OUR HEARTS WERE YOUNG AND GAY

The long corridor of the Pine City Grade School filled with sound as 35 wide-eyed little boys and girls paraded to their first day of classes. We were the first class to occupy the first grade room. It was fall, 1940-the year in which the new grade school addition of the Pine City Public School was opened. We bade our mothers a fond farewell at 9 o'clock except for Monroe, who cried so hard the tears rolled down his fat little cheeks. Soon the boy in the blue sailor suit (Bobby Greenlee) joined in the chorus. With two big sandboxes in the back of the room in which to play, and our fervent efforts in learning "See Dick Run!" we were soon caught in the spirit of making and learning new things. Miss Collete started our social life with a Halloween Party in the lunch room and in November, Marlys Smith brought ice cream cones and birthday cake to school. Henrietta Boo won first prize in the Book Week contest. For the Christmas play, we wore choir robes with white collars and big green or red bows. Though we sang "Jingle Bells" off key and wiggled or whispered, the "Moms and Daddies" were very proud of their little dears!

As second graders we gave our reassuring "toothless smiles" to the "shy" first graders in hopes that they would learn to take after their elders! In April, Shirley Henning, a shy, curly-haired girl from the metropolis of Duluth joined our group. We entered the theatrical world by partaking in the production of "Mother Goose Rhymes," directed by Miss Larson. Kenny Moriarty starred as "Old King Cole"--who soon tired of his fiddlers-three and called for new entertainment; to please the King, "Jack-be-nimble" (Tom Kosik) jumped over a candlestick; Dan Kreck put in his thumb and pulled out a plum; Jerry Kosik and Ethel Milgrom were "Jack and Jill."

Miss Wilna, whom we nicknamed "Walnut" taught us to play "Knock-Knock, Who's There?" behind the closet doors and "The Squirrel and the Nut." This was the year all the girls brought their dolls to school and the boys made a grocery store. Of course, we can't forget the darker side of school; Miss Wilna's Spelling chart and our A,B, and C groups in Arithmetic. We sadly said good-bye to Gerri Galles and Ann Carlson, who moved to Minneapolis. Near the end of the year we put on a play about Spring and the flowers. Mary Blanchard had one of the leading roles - that of "Spring". Remember some of the forlorn crepe paper costumes!

In our Fourth Grade Mr. Graves assumed the duties of superintendent, Mr. Ziebarth having returned to serve his country. Under the direction of Miss Munson, we put on the musical Christmas play, "In The Land of Toys." The play took place in a toy hospital, where the broken mechanical turtle (played by Tom Gumetz), the toy clown (played by Jerry Nelson), a saw-dust doll and others were being mended for Christmas. We had our first taste of choral reading. Miss Munson instituted the "Army and Navy" progress chart; the many gold stars showed we were well-behaved students. We secretly planned a birthday party for Miss Munson and surprised her with a shower of peanuts and Dick Daniels' prize "Nigger Toes".

"Summer At Buckhorn" brings back memories of Miss Lamb and our fifth grade school days. The boys donned dresses and yellow curls to reenact their favorite part of the story, "The Mad Bull Scene." During the year we put on several other productions, including "King George and the Dragon" - the vicious dragon hid in the closet. In "Hansel and Gretel," a puppet show, Ann Hodge was the witch. In winter our recesses were spent outdoors. Snowballs thrown by the girls usually hit their mark, namely, the boys. Romance filled the air in February when Billy Shimek helped Cupid by buying all the Valentines at the drug store for his girl.

Music and Art became an important part of Sixth grade activities. We studied the great painters and sang songs such as "I'll be Coming Around the Mountain", "My High Silk Hat", and "The Chinaman". We edited a class paper entitled Pine City Pioneer. A few members of our class joined Mr. Peterson's "A" Band--Adeline Van Horn, Joan Miller, and Billy Shimek. We took notes at the Court House on trial which concerned a car accident. We saw several people take the oath which entitled them to become citizens of the United States.

Our school life was revolutionized when we entered the Seventh Grade. Homecoming Day it rained, and all our efforts and difficulties to decorate Shingle-decker's hay wagon were lost. Mr. Kallin taught us mathematics and how to throw erasers while Mr. Hanson struggled to get us through English. Later, Mr. Frankel arrived to take over our English class. Under his capable guidance, we wrote and produced our first play. In February, "Be our Valentine, but not too much" were the homemade creations that Jerry Nelson and Danny Kreck sent to the girls on Valentines' Day.

Miss Jorgensen soothed her shattered nerves by issuing U's to anyone that dared say a word. Music class proved to be entertaining when Mr. Peterson's fist encountered Arthur Foster's nose resulting in a bloody nose and 40 scared students.

In March we won the District Basketball tournament and made an unforgettable trip to Hibbing. That year we also gave our first Junior High appearance as singers, we were a small portion of the annual Spring Concert.

We took our first State Board Examination for History in May and concluded the school year by celebrating Jo Briggs' birthday party.

As Freshmen we girls blossomed out in lip stick and the boys began to comb their hair. Miss Anderson, (Dan Cupid), of the Freshmen class introduced us to the "green" Brook Park students with a new seating arrangement for fifth hour English class.

We emerged into a world of X's and Y's. It was

Algebra, under the capable guidance of Mr. Klicker who substituted until Mr. Gackstetter arrived.

In December the Home Ec. class presented a Christmas tea to the delight of our Mothers and faculty members. The refreshments and entertainment were entirely prepared by the class.

The following September we arrived back at school with hopes of a better then ever year. We began by working vigorously on our Homecoming float with a theme of "49'ers" which much to Miss Rogstad's dismay never turned out.

As Sophomores the girls were initiated into the Pep Club, they spent a long day but were well rewarded with a picnic which was a lot of fun. In football we began our winning streak of 24 games.

February brought snow--and worried parents. Buses were stalled and everyone spent the night in town. Two days later all were shoveled out and school resumed.

May brought the Prom--some of us were chosen to serve in "Dreamland." To add to the theme we stumbled around in nightgowns and pajamas.

Our Junior year started off with a bang. We were introduced to our new classmate, Konrad Bumus, a

German Exchange Student who added to the riot of our class.

Homecoming was a success. We walloped North Branch then danced to the music of Dix Mann at Pine Camp. Arnold and Jim helped expand our chests by being chosen football captains for the coming year.

Homecoming was followed by our class play "Our Hearts Were Young And Gay." It was a big success and everyone had lots of fun even though there was a lot of work involved.

We ordered our class rings then waited anxiously to receive them.

Basketball brought forth the longest season that Mr. Nell has ever had. We were known as the long winter team.

Moose Lake provided the site for our Spring Concert. The band received an "A" rating and the following week they journeyed to Minneapolis to take part in the State Festival. Another major undertaking was the Junior-Senior Prom, which we worked on endlessly for weeks. We finally succeeded in decorating the armory in a Hansel and Gretel Theme.

As ushers we took part in graduation and then we were ready to become Seniors.

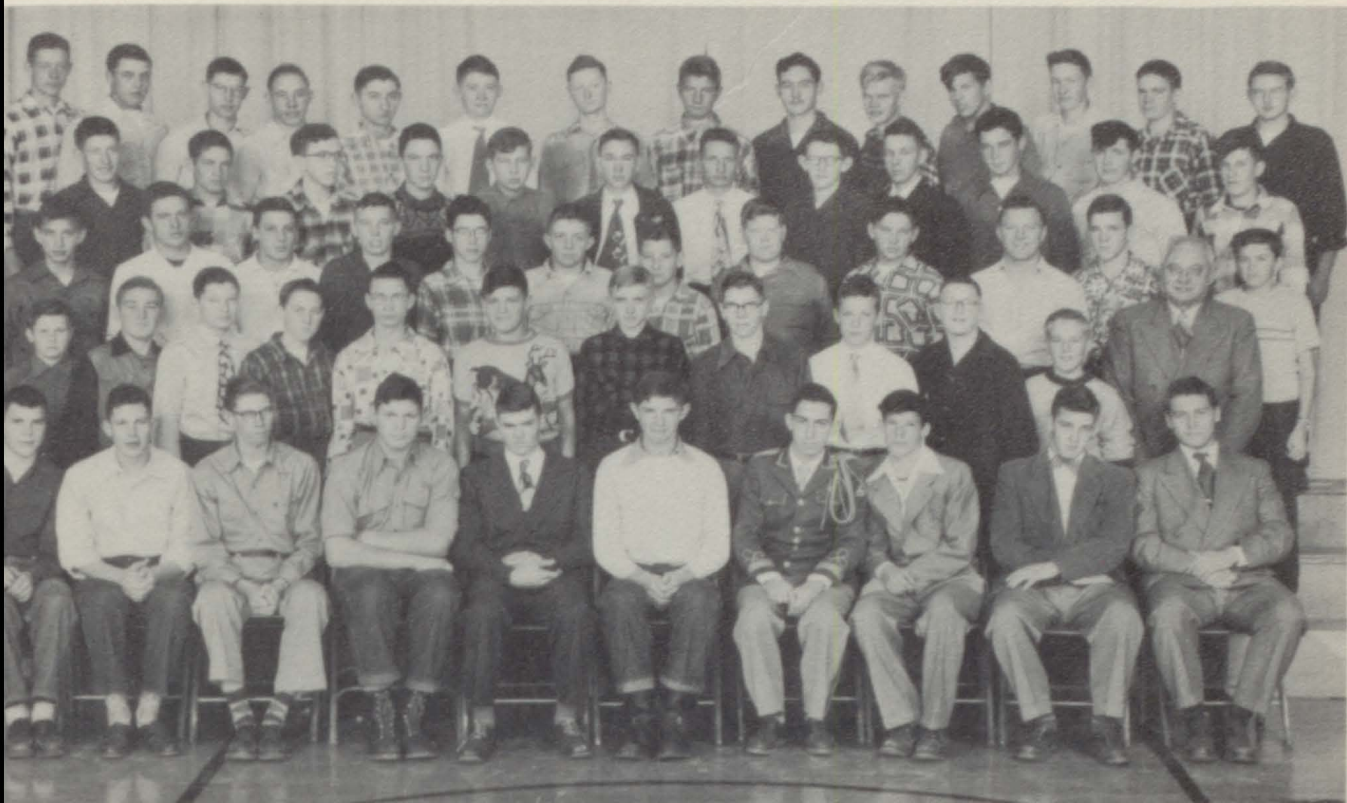

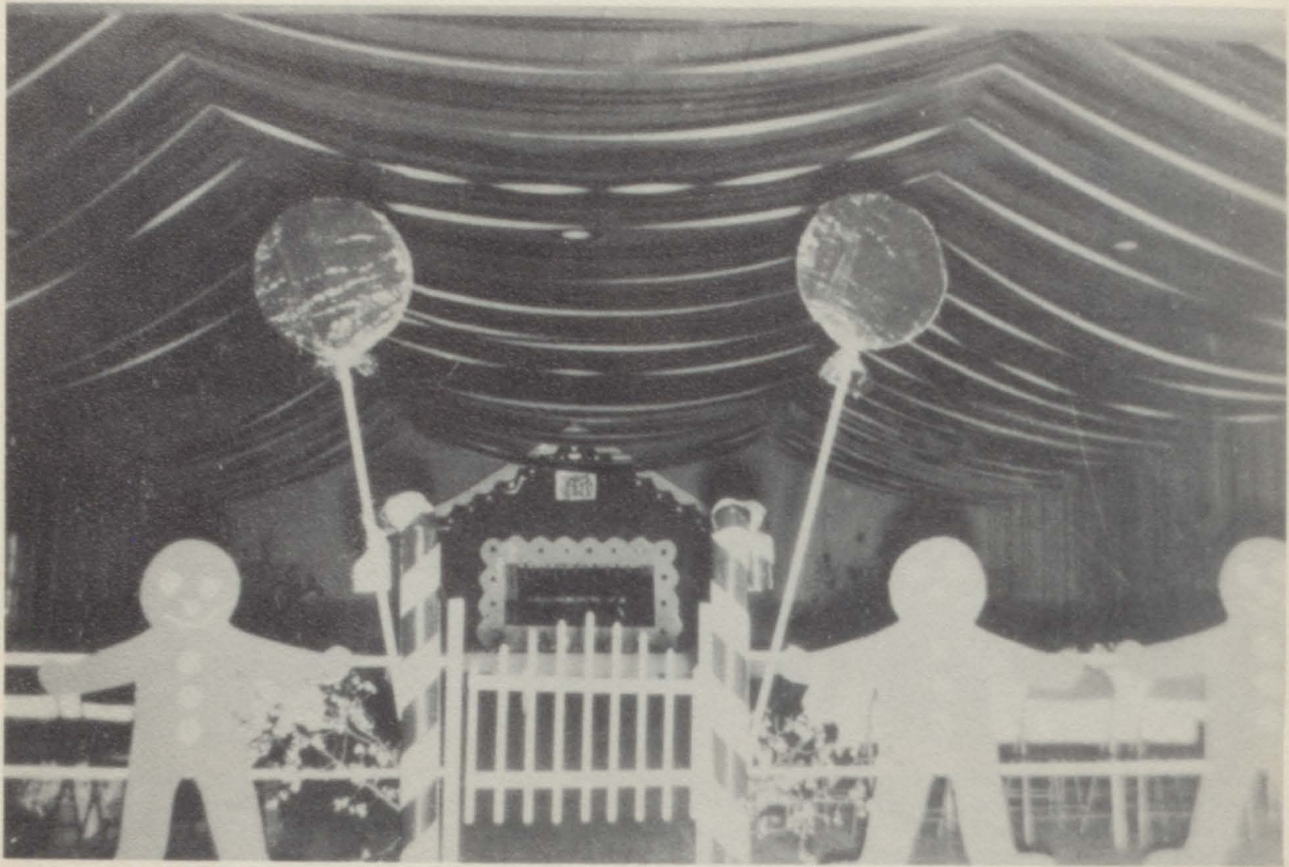

In the evening the Dragons ended the event by staging a complete victory over Moose Lake.

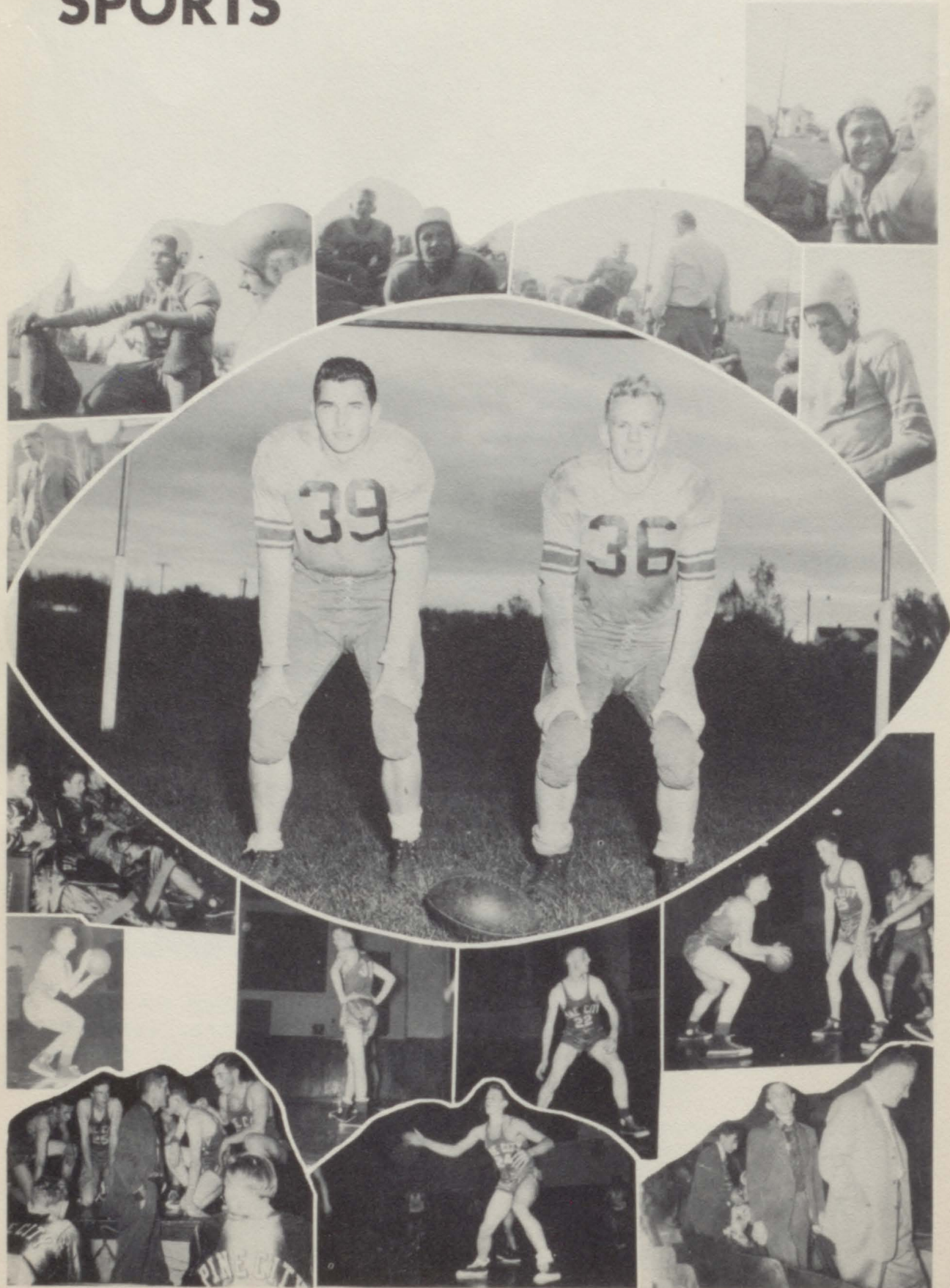
