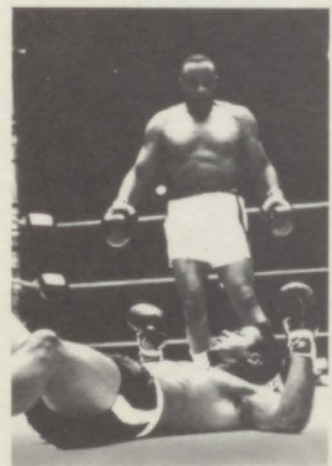




Lt. Col. John H. Glenn, first U.S. man to orbit earth, smiled beside recovered capsule in a year full of pioneering successes in space navigation.

New York Yankees won the Series from San Francisco in spite of Chuck Hiller's fourth-game grand slammer.

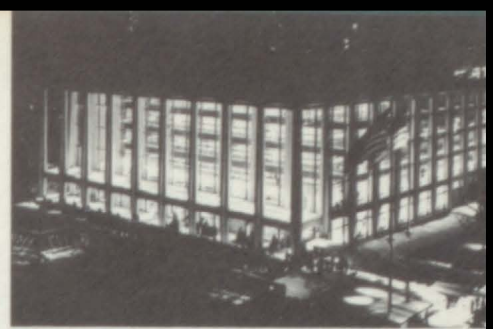




Philharmonic Hall, first unit of New York's projected Lincoln Center for Performing Arts, opened in a blaze of light.

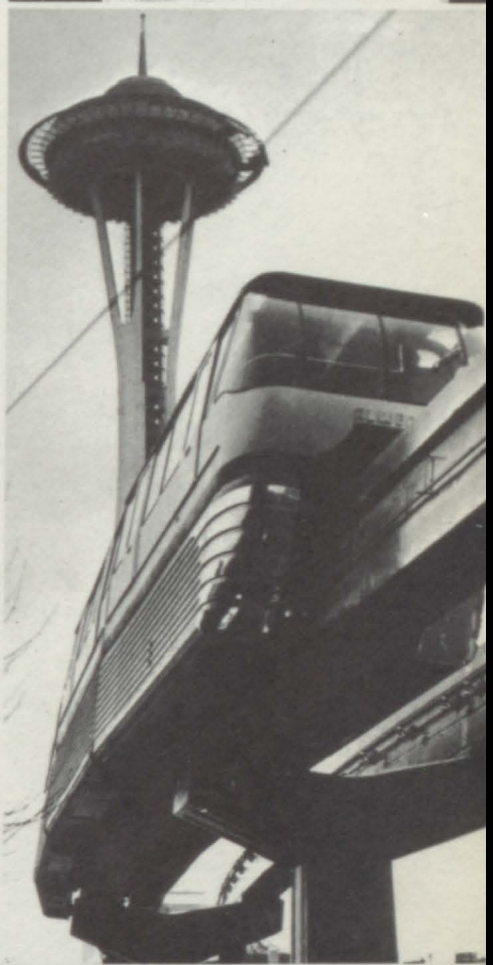

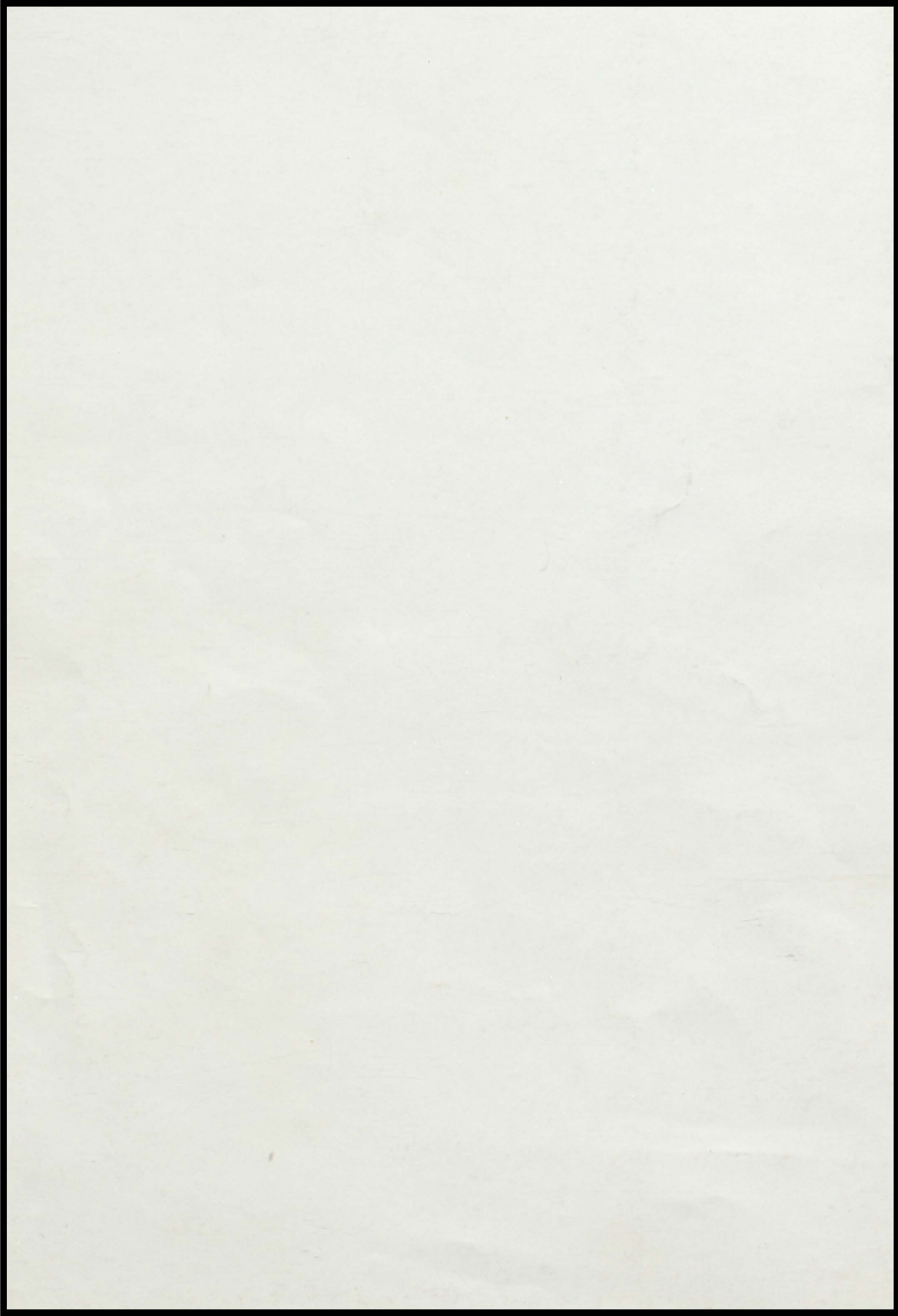

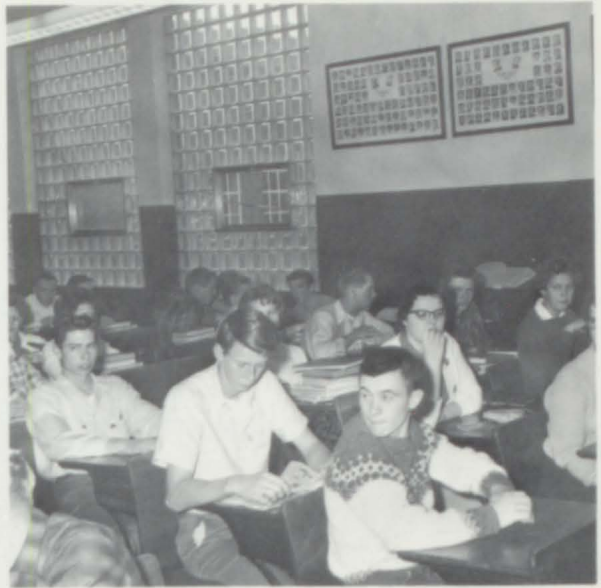

Dear Graduates,


In this time of almost constant crisis, when our country's future and that of the whole world is at stake, our hopes and our future are in your hands, our young people of today.
