FRENCH ANNOUNCE IRON HAND POLICY

Germans Warned Buer Officials Will Face Firing Squad if Troops Are Attacked.

—Buenos Aires—The German population of the Rockingham district has been warned by General Latourette, commanding the district, that in the event any further French troops are assassinated or ambushed on a highway, together with four other town officials, will be shot at once as a measure of retaliation.

The civil mission of engineers headed by Min. Costa, French inspector general of mines, which came into the Ruhr to exact coal reparations from the industrialists, has been realization of its plans.

A party of engineers, escorted by a battalion of French infantry, seized the state coke plant near Westerbald with 1,000 tons of coke on hand.

LEAGUE IS TOLD OF SLAVERY

Humans Sold on Block at From \$24 Down, League Told.

Geneva—Human slaves are sold on the block in Abyssinia, at prices ranging from \$24 down, according to information reaching the League of Nations.

Quotations on humans caught in the open, chained, roused and sold into slavery for rich musicians living in the interior of Asia Minor—in the year 1922—are given as follows:

Adult male slaves, \$6 to \$24 each, according to age, strength and productive abilities.

Female slaves—demand slight, \$6 down.

Child slaves, absolute drag on the market. These cost so much to keep until they reach age of usefulness they are losing investment.

The league will tackle the problem of oppression of human slavery at the next annual assembly in September.

Town and Village Election Returns

Therrien Honored

—St. Paul—The Pine County Legislature, in the state legislature, has been named chairman of the state parks committee of the House. Mr. Washburn was chairman but owing to poor health, Speaker Nolan appointed Mr. Therrien to the chairmanship.

Stages Comeback in Victory Over Man Who Defeated Him.

Hibbing, Minn.—Victor L. Power, defeated for mayor of Hibbing one year ago, staged a comeback when he defeated Mayor John M. Gannon for the office by a majority of 250 votes.

Power had been mayor of Hibbing continuously for 10 years until a year ago when he was defeated by Gannon by a narrow margin in a most spectacular fight. He had been mayor during the period that Hibbing earned the name of the "richest village in the world" and later, "the poor little rich village."

Victor L. Power is one of the foremost political figures in northern Minnesota. He has been mentioned as a gubernatorial possibility.

Gehl Oil Co. to Have New Station

Work was started this week on the new oil station for the Gehl Oil Co. It will be located on the Federal highway on the corner opposite the Piper Furniture Company.

The main building will be 18x24 feet with a full basement under it. It will be completely modern with furnace heat, rest rooms etc. The canopy over the driveway facing the highway will be 18x24. The ground was frozen so hard that it was necessary to break it down with dynamite to make the excavating easier. The construction work will be rushed to have the station open for spring business.

IRISH AUTHORITIES IN RAID

Steady stream of Munitions Pour into Ireland, Rids Reveal.

Dublin—Ninety Irishmen and women republican sympathizers, charged with plotting against the Irish free state, who were deported to Ireland from England, were interned in Mountjoy jail by the Dublin government.

Free state officials regard the arrests as most important. The prisoners are surrounded by an extra heavy guard.

It is understood that Joseph McGrath, chief of the Irish free state government, has spent several weeks in England and Scotland having plans for the future of the republic. McGrath has been in London for a long time and has been in a steady stream of munitions, arms and money flowing into Ireland from England.

LINDSAY'S PLEA IS DELAYED

Charged With Embezzlement of \$100,000 From Stockyards Company.

St. Paul—James M. Lindsay, charged with grand larceny in connection with the embezzlement of \$100,000 from the St. Paul Stockyards Company, of which he was treasurer until his resignation in December, was granted a week's continuance in which to make a plea, when he was arraigned in the county district court. Efforts to obtain his release on bail were to be made by his attorney.

Although he has refused to talk for publication concerning his arrest, Lindsay is apparently unperturbed over the affair.

SUBMIT SETTLEMENT PLAN

Proposal Is Made to Pay \$250,000,000 From Future Reparations.

Washington—The new proposal of the Allies that payment of the \$250,000,000,000 of the United States for the maintenance of the American system of occupation in Germany be made in future reparations receipts was received at the State department from Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Elliot Wadsworth, who is representing the government in the negotiations in Paris.

Officials declined to discuss the proposal pending a study of the Allied plea for more time.

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Invaders Close Public Places and Enforce Drastic "Curfew" Rules

Rockingham—Two Frenchmen, one an officer and the other a civilian, were arrested in the vicinity of the railroad near Buer, near Rockingham.

Each body when found had five bullets in his possession. One of the victims was Lieutenant Colonel Tim de Chasseaux, and the other M. Joly, chief of the Buer railroad station.

The French authorities asserted that a penalty of at least 100,000,000 marks, would be imposed upon the French government if it failed to permit the French authorities to search the streets after 7 o'clock in the evening until the settlements submitted to the French government.

SOME HINTS FOR THE FANNING MILL SEASON

L. B. Bassett of University Farm Gives Pointers on the "Shake"

This is the time of the year when the farm fanning mill should be generally used. The mill is divided into two classes—the end shake and the side shake. In the side shake the sieves vibrate from side to side, while in the end shake the sieves vibrate backward and forward. In the side shake mill the wind is delivered on the right side of the sieves. L. B. Bassett of the farm management division, University Farm, says in this connection:

"With a side shake mill the grain travels zig zag across the sieves and may be retained on the sieve longer. While the wire screen has a greater capacity than the side sieve, it needs more careful watching. Especially is this true of the finer screens. Unless the wire screens are braced they are likely to sag in the center and cause the grain to pile and overload the center of the sieve. The side screens are more substantial and will cause less trouble. Zinc screens are also more expensive.

"In most end shake mills the wind is blown in an arc to the rear of the sieve. In this type of construction the wind never comes in contact with the sieves. The grain passes through the wind blast from the center of the upper to the lower show. This type of mill generally uses the side sieves.

"The sieve adjustment is very important. In some types of mills the sieve may be set at various angles. It is important that the angle of the sieve be correct for the kind of work at hand."
