County Com. in Session

Have Busy Session This Week
Lots of Important Business Considered

The county commissioners at their regular monthly meeting, Monday, were presented with a number of petitions asking for changes in school districts, and delegations from various parts of the county were present urging the board to do more roadwork.

A large delegation headed by Gustaf Hendrickson living southeast of Pine City, and a number of Pine City business men waited on the commissioners Tuesday p. m. requesting them to build a bridge across the St. Croix river on the section line between sec. 13 and 24 township 28, range 2, this being on the public road running east 3 1/2 miles south of Pine City, and on the section line coming into Grantsburg, also to have the road recommended as a state road, this road to go south 1/2 mile to Rock Creek then west to Kanabec county. There is no bridge over the St. Croix river from Danbury to Taylor Falls—a distance of 60 miles—and the people of that community feel that a bridge, at that point, is badly needed. The bridge site picked by the delegation is as good as can be found in that vicinity, they say, the river being 350 feet wide at that point. The commissioners were apparently in favor of the road and bridge but felt dubious about the county being able to secure aid from the state as the State Highway Commission has not as yet designated this road as a state road. A spirited discussion was held between the commissioners and the delegation, the board finally laying the petition on the table to be taken up at the next meeting.

Work on the much discussed road to the Pokegama Lake Sanitarium is to be started at once, the work to be done by day labor at an estimated cost of a little over \$8,000. C. H. Weehrs and Norman Ward submitted a bid of \$8,469.92 for the construction of the road and

\$469.92 additional for building the culverts. The contract was offered to them if they would include the culverts in the price of \$8,469.92 which they refused. Sometime ago Dr. Taylor, of the sanitarium, offered to donate \$1,000 toward the construction of a road from Pine City to the sanitarium and the commissioners expect to receive that amount to apply on this job.

A petition from Brook Park asking that the town be incorporated as a village, was approved, and an election, for the purpose of electing officers, will be held Sept. 20, 1919. Bids were opened for the construction of a road 3 1/2 miles long running from the Federal highway to Finlayson and the contract was awarded to Kuhlman Bros. at a cost of \$17,848.81, work to be completed before July 1, 1920.

Clifford LaTarré, John Sarley, Frank L. Sizer and Carl Hanson petitioned the board to set-off school district 57—near Graaston—to district no. 2 in Kanabec county, but the petition was denied.

A new school district to be known as district 115 was created out of districts 101, 76 and 54 in Dosey township.

A petition asking for a new road beginning at the Danbury bridge and following the Soo railway to the county line was accepted and the road was ordered laid out.

A contract for straightening the Rush lake road was awarded to N. S. Bernier for \$1,135. Mile posts were ordered on state roads 1 and 2 in the county.

The auditor was ordered to advertise for bids for a new grader for road work for the county.

The petition, which was printed sometime ago, asking that the county be redistricted into new commissioner districts was rejected. The board adjourned Wednesday morning to meet again Sept. 11.

Salvation Army Drive Over the Top Ben C. Boo, chairman of the Salvation Army Home Service Drive, reports that the county has raised its quota of funds asked by the organization. The committees that have solicited the funds found very little difficulty in getting subscriptions as the general public seemed to appreciate the wonderful work done by the Salvation Army during her war and were willing to help them continue the good work at home.

Pine City was very successful in the doughnut drive, reporting sales amounting to \$71.28. The committee in charge wish to thank Mrs. Paul Perkins, chairman of the girls' committee, Mrs. Wm. Bantlem, Mrs. W. P. Gotrovy and Mrs. John Flayton for making the doughnuts, and the young ladies for the big results from the sales.

New Warehouse for Brook Park The report that our village would be supplied with another potato warehouse is now confirmed. Peterson and Pearson of Henriette will begin at once the construction of a building 345x50 feet which they expect to have open for business Sept. 1. The building will be located west to the stockyards, thus placing it at the junction of the west and Quamba roads and on the stockyard spur track.

Osborn Therson of Henriette will have charge of the warehouse and expects to move his family here soon—Brook Park Banner.

Free Tuition for Discharged Soldiers The last legislature passed a law set whereby the state is to pay the tuition of all returned service men who want to attend college. It is not generally known, however, and many who do know are under the impression that it applies only to the State University and colleges that maintained a students' army training corps. Other schools are included, among them the Mankato Commercial College, the amount of tuition that will be paid for each soldier is limited to \$200.

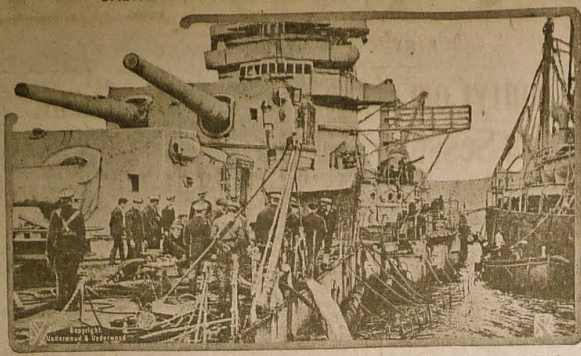

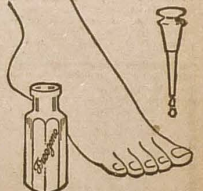

"It is surprising how many things can be done to a man by a shell and leave him still living," Miss Hammond said. "And the things that can be done to make it worth while for him to go on living are even more surprising."

"Facial surgery is one profession that has gone ahead from the impetus of the war in leaps and bounds. The marvels that the doctors of Europe performed were not entirely unknown before the war, but they were in the theoretical stage. There was no chance to put these theories into practice, except in widely isolated cases. There is nothing impossible in facial surgery now."

CLEARED OUT BOLSHIEVI

FAMOUS PEACE TREATIES

By H. IRVING KING

TREATY OF CONSTANTINOPLE, 1841

When the Present Egypt Was Evolved.

The British possession of Egypt is something into which England "just naturally drifted." The force of its necessities was stronger than treaties and diplomacy, and after occupation of the country subsequent to the Arab Revolt in 1882, England found herself in the position of the man who held the bird by both paws around a tree—it was more dangerous to let go than to hold on. Yet up to the recent proclamation of a British protectorate over the land of the Nile and the setting up of a sultan independent of Turkey following the signing of the Khedive abbas with Germany, Egypt remained part of the Turkish empire, a vassal state paying an annual tribute of \$3,000,000 and governed nominally by a hereditary vassal prince. It was governed under the treaty of 1841, which was forced upon the Khedive abbas by the western powers obtained their foothold in the land of the Pharaohs. Mehmet Ali was a Turkish officer who first went to Egypt in 1798 as commander of the army of the sultan. Well in restoring order there that in 1805 the sultan appointed him governor. But all found his government was constantly threatened by the famous Mamelukes, a cavalry corps of the Egyptian army consisting of the descendants of those Mamluks, Turkish and other slaves sold by Gen. Khan to the Egyptian sultan in the thirteenth century who, in 1811, revolted in 1813, made themselves masters of the country. The Turkish government overthrew the Mamelukes in 1817 and Egypt became a Turkish province. But the military caste of the Mamelukes was still a power as a section of the Egyptian army until Ali's time.

In 1811, seeing that there was a question of survival between the Mamelukes and himself, Ali decided the matter by a massacre of the Mamelukes. The Citadel of Cairo was the scene of the principal slaughter, the Mamelukes were annihilated. No wholesale master of Egypt, Mehmet Ali threw off his Turkish allegiance and conquered Syria in 1813. In 1820 he defeated the British in two engagements that it seemed as if his banners were certain to win in the hands of the sultan. That old idea which for so many centuries has prevented the Turk from being out of Constantinople must not be distributed, lest the Turk being out of Constantinople, a general war should ensue for

TREATY OF SHIMONOSEKI, 1895

A New Power Arises in the East When Japan Declares War on China.

The western nations wide up to the fact that a great power had appeared in the East when in 1894 Japan declared war on the vast empire of China and speedily brought her to knees. The realization that a naval and military power of the first class had come into being on the eastern shores of the Pacific was not a pleasant one and caused a great fluttering among the "chancellors" of Europe, and was not viewed without concern in the United States.

It was because of her war with China and her subsequent war with Russia that Japan occupies the position she does today among the nations. The treaty of Shimonoseki and the treaty of Portsmouth placed her among the leading nations of the world. The war between China and Japan arose over the affairs of Korea. In the Sino-Japanese war Japan paid tribute to Japan and after the treaty of Shimonoseki in 1895 and the coming of the Mikado into his own, responded demands for a continuation of the Korean, Chinese and Japanese intrigues at the Korean court, and a predominant influence in the land of the morning calm and transformed it into a land which has no equal.

Japan Aligned Invasion. In June of 1894 a Chinese army was sent into Korea for the ostensible purpose of putting down a rebellion which threatened the Korean king. Japan declared this to be an interference of the treaty between herself and China made in 1895, and dispatched a Japanese army which occupied the Korean capital and the port of Chemulpo, and settled the route connecting the two ports. Because the relations between a Chinese army and a Japanese army were such when in Seoul, Japan upon her territory was not to be disturbed—within they refused to do. The Japanese army was sent to get into Seoul. China said she was powerless to do anything, but she would not get into Seoul. Japan had refused her demand.

It was obvious that Japan would win, and on July 25, 1895, England proposed that the United States should help her in an intervention to prevent the war. The United States refused.

EFFICIENT APPLE STORAGE HOUSE WILL INSURE GROWER AGAINST MATERIAL LOSS

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture. It is just about as reasonable to expose butter to the heat of the mid-summer sun and expect it to retain its firm, solid consistency as it is to try to keep apples in an attractive, marketable condition in the storage houses available on many farms.

Common Storage Protects the Apple Against Extreme Heat, Cold and Moisture.

It is placed on four sides of the house opening below the level of the false floor. The intake vents should be at least 24 by 30 inches and should be provided with tight-fitting insulated doors, being placed about 15 feet apart.

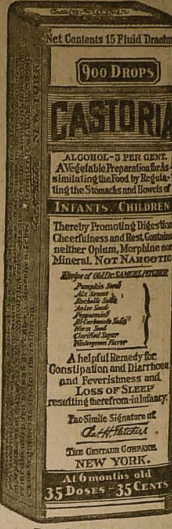

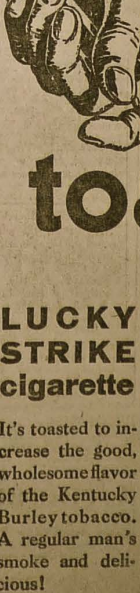

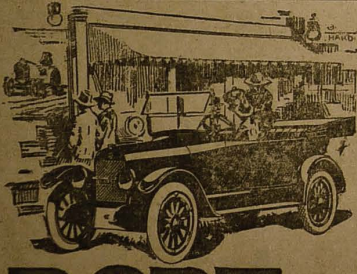

Potato Marketing

Most farmers of Pine County and this region are interested in the subject of potato marketing. It is a large question and deserving of consideration. Some communities in the county are particularly interested in a potato warehouse association. To such communities the Farm Bureau is willing and anxious to lend any assistance possible. Successful potato marketing depends first of all upon the quality of the product and the reputation that is maintained by the community. As in all marketing projects the community reputation does not rest entirely upon a few men who are willing and anxious to send out only A 1 stuff. The right kind of community reputation can only be maintained when every man selling potatoes sees to it that he sells only A 1 stock. This is the first fundamental point in better marketing returns. The second point is standard and is pretty well understood in Pine county. This was made possible mainly through the efforts of the County Farm Bureau Association.

The Farm Bureau office is prepared to furnish all sorts of assistance on warehouse plans, organization methods and other details that often come up. The potato warehouse association at Beroun is taking steps to market collectively in large quantities and build up a reputation for their community on the basis above mentioned. Askov Produce Association was organized last year and made a successful fall averaged favorably with the prices paid elsewhere and this spring their net returns averaged higher than other local markets.

As we have so often stated before the two principal ways of increasing net returns of the potato crop or any other farm product are: 1st, and most important, efficient production. Second, and next important, efficient marketing. A combination of these two factors will surely bring results.

Higher Yielding Rye

Considerable rye is raised in certain parts of Pine county. To much or nearly all of it is common rye. The Farm Bureau calls your attention to the pure certified rosen rye of Michigan. It yields from one and one-third to twice as much as every other rye, and is harder in the straw. The Farm Bureau suggests that farmers get a few bushels right away for fall seeding.

The crop improvement Association of Michigan has fixed prices for inspected certified seed as follows: 1 to 10 bu. \$2.75 per bu., 10 to 100 bu. \$2.50 per bu., 100 or more bu. \$2.25 per bu. We suggest that all interested in higher yielding and more profitable rye notify the Farm Bureau at once. Combinations of small orders can be made so as to get the lowest prices. Samples of rosen rye can be seen at the Farm Bureau office. Sacks and freight would be extra and 25 per cent cash must accompany the order.

Mr. Martin of Hinckley sowed two bushels last fall and he says it is way ahead of the common rye.

County Exhibit at State Fair That Pine county grows A-No. 1 products is an established fact, but whether we get near the front in the State Fair Contest this fall depends on whether or not the best of our products are on display. Mr. Puffer, Pine City, has charge of the exhibit. Everyone interested in Pine county should save the best corn, grain, wild and tame game, potatoes, vegetables, fruit, etc., that they find. Submit these to Mr. Puffer so that he can put up an attractive booth from the best we produce in Pine county.
