Welcome "The Boys"

All Parts of the Co. Preparing to Come to Pine City for "Home Coming"

As a general synopsis of the entertainment at the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Home Coming Welcome, to be held at Pine City on July 4, the following is an outline of the program for the day:

The parade is to be a military one, of soldiers, sailors and marines in uniform, followed by Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., Knights of Columbus, Salvation Army and other patriotic floats, including two brass bands and headed by the marshal of the day. It will take place at 10 a. m.

Dinner will be served by the two hotels and restaurants in addition to church organizations. Every Pine County soldier, sailor and marine, together with Red Cross nurses, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Knights of Columbus and Salvation Army workers who have returned from active service will be furnished dinner free.

The exercises will be held in Robinson park at 1:30 p. m. Mr. E. B. Linsley of Willow River, will act as chairman. There will be community singing, music by the Sandstone quartet, Askov and Brook Park bands and Crescenet orchestra, followed by an address by the Rev. John Talmadge Bergen, D. D. of Minneapolis, First Lieut. aerial service, who has been recently mustered out. Rev. Bergen is described as one of the most forceful and patriotic orators in the state of Minnesota, and the committee were fortunate in securing him to make this address.

At 3 o'clock p. m., a program of sports will be put on at the Fair Grounds. No admission will be charged. This will consist of a game of base ball between the Rock Creek and Finlayson clubs, together with the usual line of sports that form a part of the justification, such as running races, egg races, water races, two legged races, etc. etc., also spectacular amusements.

In connection with the above sports a number of water sports will be put on in the river, immediately adjoining the fair grounds—boat races, swimming contest, log rolling contest and diving contest. Immediately after supper there will be a ten round sparring contest between Charles McCarthy and Sammy Terrin at the Fair Grounds. Both of these men are in the first

division of boxing fame and have a national reputation. This bout will be preceded by a preliminary contest. Soldiers, sailors and marines will be admitted free.

In the evening there will be a short musical entertainment in Robinson Park. Music will be furnished by the Askov and Brook Park bands, Sandstone quartet and Crescenet orchestra.

A grand Military Ball will be held in the Armory at 9 p. m. Complimentary tickets for this will be furnished all soldiers, sailors and marines of Pine County.

At 10:30 p. m. the most gorgeous display of fireworks ever exhibited in this part of the state will take place.

Invitations to this celebration will be sent to every returned soldier, sailor, marine and representative of auxiliary government organizations in connection with the war, who are located in the county. This invitation is accompanied by a free ticket to the Military Ball.

An effort is being made to get the names of all returned soldiers, sailors and marines, but as many will be coming back late, it is desired that all consider themselves invited, and that those who do not receive complimentary tickets through the mail, call at the information booth for them.

It will be necessary for all returned soldiers, sailors and marines to secure a ticket for dinner, which is furnished free, and of which they are invited to take advantage. These tickets will be obtained at the secretary's office at the Information Bureau.

It is requested that all soldiers, sailors and marines appear in uniform, if possible, and that as many as can do so, take part in the parade at 10:30 a. m.

Sufficient space will be provided for the proper parking of automobiles. The town will be policed and although the celebration will be a mammoth one, it will be sanely conducted. There are excellent picnic grounds and space will be provided for those who desire to bring their lunch. There are ample opportunities for picnics, boating, bathing and fishing.

Farmers Will Build Warehouse

A meeting of the Farmers Warehouse Association was held in Prochaska's hall, Tuesday afternoon, and arrangements completed for building the long-talked-of Farmers' potato warehouse at this place. There were a majority of the shareholders present, notwithstanding the weather, time etc.

Last fall the railway company demanded \$600 from the farmers to pay the cost of moving the "house" track so as to give them a location on it. This was considered excessive and, after months of consideration, they have finally scaled their demands down to \$173 which it was considered better to pay than to delay putting up the warehouse as soon as possible and possibly interfere with cooperative handling of this fall's crops.

The Pine Packer confesses that the railway's demands look to us unreasonable and unjustified, as we understand it, but we also regard the position of the association in preferring to pay the demanded amount than to submit to further delay as good business. It looks to us as though the railway company were compelling the farmers to pay for correcting and improving its position at Beroun.

The railway will move its depot as we understand it, to the east side of the main track and the "house" track will then be relocated to parallel the main track and give room on the west side to build warehouses between the house track and the Federal highway without interfering with the traffic, which will be great in years to come, on the latter road.

The Assn. hopes to be able to begin work on the proposed warehouse within a month if the ground is cleared before that. It will be 26x50, located south of the crossing and is hoped to be ready to handle the potato crop.

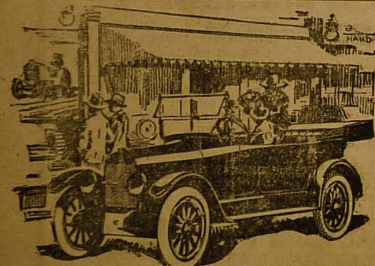
