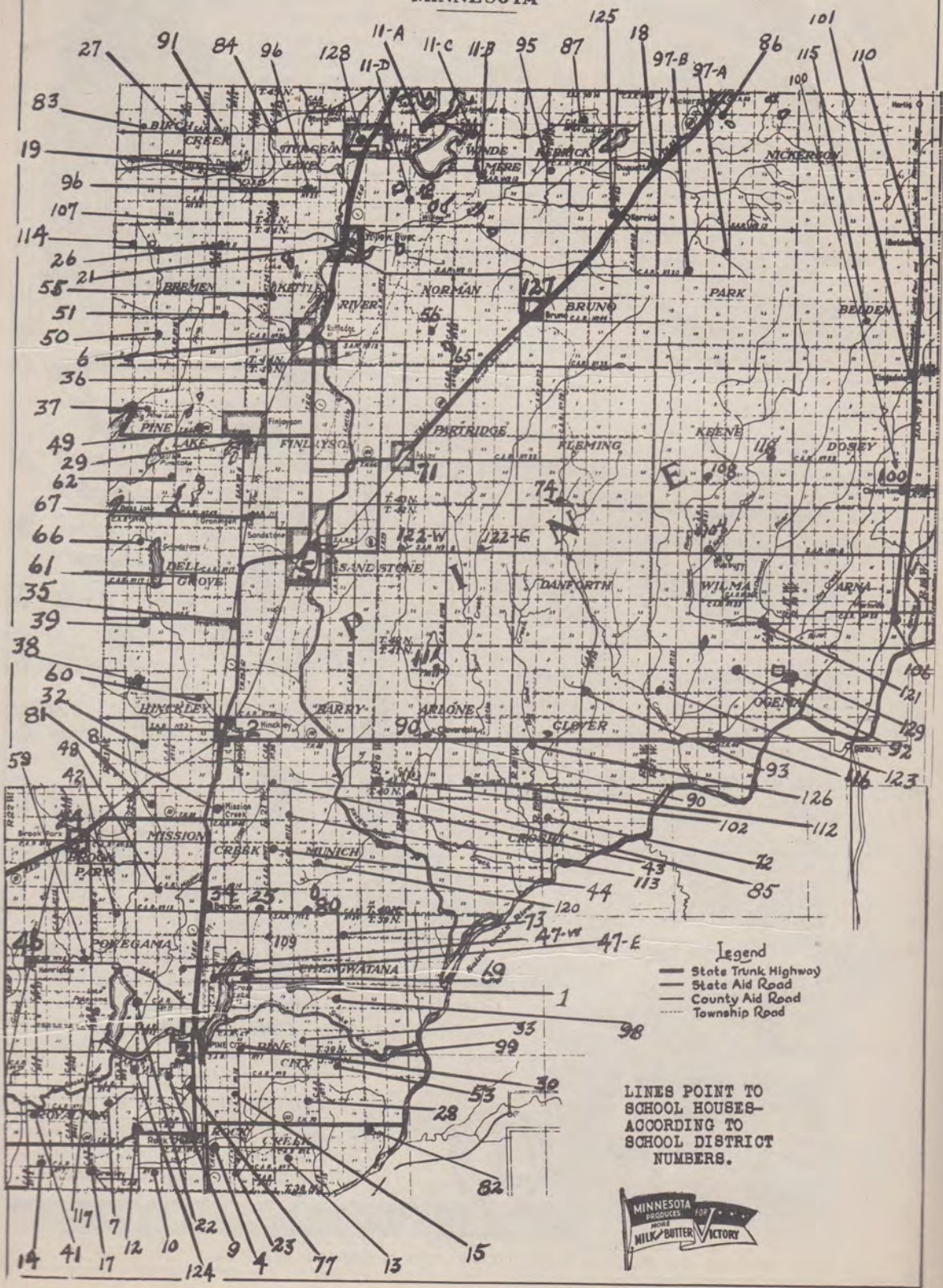

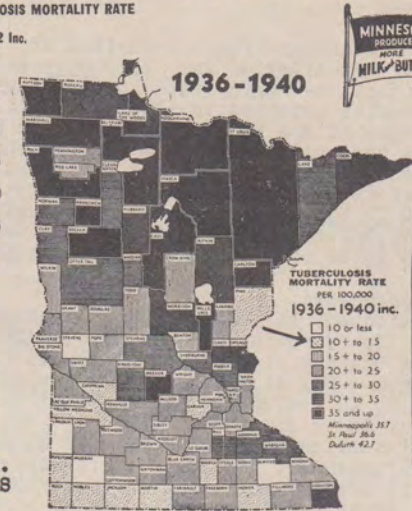

## SUMMARY OF DISCUSSION OF STATE AIDS TO SCHOOLS

by—A.E.Gustafson,

at the Pine City P.T.A.meeting.

## State Aid Funds:

- (A) Endowment Fund---Is made up of INCOME from the Permanent School Fund, and ONE HALF the INCOME from the Swamp Land Fund,
- (B) Current School Fund---Is the money from the INCOME from the State ONE MILL TAX on property.
- (C) Net Income Tax Fund---Includes the State Net-Income Taxes collected annually.
- (D) Special State Aid Fund---Consists of (1)Money from the State Property Taxes(levied for this purpose) by the State Legislature--(that is- appropriated by the Legislature). This in the past usually amounted to about four mills of our State Levy.  
(2)Balance of the Net-Income Taxes not used to pay the ten dollars per child aid (based on the school census).This balance has been used in recent years to reduce the State levy, instead of supplementing the State levy so that all aids could be PAID IN FULL, as was originally intended in the law.  
(3) \$500,000.00 annually transferred from the Current School Fund so as to help to pay aids more nearly "in full".

## State Aids--how paid:

- (A) Apportionment Aid. About \$3.50 per child--average daily attendance. Money comes from the (proceeds)of the Endowment Fund and the balance of the Current School Fund.(Less \$500,000.)
- (B) Net Income Tax Aid. Ten dollars per child--listed on census. Ages 6 to 15 inclusive--also 16 , if in school.
- (C) Special State Aids:  
(1) Classification Aids.(Now paid at 75 per cent of amount)  
(a)Ungraded, according to teachers, term, accredited, etc.  
(b) Graded( four or more elementary teachers--or at least three teachers below Junior High school--grade seven)  
(c)High School.(Dept., Jr.H.S., Sr. H.S.- C, B, or A.)  
(2)High School Tuition Aid.(Seven Dollars per month for each non-resident (rural ) high school student.  
(3)Transportation Aids. (a) Consolidated School Trans.Aid.  
(b)Non-Resident H.S.Trans.Aid. (C)Crippled Child Trans.  
(d) Isolated (rural ) pupil transportation aid.
- (D) Library Aid.(Limited to fifty cents per child per year)
- (E)Supplemental Aid.(1943 paid at 100 %).Is determined by: Average daily attendance, Class-room units, NET Proceeds of 30 mill levy, and Operation costs. (We got that word Net Proceeds inserted into the 1935 law--which alone has saved Pine County Schools (INCLUDING PINE CITY) a total of over \$200,000.00 in the past eight years.)
- (F)Special Departments. (a)Teacher Training (Up to \$1,500.00)  
(2)Agricultural Aid.(Federal & State-nearly three fourths of the cost.(3)Home Economics--Same as Ag. Dept. (4)Industrial Arts.

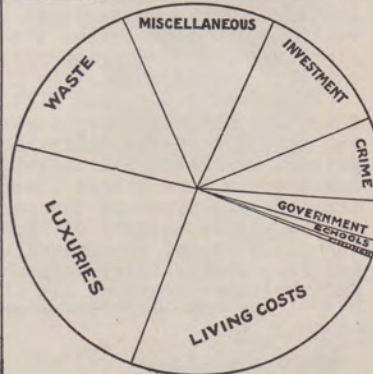

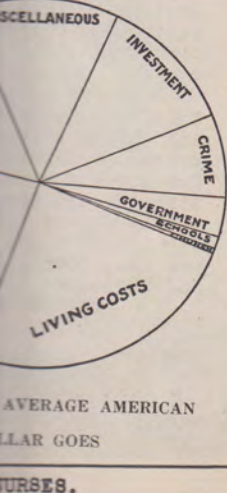

- (a) Office service (clerical and administrative)—Usual office work, records, reports, etc. Also teachers' six weeks' reports, uniform marking system, recommended text book lists, etc.
- (b) Teachers' Professional Growth (Supervisory)—Institutes, group meetings, mimeographed helps, plans and suggestions, demonstrations, etc.
- (c) Pupil Progress (supervisory)—Motivating, testing, and remedial work.
- (d) Pupil Activities (supervisory)—Rural sectional and county declamations, spelling and play day contests. Programs, 4-H Clubs, Garden Clubs, Junior Red Cross, County Fair exhibits, etc. (Creates more interest in regular school work.)

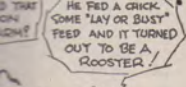

# The Little Schoolmaster's Corner

A professor in the University of Chicago told his pupils that he should consider them educated, in the best sense of the word, when they would say "yes" to every one of fourteen questions he should put to them. It may be of interest to you to

**A TEST** read the questions. Here they are: Has your education given sympathy with all good causes and made you espouse them? Has it made you public-spirited? Has it made you a brother to the weak? Have you learned how to make friends and keep them? Do you know what it is to be a friend yourself? Can you look an honest man or pure woman straight in the eye? Do you see anything to love in a little child? Will a lonely dog follow you in the street? Can you be high-minded and happy in the meaner drudgeries of life? Do you think washing dishes and hoeing corn just as compatible with high thinking as piano playing or golf? Are you good for anything to yourself? Can you be happy, alone? Can you look out on the world and see anything except dollars and cents? Can you look into a mud puddle by the wayside and see anything in the puddle but mud? Can you look into the sky at night and see beyond the stars? Can your soul claim relationship with the Creator?

These characteristics which make one person different or cause him to act differently from another constitute his personality. One's habitual behavior and his manner of meeting unexpected situations are evidences of his personality. We

**PERSONALITY** find persons with charming personalities and others with less attractive and even repulsive personalities. Someone has said, "The secret of being lovely is being unselfish." Generosity, then, is the keynote of a magnetic personality. While courtesy, forgiveness of injuries, regard for the rights and feelings of others will also be found in such characters. Such persons are never without friends. Their own lives are happy, and happiness is spread about them. Then, too, the influence of their good example is widespread and on their account this world of ours becomes a better place for us to live in.

The schoolroom is a very important phase in one's life and should be kept clean. There are several reasons why this is so. One is, the child is in the schoolroom most of the time and it should be kept clean so that those who go there will be healthy in order to go to school and get an education. Of course we know that everyone has to work together to make it possible to have an attractive schoolroom. For instance, if the pupils are not careful with paper and other things that might get on the floor it is not very easy for the others concerned to keep the room clean. Another reason is, the cleanliness of the schoolroom, or how the children are taught to care for their room will affect their after-life. We must also remember that the appearance of the schoolroom helps to tell what kind of people go to that school. We should remember these things and all work together to keep a clean and attractive schoolroom.

### CLEANLINESS OF THE SCHOOLROOM

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If one were asked what is a school, without a long period of reflection he would give a definition. But to tell whether the immediate or ultimate aims are the more valuable would lead into an undecided discussion. These questions are

**WHAT IS A SCHOOL?** self-assertive. Is it more important for the high school to prepare a pupil for college, or to develop a good citizen? Accepted plans may be used to find out how well he is prepared for college, but by no known measure are we able to decide in reference to what are the elements that enter into his citizenship. Yet the school that does not direct its efforts toward that ultimate will fall short of its expected requirement. But the school is handicapped, it cannot create. It must build of the material that is furnished it. When we remember, "Books are only dead things in themselves," the spirit that will tell the most must be given by human agencies; the parent first and then from the teacher. The school is rated according to its product. How far, then, may the products of the school serve society?

RURAL TEACHERS JOURNAL

A Real Purpose in Supervising Schools

Many times teachers fear the appearance of their school superintendent in their schools. Perhaps the reason for this is that they do not know just what their superintendent is there for. Supt. A. E. Gustafson of Pine county, Minn., has given to each of his teachers a copy of the points he looks for upon visiting. This helps the teacher to become a better teacher and thus does away with that FEAR one has when the Superintendent comes to visit. The points are given below:

What I Will Look for When I Visit Your School

(A) Points discussed and explained at group meetings and at the institute:

- (1) Program posted on wall. (Recitation—red. Study Periods—Black)
- (2) Seat chart. Names with lead pencil. (Inside cover of register is a good place.)
- (3) Key for the marking system used in attendance register.
- (4) Standard (normal curve) system of marking. (A-B-C-D-F.)
- (5) Six weeks report cards, reports to Co. Supt. and permanent records.
- (6) Use of class record book in most grades and in most subjects.
- (7) Sufficient tools. (Books, etc.) No teacher nor child can do good work with only a small supply of books or with worn out, dirty, and out-of-date books, etc. It is very poor efficiency and very poor economy to try to do so, unless it is absolutely unavoidable.
- (8) Evidence of successful use of motivation charts. These charts are valuable home made teaching tools
- (9) Evidence of actual playground leadership and supervision.
- (10) Evidence of lesson plans.
- (11) Evidence of silent reading drills. (Grades 4 to 8)
- (12) Evidence of phonics drills—Grades 1 to 4 and in higher grades if necessary.

(13) Evidence of use of the standard tests.

(14) Evidence of some remedial work based on these and other tests.

(15) Evidence of stressing each and every one of the seven great aims in education. (See list in our Year Book.)

(16-22) Evidence of thoughtful attention to the important physical and psychological comforts and protections of the children:

- (16) Heat
- (17) Ventilation
- (18) Light
- (19) Water Supply
- (20) Seating
- (21) Cleanliness and general health
- (22) Harmonious, cheerful and busy atmosphere
- (23) Evidence of proper use of blackboard by children and teacher.
- (24) Signs of good professional interest, professional growth and cooperative spirit on the part of the teacher. (Do you also take at least one professional magazine?)
- (25) Other Points:
- (26) Evidence of some art work, construction work or (seasonable) decorations.
- (27) Proper discipline. (Busy children who have the proper attitudes and efforts because they want to do so, and like to do so, are properly disciplined.)
- (28) Evidence—the children like school. (Quite often, but not always, the teacher is an important factor in this and other attitudes.)
- (29) The State Courses of Study should be studied, checked and followed daily.
- (30-31) Good Teaching Technique: There are different types of recitations, such as teaching, review, drill, and testing recitations, etc. A good teacher uses various types and a mixed type. Most of the teaching work of a teacher is to teach, explain, enrich, guide, and motivate the children. Mere questioning is not always good teaching, but, of course, the use of good questions is one form of good teaching. (Mere telling

is not always good teaching either.) One big job of a teacher's is to make proper, clear, well planned and interesting assignments. Another part of his or her job is to enrich, explain, contribute, and motivate. Having the children to merely stand up and read aloud their History, Geography, and other lessons is usually a sign of a very poor recitation as well as very poor teaching. Check your voice occasionally. Is it clear? Is it nerve wrecking? Is it too low to be understood? How about your own health? Take care of it.

It may be next to impossible for a good teacher to observe all of the 28 points all of the time in a rural school room of many grades, but if most of the above points were observed most of the time, and all observed at least some of the time, the teacher will be able to accomplish much more with less effort. Also remember it is impossible for one to get an accurate measure with only one visit or even several visits.

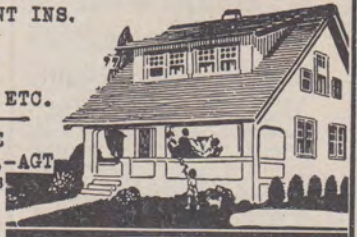

## Our Country's Flag

THE flag of the United States, the emblem of our country, familiarly known as "Old Glory," is one of the oldest and most beautiful of the national flags of the world. It was unfurled to the breeze in the rosy month of June and is the grandest flag ever kissed by the morning sun. When the people of China first saw our country's banner, they said it was beautiful as a flower, and continued to call it the "Flower Flag." Its present design became national on June 14, 1777, at which time it was adopted by Congress on resolution proposed by John Adams of Massachusetts. It is in memory of this event that Flag Day is now generally observed throughout the United States.

The flag represents the living country and is itself considered a living thing. It symbolizes national independence and popular sovereignty. It is not the flag of a reigning family or royal house, but of a hundred and twenty millions of free people welded into a nation, one and inseparable, united not only by community interest, but by vital unity of sentiment and purpose; a nation distinguished for the clear individual conception of its citizens alike of their duties and privileges, their obligations and their rights.

Old Glory was given to the air in the Revolution's darkest days. It is a child of sun and storm and represents the sufferings of the past,

as well as the glories yet to be. It is a symbol of all we are and of all we hope to be. It is the emblem of equal rights. It means free hands, free lips, and self-government. Thus a fourth grade pupil who spells 30 correctly would be an "A" student. A fifth grader with 30 correct would earn a "B" (above average). A sixth grade pupil with this score would be an average "C" student. Thirty correct for a seventh grader would place him in the "D" group, which is below average. For an eighth grader this score of only 30 right would mean that he is in the "Failure" group, or in the lowest ten per cent of the thousands of eighth graders who have taken this test.

Your County Superintendent has worked out scoring or grading charts like this for many kinds of STANDARDIZED TESTS. This helps the teacher. We put on three county wide testing surveys. Two of these were financed almost entirely by the Federal Government. Pine was the only county in our State and Nation to sponsor a Federal Testing Survey of schools. The results showed where to apply the remedial work. Reading still is the greatest weakness in most schools. We stress PHONICS in the lower grades, and more silent reading in the upper grades.

With Federal Aid we also mended about 20,000 books for our libraries.

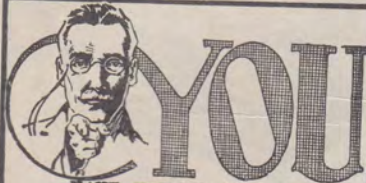

There will be sharp differences at first, of course, but out of these will come the art of living together. When we see that in making a world we need the idea of this race, the note of that race, the color of another race, and the civilization of still another race, that we need all to make up the picture, then, and then only, shall we have learned the art, the divine art, of living together.

There are said to be 3,000,000 human beings still held in slavery.

The real color of the moon is brown, the color of rocks, according to a recent pronouncement of astronomers.

The sun's heat will continue to warm the earth only 15,000,000,000 more years, according to scientific prediction.

OUR WAR AND PEACE AIMS.

UNCLE SAM ( the U.S.A. ) is helping to win this Second World War so that there will be another opportunity to work out a plan for a LASTING PEACE. We must neutralize those doctrines whose outbursts of insane aggression aim to destroy all progress made in real Security and Freedom since the days of the Magna Charta. If these aggressions are not stopped, true Democracy and Human Rights will be completely destroyed. A Third World War would crush our civilization.

After VICTORY, we must avoid a repetition of the mistakes made following the First World War. We must help to organize, and we must join the "United Nations of the World" to Outlaw War and ENFORCE THE PEACE. The Constitution of the United Nations of the World must provide for democratic organization and procedure, and also include the great principles of HUMAN RIGHTS found in our democratic documents and also the Teheran Agreement and the Atlantic Charter.

We must also help to INSURE this PEACE and make it last FOREVER by removing all CAUSES OF WARS. These causes can be condensed into the following list: Economic oppressions or depressions. Hunger and insecurity. Aggressions for wealth or power. Selfish doctrines of intolerance and hate. Uncontrolled systems of exploitation.

We must help to remove forever the CAUSES OF WARS by modernizing our out-dated (world) economic system that seems to demand and promote wars so as to rejuvenate periodic manmade depressions. In order to best pay the costs of this war and reconstruction; in order to provide the RIGHT TO WORK and SECURITY for all; in order to prevent another WORLD DEPRESSION; in order to banish poverty in the midst of plenty; and, in order to destroy all the underlying causes of wars; we must harness the WORLD'S natural resources and machinery of production and distribution to a modern and workable economic program. To INSURE EVERLASTING PEACE, all poverty, oppression and insecurity can and must be banished from our world of plenty. The LIBERATED peoples hope for this. Our peoples on all fronts deserve this.

The control of world security, justice and economy by powerful international private monopolies and cartel agreements must be turned over to GOVERNMENTS of, for and by the PEOPLE. We must now provide and insure BOTH economic and political FREEDOM for all. Rigid Government control or complete government ownership of resources and machines (as Uruguay, Sweden, Costa Rica, Australia, Canada, The Soviet Republics, New Zealand and others have already successfully started) will provide ABUNDANCE for all nations. World resources can provide WORK, yearly incomes, security and abundance for all peoples. Uruguay banished poverty and depressions over twenty five years ago.

In conclusion may we repeat that this World War is being fought and won by THE ALLIED NATIONS to stop the aggressors and "power politics" that threaten all FREEDOMS. We must then help to establish, enforce and insure an EVERLASTING PEACE. We must help to form a strong democratic WORLD GOVERNMENT of "United Nations" to OUT LAW WAR and ENFORCE the peace, which must be INSURED by remodeling our world economic system to meet the modern MACHINE AGE problems and conditions. These are our WAR and PEACE aims.

## WHICH WAY WILL AMERICA CHOOSE?

This war has *proved* that the United States of America has sufficient farms, experienced farmers, factories, technicians, mechanics, and natural resources,—such as coal, iron and oil,—to supply a good standard of living for all our people.

In spite of having 11,500,000 men and women in our armed forces, our production is such as to enable the majority of our people to enjoy the highest standard of living in the world,—and still send goods to our allies, at a time when we are producing enormous quantities of guns, ships, airplanes and munitions.

This is *not* the result of "private enterprise." Many of our big manufacturing plants wouldn't, or at any rate didn't, convert from peace production to war production, *until* the Government guaranteed them prices to cover all costs, including a lot of *wasteful* advertising,—costing the taxpayers billions of dollars.

Government planned war production,—which is much harder to plan than peace production, because submarines, shifts in the fighting, casualties and the enormous distances goods must be carried, upset calculations.

Government takes *all* the risks in war.

After this war *will we go back* to "one-third of our people ill-fed, ill-clad and ill-housed," as we did after World War I?

*If we do—World War III becomes almost inevitable.*

America is the one great nation where nobody needs to "go short"—if willing to work.

We *could be* the storehouse of democracy in peace, as we *are* the arsenal of democracy in war, *if we do not* return to the system under which we *never* produced and distributed enough to maintain peace.

Early in the war, the Government spent about *nine billion dollars* on plants to produce airplanes, machine tools, steel, aluminum, synthetic rubber, gasoline, magnesium, etc.

The Government now owns about *half* the machine tool factory facilities.

The Government owns a *tenth* of steel productive capacity—and enough of many other plants to control much important production.

*The big corporations want these plants.*

Private ownership of factories, mines and other things essential to production—gives the owners the right *not to produce the things the people need*,—unless they get the profits they want.

This is a dangerous form of dictatorship.

It would be as bad policy to give up government plants in peace time, as to give up our ships in war,—if we want to *ensure* full production.

*There is only one way to raise the living standard of all Americans.*

That is to have full production of everything Americans need, and pay producers enough to buy the products of industry and farm, out of current income—*not by general installment buying.*

The U. S. Department of Commerce reports that in 1946:—

"Even with an average work week five hours shorter than in 1940, there would be more unemployed than the thirteen million in 1932."

Aren't thirteen million unemployed, thirteen million too many?

## PROGRAM FOR 1945

### TO PREVENT UNEMPLOYMENT AND DEPRESSION IN THE FUTURE.

1. Conversion of basic industries to peace production, under government control, to be operated by production technicians and engineers, so as to ensure maximum employment, with labor and consumer representation.
2. Getting the government to adopt the principle of paying as large a part as practical of the costs of war by current taxation, based on ability to pay, exempting income essential to health and well being, as determined by government agencies.
3. Government direction of farm production, and control of processing and distribution of farm products, during the war-economy, with direct payments where needed to marginal farmers.
4. Effective government control of prices and of quality of essential consumer goods.
5. The participation of the United States Government in international arrangements, such as the control of money, credit, trade, natural resources and cartels.

1. Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, President the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, said about the war production plants financed by the Federal Government:—

*"When peace comes, these plants with millions of servicemen and women workers will constitute the principal problem in our post-war economy."*

The Defense Plant Corporation has spent about \$9 billion of the people's money, for construction of plants, the chief ones being:—

Aviation	\$ 2,700 million
Machine Tool Manufacturing	1,572 "
Expansion of Steel Production	1,000 "
Aluminum Fabrication	760 "
Synthetic Rubber Manufacturing Plants	625 "
Manufacture High Octane Gasoline	500 "
Magnesium Manufacturing Plants	430 "
Ordnance	459 "

The Government owns about *half* the nation's machine tool factory facilities, and a *tenth* of its steel production capacity.

At the close of the war, corporations will have at least \$60 billion of cash, government bonds, surplus reserves and profits.

Industry has shown it can produce for war, with government underwriting; it *must not be permitted a post-war sit-down strike.*

2. There are about 60 million people in families receiving a family income of less than \$2,500,—averaging four to a family, and many of these families have an income of less than \$1,000.

The Federal Government can raise \$50 billion a year, during the war economy, *without* taxing people with incomes below a health minimum.

The gap of \$35 billion a year between disposable income and consumers' goods available, can be reduced by taxation, and lessen danger of inflation.

Corporation profits *above* taxes, were in 1944 nearly \$9 billion, and during the war corporations have increased their surplus reserves by about \$20 billion.

Almost 97% of the \$222 million net income of the 226 persons having net incomes over \$500,000 in 1941, was from ownership or control of property.

*The larger the income, the larger the larger the proportion from property.*

A 1% tax on the selling price of land, could produce \$450 million.

*Neither sales taxes or other consumption taxes are necessary or wise.*

3 The increase in farm production during the war has been remarkable, but more is needed,—for at least two years.

Direct government payment to marginal farmers for essential foods, is the most practical way to get this, as past experience shows.

Net cash farm income averaged nearly \$9 billion for the four years 1941-44,—or *two and a half times* the average for the five pre-war years.

4. In 1942, *profits of the major meat packers were four times the pre-war level, and profits of the big canners of fruits and vegetables were five times those in pre-war years.*

Similar profits were made by handlers of milk, manufacturers of milk products and of cereals, and by wholesale bakers and flour mills.

The Office of Price Administration, which has prevented such price rises as in World War I,—*has only one-sixth of the funds needed for enforcement.*

Congress has forbidden O.P.A. to enforce grade labelling.

**Grade labelling is essential to ensure quality.**

Price involves *quality*,—as much as dollars and cents.

5. War can be prevented only by social ownership or public control of all basic industries, and international controls of natural resources and other basic materials, of ocean borne commerce, war equipment, markets and currencies.

The British Labor Party is committed to major social ownership at home, and an Association of Nations, *"the collective authority of which must transcend in the economic sphere, the rights of separate nations."*

Eight corporations out of eighty-five affiliated with international cartels, indicted by the Department of Justice for violation of anti-trust laws, *have assets of about \$5,650 million; one-tenth of assets of all manufacturing corporations.*

International government by international cartels, threatens.

The practical alternative is social national and international controls.

The economic system with which America and Britain end this war, will vitally affect the post-war world.
