To auction off last two rural schools

The last of the rural schools in Pine county will be sold at public auction on September 19. These districts are 1562 (Hustletown) and 1573 (Milburn). In 1947, there were 7,606 rural schools in Minnesota. This number had been reduced to 921 in 1966. In 1947, Pine county had 108 rural schools; by 1966 this number had been reduced to 19.

The mandatory dissolution act of 1967 decreed that any district which did not offer instruction through grade 12 had until July 1, 1970, to consolidate with a high school district, ed But county boards of commissioners could grant a year of grace.

Many of the country schools have become town halls, some have been remodeled into homes, while others wrecked for lumber. The proceeds go to the consolidated district.

District 1572 Holds Teacher, **Pupil Reunion**

The first pupil-teacher reunion to be held by school district 1572 (old district 30) in its 63-year history took place Sunday, Aug. 20, on the grounds of the school and the Pine town hall.

Well over 300 people gathered for the pot luck dinner. Following the dinner a number of musical selections were presented by a quartet consisting of George Martinson, Joe Roubinek and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Roubinek.

Master of ceremonies for the Th afternoon program was Ira Van he Gordon of Hinckley. A history of the school was prepared and presented by Mrs. Leslie Karas.

District 30 was founded in 1898 when the first classes taught by br Alice and Fred McKusick, were w conducted in the house now owned by Al Bina. The present building was constructed in 1900. A roll call of students attending the 1899-1900 term of school under Miss Lillie Kook was made. Ed Kuss, Frank Karas, Joe Karas, Hans Grandt, Minnie Bjork Swanson, Ira Van Gordon and Albin Lundin answered by coming forward. Ed Kuss as spokesman entertained the audience with some memories of those school days.

The list of teachers who have guided the youngsters of district 30 since the turn of the century were given. Former teachers were introduced by Mr. Van Gordon. Each in turn spoke briefly.

The oldest teacher present was Miss Edythe Robinson who taught three terms ending with the 1904-05 term. Bessie Lockerby (1910-11) and Tella Brekke Colman (1913-13) were also present. Other former teachers attending included Ellen Lindstrom Boppel, Mrs. Edith Kofoed, Mrs. Pearl Noleen Striegl, Mrs. Ethel Carlson Edin, Miss Carmen Kelley, Miss Aurelia Lahodney and Mrs. Helen Wickstrom Kozak.
