Farmers & Merchants State Bank Install Clock and Burglar Alarm

The accompanying cut is just installed by the Farmers and Merchants State Bank which is away.

This large clock is operated by electricity from a master clock in the main banking room. It is an especially handsome fixture of bronze and leaded art glass.

It isn't to arouse the public and expose them to the yeggmen but let's—its to scare the burglars.

In order to install this system the vault was completely emptied and wired, floor, ends, ceiling and walls, with a double circuit of copper wire connected with a large siren carried in a metal housing above the clock on the outside of the building and which is constructed that if tampered with, as turning a bolt, or attempting to cut the cable leading to it, will cause an alarm.






