Tax Payers Hit Again

No Questions Asked as Askov Paper Charges County Higher Than Contract.

At the first regular monthly meeting of the board of county commissioners following the letting of the county printing to the highest bidder, last month, the board passed a bill of the Askov paper for \$17.38 for the month of February for \$18. This is just 1 month's business. There remain 11 months more of the year in which such bills may be passed. It looks as though the Pokes' estimate, that the bid of the Askov paper on the county printing was from \$90 to \$1,000 higher than the bid submitted to the county board, is already proven correct. The difference has already come over the \$60 mark as allowed by the board.

One of the items in the bill of the Askov paper is for publishing personal property tax list amounting to 150 folios, for which they charge \$10.25 at the rate of 75 cents per folio. They make this charge and it is allowed by the board, notwithstanding the fact that they agreed in their bid for the county printing to print all publications required by law at the rate of 25 cents per folio (for all not in excess, which is all that is required for the personal property tax list). This looks to us as though the Askov paper had charged \$10.25 for work that it had agreed to do for \$9.75 and that the taxpayers of the county are the losers for the difference, amounting to \$17.50 on this one item. We doubt whether this is a good, honest business.

The bid of the Askov paper for the county printing reads: "We will cause to be published in the Askov American, a legal newspaper, the auditor's financial statement, the proceedings of your board, and all other notices required by law of or by your board during the year 1919 for the sum of... (2) cents per folio for the first insertion and (1) cent per folio for each subsequent insertion." The language seems to be perfectly plain—"all other notices required by law." The bid was for county printing, to be paid for by the county, and the publication of the personal property tax list is "required by law" and is paid for by the county commissioners. It looks to us as though the Askov paper was seeking to use taxpayers and that the county commissioners were standing for it.

The commissioners were in session from Monday afternoon to Thursday of last week, the editor of the Askov paper, Judge Thierman, went to Center City Tuesday, to provide in probate court there, yesterday, in a hearing, a case where Judge Stark was an interested party.

EVERYBODY IS NOW FIGURING INCOME TAX

In Order to Be Helpful to Public, Internal Revenue Bureau Has Every Available Officer in Field.

SEVERE PENALTIES IF YOU DELAY BEYOND MARCH 15

With the due date for Income Taxes only a few weeks away, the collection of this far-reaching tax on 1918 incomes has started off with a bang. Everybody is figuring income tax.

Payments and sworn statements of income must reach Internal Revenue offices on or before March 15, and there are severe penalties for delinquency. Residents of Minnesota are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to Edward J. Gray, Collector of Internal Revenue, St. Paul, Minn., or to any of his deputy collectors who are now doing free advisory work on income tax.

"Pay Your Income Tax by March 15" is the slogan of the Internal Revenue Bureau, which has sent every available officer into the field to help the public to understand and prepare the returns and to prepare the returns.

Who Must Make Return

It is estimated that many thousands of single and married persons in this section of the United States who have never before made annual returns are required to do so this year.

Income tax returns must be made between now and March 15 by persons who come under the following classification:

Any unmarried person whose 1918 net income was \$1,000 or over. Widows and widowers, divorced and married persons who are living apart from their husbands or wives, are for the purpose of the Income Tax classed as unmarried.

Any married person living with wife or husband whose 1918 net income was \$2,000 or over. The income of both husband and wife must be considered, together with the earnings of minor children, if any.

Revenue Bureau Officers Aid

Each person in the United States who is in either of these classifications must get busy at once if penalties are to be avoided. He should secure a blank Form 1040 for the purpose of filing his return.

Each person whose 1918 net income was \$1,000 or over, or Form 1040 if his net income exceeded that amount. Forms are being distributed by collectors and their deputies, also by banks. By following the instructions on the forms, a correct return may be made at home. If a person needs advice or aid, the Deputy Collectors in the field will furnish this without charge.

The new Revenue Law places the Income Tax duty on citizens and residents. The Internal Revenue Bureau is sending its men to work right with the public to get the tax and the returns in. With nothing to pay, every tax due March 15 will be paid and every return required by law will be in the Revenue offices on time.

Exemptions Are Allowed

A single person is allowed a personal exemption of \$1,000. If he is supporting in his household relatives who are dependent upon him he may claim the status of the head of a family who has the same exemption as if married.

A married person who lives with wife or husband is allowed a personal exemption of \$2,000. If he is supporting in his household relatives who are dependent upon him he may claim the status of the head of a family who has the same exemption as if married.

A husband and wife living together are exempt from the tax on a net income of \$2,000. If they make separate returns the exemption may be claimed by either or both.

Ate the Geese and the Goose Bled

Finlayson Farmer Gets Away With Geese But the Butcher Got Him

George Nebur of Pine Lake town pleaded guilty to stealing 200 pounds of butter and two dressed geese from the refrigerator of the Finlayson creamery about December 16 last, before Judge Stevens here, last week, and was sentenced to spend two years in the state penitentiary, being taken to Stillwater at once by Sheriff Hawley, to begin his sentence.

The identity of the man who committed the crime was unknown for a couple of months after it was committed, but Sheriff Hawley found selling more butter about Stillwater than it was thought his three cows could produce, especially since he was already selling cream and milk to the creamery. A search warrant was secured here and Sheriff Hawley went to his house on the north side of the lake about seven miles west of Finlayson, where he found about 125 pounds of the butter still in the original 50-pound packages—part of it apparently having just been deposited in the cellar and part being found buried in the snow some distance from the house.

When asked whether he committed the crime, Nebur fairly bristled with anger and wanted to be shown the man who accused him of it, but when he was confronted with the evidence he meekly concluded, "Well I guess I must have done it."

When asked why he did it, Nebur's reply was to the effect, "He was hard up and had to live. He said that he had eaten the stolen geese—the geese."

Nebur is about 35 years of age, strong and healthy and capable. He is married, but has no children. They moved up to Pine Lake town from Indiana, about four years ago.

There are several other burglaries at Finlayson the past few months, including a burglary of the butcher shop last August when it was practically "cleaned out" about \$150 worth of meat and eating utensils, and again in October when less was found to take. The depot was also broken into and some change taken.

This road if built will pass through Fox, Grasson, Brank, Cambridge, and through to Minneapolis, and other cities in Minnesota.

The final organization meeting will take place about March 15, in Kansas City, when permanent officers will be elected and arrangements will be made for marking the entire route.—The Mornings.

First Commercial Airship

An aeroplane flying at considerable height passed over town at about 12:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and afforded citizens a novel sight as it sped on its way to Duluth. The airship was making an experimental trip for the government and carried mail from Duluth to Minneapolis and back, without doubt the foremost of its kind, under the flight of air craft to ply between the city and the head of the lake. According to the official report, the plane made the trip at an average speed of 75 miles an hour, making the run from Lake Calhoun to Duluth in about three hours. The airship again passed over town on its return trip the following day, and was forced to make a landing descending on Cross lake, opposite the Beds home, where for a brief period it was a center of attraction.

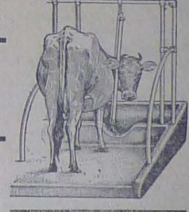

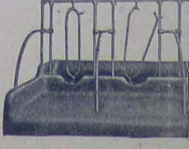
