Dragons Whip Chi-Hi Bulldogs 19-6

Pine City captured their second conference win of the season when they downed the Bulldogs of Lindstrom-Center City by a 19-6 score. The win evens the Dragons' record at three and three, while the Bulldogs lost their fifth straight.

The Dragons scored first as quarterback Jim Rarick bulled in from one yard out. The try for the extra point failed, and the score remained 6-0 at the half.

Joe Mikyska made it a 12-0 lead for the Dragons as he scored on a fine 22 yard run. Allen Erhart added the extra point and the score was 13-0.

Chi-Hi bounced back as they went 80 yards in six plays to cut the margin to 13-6. Halfback Dick Lewis scored for Lindstrom on a pass-lateral play. Lewis is one of the fastest and one of the best backs on the conference.

In the final quarter it was Pine City all the way, even though they could score only one touchdown. That T. D. came on a 13 yard pass from Jim Rarick to Allen Erhart. The try for the extra point failed, and it ended 19-6 for the Dragons.

The Dragon line should be given credit as it played well both offensively and defensively. The lone touchdown scored by Lindstrom would bear out the fine play of the defensive unit.

Dragons, Jays Fight in a Scoreless Battle

An inspired Taylors Falls eleven put the Dragons out of a run for the conference title when they battled the Dragons to a scoreless tie.

The Dragons received to start the game and it looked like a real rout. Well-called ground

plays plus fine passing had taken the Dragons 91 yards to the Jays' one yard line. On the next play the Dragons fumbled, and Taylors Falls took over from there.

For the rest of the game one team or the other was either fumbling or punting. The Dragons fumbled seven times to the Jays' advantage, and the Jays also picked-off three Dragon aeri-als.

In the final 45 minutes the Bluejays attempted two field goals from the three and six yard lines, but each time the kick was wide and low.

Mikyska carried for a yard and then Allen Erhart rounded his left end for the final seven yards and the only tally of the game. Erhart's run was one of the finest of the season, as he appeared to be stopped twice but kept his feet to score the winning marker.

Pine City's defense should be praised as it shut the opponents out for the second straight week. A line touchdown has been scored against them in the last three games. Against North Branch, Ken Blanchard and Bruce Henning were standouts on defense.
