Red Cross Xmas Seal Sale Starts
 The following proclamation has been issued by Robert Blair, Supervisor, United States Public Health Service:

"Over 100,000 Americans die annually from tuberculosis. This is an appalling waste of life when we consider that tuberculosis is a preventable disease. However, because the loss of life occurs almost entirely in the ranks of the young, the world now faces a serious health problem. The control of tuberculosis as well as the most pressing health problem confronting these young citizens."

Every year the National Tuberculosis Association by selling Red Cross Christmas Seals raises a considerable sum of money to be used in a variety of campaigns to combat tuberculosis. This year a special effort is being made to interest December 2, 2 and 4 have been designated as days on which the schools, organizations and individuals of the seriousness of the situation. I trust that the campaign this year will be particularly successful.

Mediteranean Air Base
 A far-reaching program of aviation in the French colonial possessions in Africa has been decreed by the commission on aerial transport at Tunis, Algeria, which recommends that a great aerial transport center be established near Tunis on the lake, in order to centralize aerial traffic over the Mediterranean sea. Tunisia at Tunis occupies an advantageous position at the junction of French and international colonial possessions, a regular aerial service is to be started between Tunis and other centers would benefit the French colonies. At least a line of airplanes is in operation between Tunis and Algiers and this, in the opinion of the commission, will be extended to Tunis. The extension of the line is to be the "Mediterranean line" as has been suggested a proposed line of lines past.

This matter was brought up by the teachers at the institute held at Henriette this fall, but there has been no concerted action taken by the school officers as it is so hard to handle their own district in the matter.

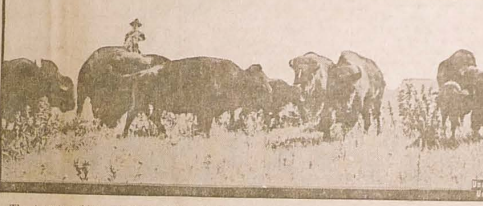

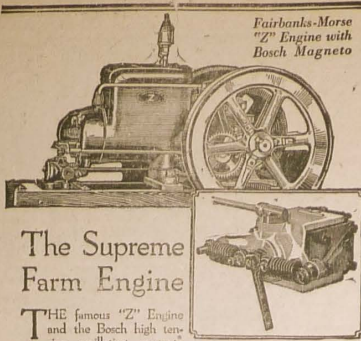

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RED CROSS GIVES LOCAL ACCOUNTING

War Council Tells How Millions Contributed by Public Were Used For Relief

BIG TASK IS DESCRIBED

In Twenty Months \$184,000,000 Was Spent Overseas and \$16,000,000 in the United States.

Washington, (Special).—Through a complete report of the work of the American Red Cross in the war by Chairman Henry F. Davison, on behalf of the war council, the organization on the eve of its annual convention of members during the Third Red Cross Ball call, November 2 to 11, has rendered an accounting of the many millions given it by the American people to help our fighting men and our allies. The statement is, in part, as follows:

"The war council of the American Red Cross is now preparing to make a complete accounting to the American people of money contributed and expended as well as the work done by the American Red Cross during the period in which the war council was in control of its affairs. The war council was appointed May 10, 1918, and went out of existence February 23, 1919.

"It was the practice of the war council to give complete publicity to its policies and finances, but it is only now that a picture of the work done as a whole can be presented. It is the feeling of the war council that a report in this summarized form should be made directly to the public which provided the money and gave the effort which made the American Red Cross a success.

"A statement of the American Red Cross effort and finances since the war council relinquished its control will be made to the public through the executive committee, and it is important, therefore, that the fact that this report covers the period only until March 1, should be carefully noted.

Following are certain round figures covering American Red Cross participation in the war, as revealed by the war council's reports:

Of the \$400,000,000 in money and supplies contributed to the American Red Cross during the twenty months the war council was in existence, \$205,000,000 was allotted to national headquarters, while \$195,000,000 went to the chapters to finance their activities. Expenditures in the twenty months totaled \$274,000,000, divided as follows: In national headquarters in France, \$57,000,000; elsewhere overseas, \$94,000,000; in the United States, \$48,000,000; in chapters in the United States, \$25,000,000; elsewhere overseas, \$55,000,000; in the United States, \$28,000,000; making total expenditures in France, \$82,000,000; elsewhere overseas, \$72,000,000; in the United States, \$119,000,000.

Smallest Bank in the World

There is a saying among country people that "the smaller the bank the safer the money," and therefore the Wake County Savings Bank, at Raleigh, N. C., should be the safest bank in America, since it is the smallest.

Now it is a "regular bank" with an imposing entrance, and that is about all. Its frontage, to be exact, is 7 1/2 feet.

"Bachelor of Commerce."

The plan of the University of London to grant degrees in commerce is attracting much attention, and this scheme it is proposed to grant the degree of bachelor of commerce to candidates who pass the necessary examinations after a three-year course of study. Those who so desire may later proceed to the degree of master of commerce, after a minimum of two years' practical experience in the particular trade or industry taken up.

The first year's course comprises the compulsory subjects of organization of industry, banking, trade and transport, modern economic development of the British empire and of the chief foreign countries; elementary commercial law, and statistical method. The second and final year will be devoted to specialization.

The general feeling is that there will not be much room for the common female farm laborer in the future, and for the woman who has a little money and who looks upon farming as her profession and her life work, there is a excellent opportunity in this direction.

In the first place, on account of the compact location of the garden spaces and the cities in England, transportation of foodstuffs is easy. Then garbly truck and flowers do grow abundantly and profusely there, and always find ready markets.

FIND MANY USES FOR PEAT

Warren Industry Gives Promise of Great Development in the Years to Come.

The output of peat in the United States last year far exceeded that of any preceding year and the general increase, which was stimulated by the war, has been practically all branches of the industry. Though tentatively used as fuel in Europe and widely known in the United States as a potential source of heat and power, peat has been unable to compete with coal and many peat operators have directed their attention to the utilization of peat in agriculture with gratifying results.

Peat fertilizer was first marketed in commercial quantities in 1908 and stock-foot peat in 1912, and though there is still some prejudice against its use in the agricultural branches of the industry has been successful and the quantity of fertilizers and stock-foot peat annually produced is increasing.

Large quantities of these products were made last year, but the most striking development was the production of more peat in the New England States than has been manufactured in the entire United States in all preceding years. Almost equally striking was the widespread interest manifested in peat resources which had been generally regarded as of doubtful value.

Large quantities of peat or sphagnum moss were produced and utilized for stable litter, packing material, and surgical dressing, and several hundred thousand acres of peat soils were used for the growth of crops. The peat litter was produced by the owners of small bogs for their own use, but the packing material was sold to forists for \$25 a ton. According to J. W. Holton of the Red Cross more than a million peat pots were prepared in this country for that organization. Most of the moss was gathered by volunteers from bogs in Washington, Oregon and Maine, and the pots were used in military hospitals at home and abroad.

Making a speech recently and seeking to impress his auditors with the fact that this country has entirely too few ships, he shipped out a twenty-dollar bill and declared:

"Why, even the ship reproduced on this bill is one that was taken over by this country during the war. It flies the American flag, all right, but it is a foreign-built ship."

Examination proved he was absolutely correct. The ship has four funnels, and there never has been a four-funnel ship built in this country for our foreign trade.
