- 1. Fair will open Thursday, August 14 at 9:00 a.m. August 14 will be entry day.
- 2. The Superintendents of the several divisions shall have entire charge of their respective departments.
- 3. The judges will, in nearly all departments, be experts from the Agricultural College or experts in their line from outside of Pine county.
- 4. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves when their animal will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly when called. It is our intention, in so far as possible, to judge this department during the morning of the third day. (Saturday).
- 5. Farm products, fruit, flowers, domestic and household goods must be the production of the exhibitors or some member of the family to be entitled to compete for prizes. See Div. G for special rules.
- 6. Exhibitions are entitled to exhibit any number of anticles, but no anticle can be entred in more than one lot, except where noted. An exhibitor may make only one entry in any one lot.
- 7. The right is reserved to accept or reject any entry offered.
- 8. Where there is but one exhibitor competing for a premium, the exhibit may receive recognition as first place, or second at the descretion of the judge.
- 9. Entries for premium may be made to the secretary or superintendents of the various depantments, either personally or by letter, but all animals or anticles for exhibition, must be in the proper department not later than 6 p.m. the first day of the fair. Judging will begin promptly at 9 a.m. the second day, Friday, August 15. Exception, livestock, and see flower department.
- 10. Awards for premiums will be designated by card, sticker or ribbon as follows: First, blue; Second, red; Third, white.
- 11. Premiums will not be awarded on exhibits that are inferior or are not considered worthy by the judges regardless of lack of competition.
- 12. The management will provide police protection day or night, and will take every precaution in their power for the protection and preservation of stock and articles on exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss, damage, disease, sickness, or injury that might occur.
- 13. All exhibits in the division of Culinary, Dairy Products, Vegetables, Fruit, Flowers, Grains and Seeds must be made, grown, or produced within the current year and owned by the exhibitor unless otherwise specified.
- 14. All entries must be made before 6 p.m., Thursday, August 14.
- 15. Premiums not claimed within thirty days after the close of the fair will be considered forfeited to the society. Errors in premium checks must be reported to the secretary within 15 days of the date of check.
- 16. Premiums will be paid only on those entries made in accordance with the premium

- list. Items not listed in premium list are not eligible for any premiums.
- 17. Residents of adjoining counties, whose fairs permit exhibitors from Pine county, may exhibit here.
- 18. No changes, additions, or alterations will be permitted after the books are placed in the hands of the judges and all exhibitors must be certain their entries are entened in the proper class and lot. It will be the duty of the judge to rule out any exhibit not corresponding with the entry list.
- 19. Inquiries as to terms and applications for space for concessions must be made to the secretary. (Albrecht Enhart, Rt. 2, Pine City).
- 20. Entries must not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on the night of the 4th day, Sunday, August 17. Exceptions being livestock which may be removed from the grounds after 4 p.m. Violations of this will be sufficient grounds for forfeiture of any premiums won thereon.
- 21. Buildings will not be kept open later than 11 p.m. each night. Doors will not open before 9 a.m .Actual hours will be determined by the management.
- 22. The Pine County Agricultural Society reserves to its board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and settle all questions and differences arising there-

In classes where registered cattle and horses are called for, all animals over 1 year of age must be presented with registration papers or Certificates of Transfer issued by the society in which they are eligible for registry. Registered animals without papers can only be entered

No exhibitor of livestock shall be allowed to make more than one entry in any one lot, unless prior approval is obtained from the division superintendent.

IMPORTANT NOTICE - Persons intending to exhibit livestock will kindly notify the secretary or superintendent as to the number of stalls desired. We request this so we may be able to provide ample barn room for everything. This must be done 10 days prior to the opening day of the fair.

All cattle must be T.B. and Bangs tested as prescribed by the regulations of the Minnesota Sanitary Board.

All exhibitors of bulls, one year and over, must lead such animals with a suitable staff attached to the nose ring.

All livestock exhibitors must provide their own grain, hay and straw.

All breeds to be judged separately. Registration papers must be shown at time of entry. Entrance fee of \$2.00 per head will be charged on all horses and dairy animals.

The fair board has the right to accept or

reject any or all exhibitors.

#### BOYS AND GIRLS 4-H CLUB WORK

#### Don Vollman, County Agent

This department is open to all regularly enrolled 4-H club members. All members are encouraged to exhibit their work. ENTRIES ARE PERMITTED ONLY IN THE PROJECTS IN WHICH A MEMBER IS ENROLLED. (One entry per lot and three lots per project unless otherwise stated. Advanced members cannot enter in the beginners section, etc.) Project rules as outlined in the 4-H record blanks will be the basis of awards. Exhibits must have been made, grown by, or cared for by the club member. Some help or advice is encouraged. Entry indicates these rules were followed and any violation will mean forfeiture of prizes and any trips or honors won.

Club members planning to exhibit at the county fair should send their record and story to the County Agent's Office, Hinckley, Minn., before July 25, 1969. All records will be judged complete or incomplete. State trips require that both exhibit and record be complete. Club members must be at least 12 years of age during the calendar year before they can be eligible for trips to state events. Trips are awarded according to regulations of the State 4-H Club department.

All pieces of an exhibit must be labeled with name, address, age and club. Sew labels to fabric, tape to wood and other materials.

Cards are provided for livestock pens and stalls.

Livestock members must make advance entry with the County Agent, Hinckley, Minn. by August 1, 1968. This will allow sufficient time to have testing done. Bedding will be provided. Hay, feed and transportation must be provided by the member.

A member having an incomplete record and receiving a blue grade on the project entered will receive a blue ribbon, but red premium money. County, State and National record awards are based not only on quality of exhibit, but quality of record and story. Both record and exhibit are considered for final awards.

Purple ribbons will be awarded for exhibits of deserving menit.

If exhibitor wins more than one trip to State events he can only exhibit one item. Blue ribbon exhibits are eligible for trips according to State rules and allotments.

All Home Economics exhibits are to be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., Thursday, August 14 and will be judged orally.

4-H livestock exhibits may be removed from the fairgrounds after 4:00 p.m. and other exhibits after 6:00 p.m. Sunday, August 17, 1969. Livestock members are expected to feed and care for their own animals. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of premium won on that entry. Pre-registration of animals is required. All livestock exhibits must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Thursday, August 14, 1969.

#### LIVESTOCK-General Rules

All beef and dairy entries must have been tested for tuberculosis and brucellosis within 60 days before exhibiting. Health certificates must accompany entries. Feed records must be for 3 months or longer for sheep, pigs, and poultry, and 6 months or longer for Dairy and Beef. Bedding only will be furnished. Poultry only will be fed (grain provided) and watered. Member must show own entry or forfeit any premium won.

Members must keep own exhibit area clean. To be eligible for Beef and Dual Purpose Heifer classes, beef heifers must be either purebred (purebred heifers may be registered in the club member's name only, or in partnership with parents) or be sired by a purebred registered bull and from a grade cow (letter signed by owner of the sire giving name and number of sire is required). Letter, registration papers, or proof of registration must accompany 4-H member's record. Dual purpose heifers may be either grade or purebred. This class will include Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, Milking Shorthorn, and Red Polled Breeds.

All blue ribbon livestock are eligible for State Fair lineup and are expected to compete.
