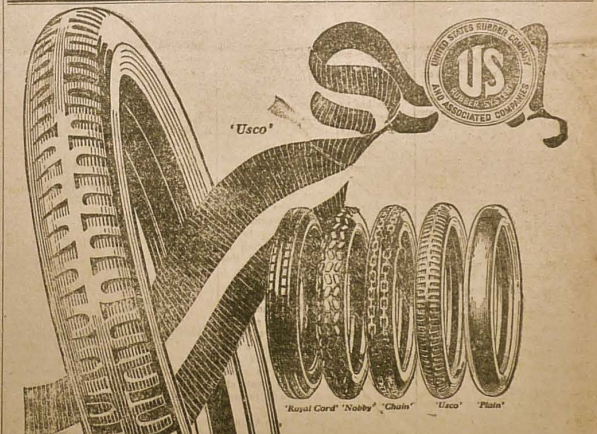

#### Agricultural Notes—News etc.

Frank Karsky has produced some excellent yellow dent corn on lots in Pine City which matured well and was cut the latter part of last week.

Farmers who have a good second crop of clover are in a position to buy more land or another automobile or to add materially to their bank balances. Andrew Bosa, vice director of the Minnesota experiment station, finds that clover seed is becoming exceedingly scarce because of two or three dry seasons, and his advice to those who have good fields of clover is to save and market all the seed possible. Medium red clover seed he says, is nearly always taken from the second crop and there is, therefore, plenty of time for the seed to cure and fill. Clover for seed should be cut when dead ripe. On drier lands in central and northern Minnesota and Pine county there is good prospect for clover seed to mature, according to Mr. Bosa. Where yields of one and one-half to three bushels an acre can be obtained, clover seed is one of the most profitable crops.

**Keep Milk Records**

Every Pine county farmer should keep milk records for each cow. It will increase her profits. Good stock, good feed, good records and good care are the signposts to larger profits from dairying. Most men think they know their best cow yet few of them really do. But more than that, a dairy milk record calls your attention to small changes in milk flow so that you can look up the cause and remedy it before the cow's production gets down where it cannot be brought up again. The effects of irregular milking, irregular feeding, exposure to cold winds etc. are easily seen on the record sheet, but they are not noticed where no records are kept.

It is not a question of time, it is a question of handling the dairy work in whichever way will net the most returns on the labor and capital invested. Weighing each cow's milk and marking it down on a convenient sheet requires less than one minute per cow. Any farmer in Pine county who keeps records will tell you that it makes more money on that time by keeping records than he does on an equal amount of time spent on any other farm operation. Labor, capital, and equipment are too expensive nowadays to take chances on guesswork. When help is scarce it is all the more important that we spend what time we have to the best advantage.

The Pine county Farm Bureau at Hinckley has convenient weekly milk sheets for free distribution. Ask for all you want. Your local buttermaker has a supply of them for you.

#### Poultry Thieves will be Fought

If pigs is pigs, then by the same token chickens is chickens. Vandalisms have multiplied until the necessity of better protection for the poultry raiser is becoming apparent. Thieving bands, traveling in suits, have raided many fine flocks in the state and have gone unwhipped of justice. Some recent instances have been particularly aggravating and have prompted a strong recommendation by the agricultural division of the University of Minnesota that the officers of poultry associations of the various counties offer a standing reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of anyone stealing poultry. The recommendation has been presented in several counties by N. E. Chapman, poultry specialist, and letters urging early action, with suggestion that the reward fund be guaranteed by officers of the associations and neighboring interested are going forward. Isanti county seems likely to lead off by being the first to post reward notices. Kandiyohi and other counties are considering the proposition.

#### Proper Potato Storage Urged

Proper storage of potatoes, in order that a large amount of this important food may be saved and not wasted, is emphasized in a report of the United States department of agriculture received at University Farm. Commercial growers and shippers of storage potatoes are and should be storing potatoes in bins to a depth of 10 to 15 feet, and many farmers who grow potatoes for their own consumption only fail to take proper care of them, individual losses in the aggregate amounting to a large sum each year. Losses sustained when potatoes are improperly stored often reach 25 per cent each year, and where care has not been exercised to remove all diseased tubers before covering, the loss is even greater. Storage should be provided in the farm or at the shipping station from 40 to 75 per cent of the crop, storage affording the maximum of
