral, who had general supervision of the contest, says it has been demonstrated that market hogs are the most highly developed machines to convert plant food into animal flesh.

It is now possible to buy to sell for market price and purchase bran and middlings or some other feed to fatten up a home-grown ration, but the consensus of opinion is that it is not.

Ordinarily, it is more profitable to grind the wheat or rye, sell the flour for human food and then buy bran and middlings. These products contain greater per cent of protein and are more effective in making a balanced ration out of home-grown roughage.
